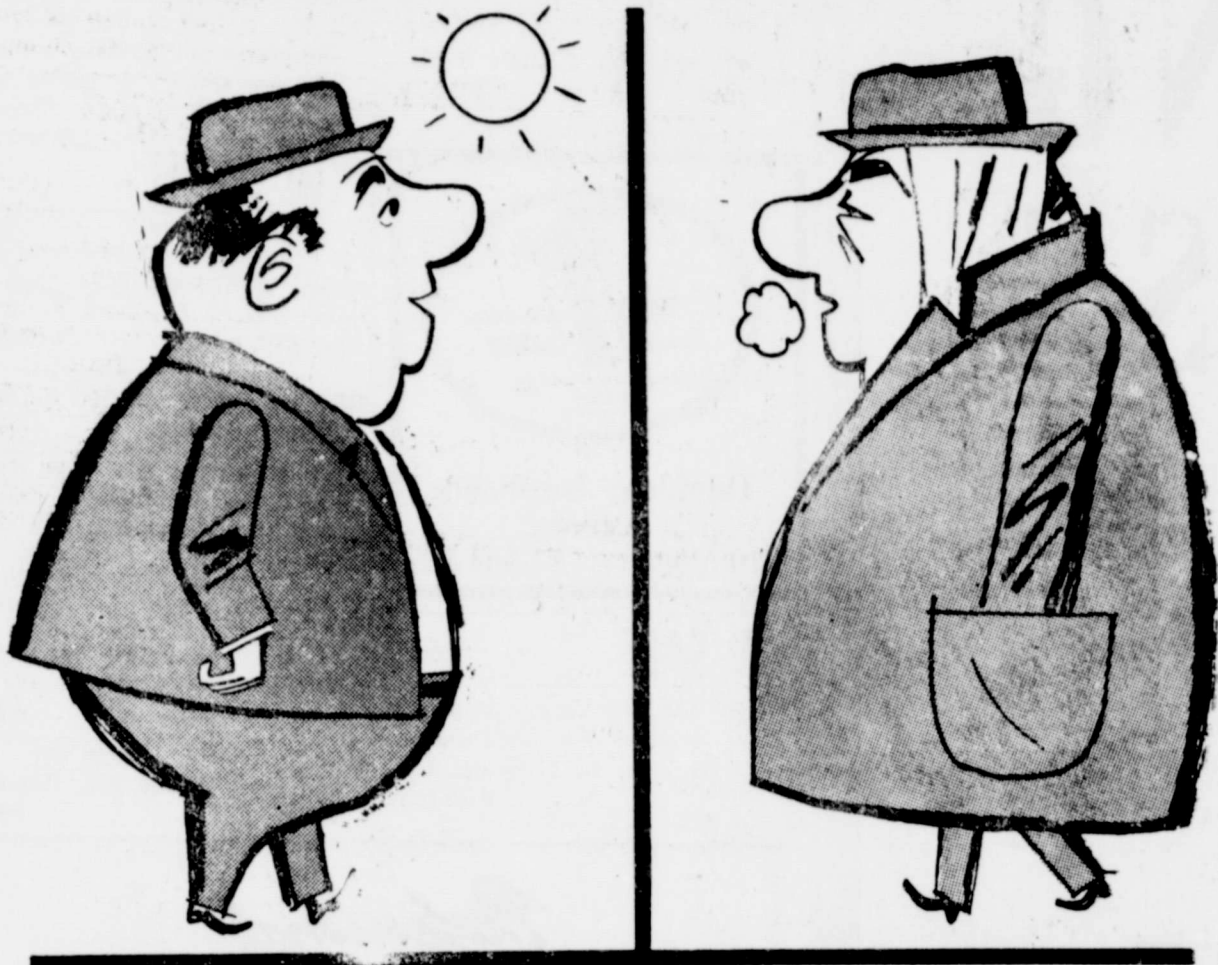
DURWARD A. TAYLOR DIES IN SAN ANTONIO

**EDITORS POLL
FAVORS NIXON**

CHICAGO (AP)—A presidential poll of the nation's newspaper editors and publishers, with about 40 per cent voting, indicate Vice-President Richard M. Nixon will win Tuesday's election.

Publisher's Auxiliary, a weekly trade newspaper which conducted the 3-week poll, announced Thursday final results from nearly 4,000 of the 10,703 ballots sent to the newspaper executives.

It announced that weekly newspaper editors and publishers believe Nixon the winner in what it said "could be called a near landslide." He was favored in 36 states with a total of 416 electoral votes while Sen. John F. Kennedy was the choice in 12 states carrying 115 electoral votes.

GOLDTHWAITE — Copperas Cove clinched the title in District 9-A here Friday night, taking a 14-12 football decision from the Goldthwaite Eagles along with remaining undefeated in district play.

Cove's Bulldogs tallied first in the opening quarter when Cecil Newton plunged the last yard. The Bulldogs recovered a fumble on the Goldthwaite eight yard line and took it over in two plays.

Goldthwaite tied it up in the second quarter with a drive which started on the Cove 45-yd. line and ended when Halfback Robert McKensie plunged over the final yard. The drive took only six plays.

The Bulldogs went ahead to stay in the third when they mounted an attack on the Eagle 41-yard line after recovering a fumble and took the ball to the

The two points after touch-down stood up for the Cove when the Eagles opened a final quarter drive on their own 38 yard line and took it over in 14 rushing plays, plus a pass with L. V. 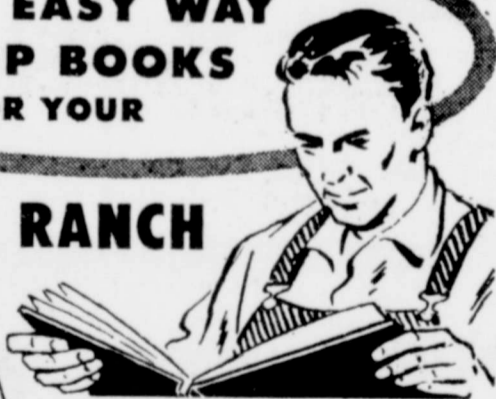

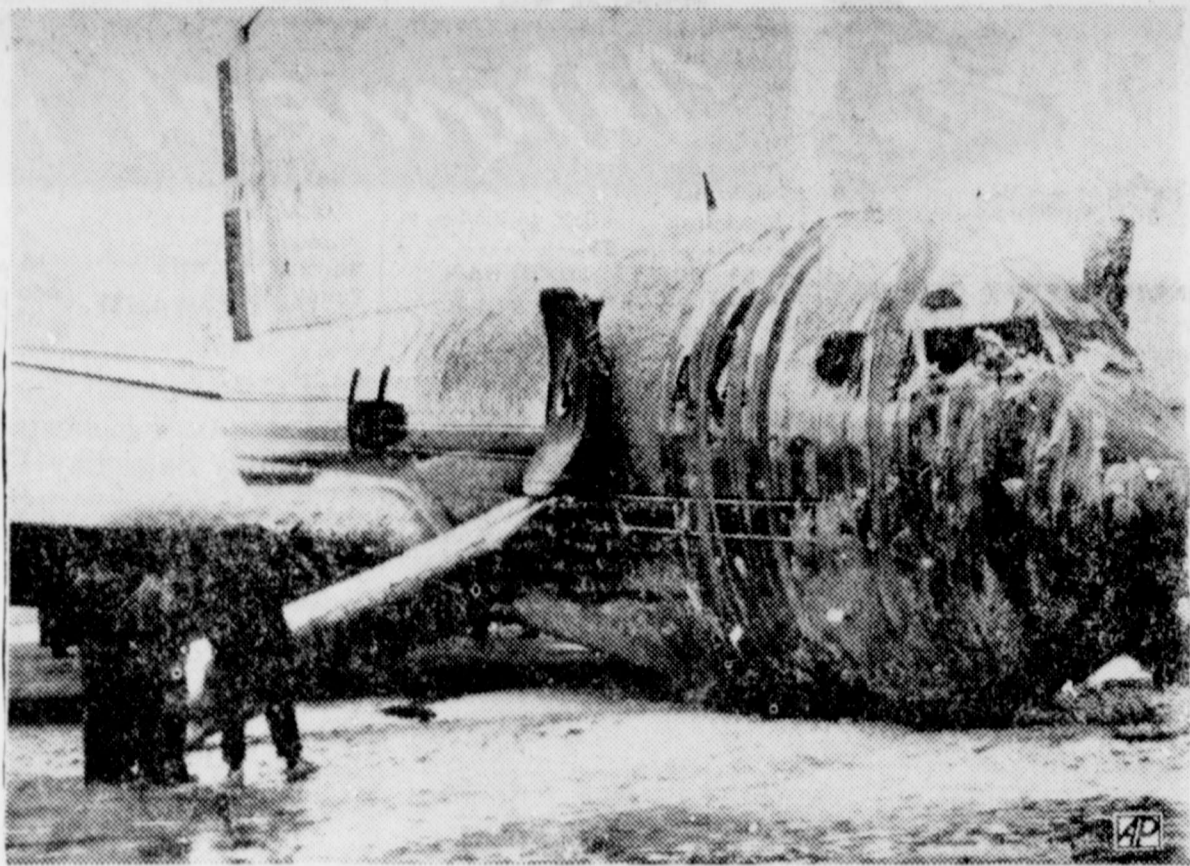
