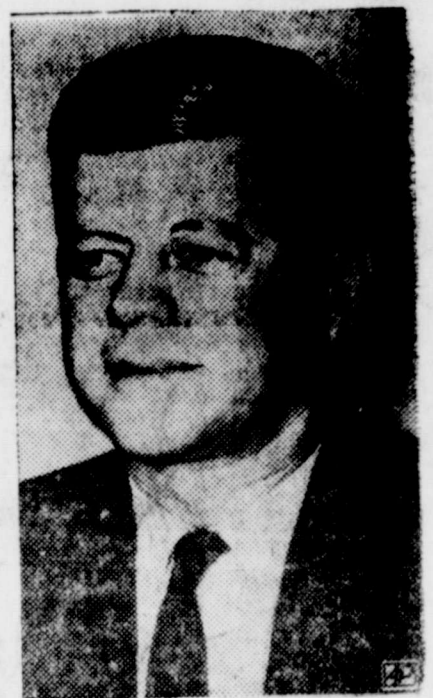

In Coryell County, the vote was Kennedy 2700 Nixon 1477 Evant in the Coryell Co. box Kennedy 78, Nixon 76.

In all the races that mattered: here is the Coryell County vote: Kennedy 2700, Nixon 1477, Sullivan 7, Decker 6; Daniel 3563, Steger 621; Johnson 3058, Tower 1045, Logan 10.

The Amendments: 1. (first for, 2nd against) 1474, 1060; 1795, 804; 1408, 1219; 751, 953.

In all the boxes, Kennedy-Johnson carried Coryell County almost in a landslide. However, at The Grove it was Kennedy 18, Nixon 42; at Arnett, 25-25; Absentee, Kennedy 65, Nixon 77. And the Johnson-Tower race at The Grove it was Johnson 21, Tower 34. The Kennedy-Johnson ticket carried Coryell County by approximately 65 percent.

State & National Latest returns according to Wednesday morning's Temple Daily Telegram had Johnson 264,624, and Nixon 239,170 in Texas at 9:40 p. m., with 153 out of 254 counties reported, 18 complete—the latest we could get yesterday, via newspaper.

**WORKING WITH WOOD**

Reasonable care and intelligent maintenance will greatly increase the beauty and usefulness of wood buildings. Dirt and stain on painted wood, like on clothing is objectionable, but can, in most instances be removed. An occasional washing with soap and water will remove grime and dirt and frequently will restore the paint color and gloss.

To remove mildew from a painted wood surface, it should be brushed off and then washed with a 5 to 10% solution of borax in warm water. This treatment may

have to be repeated, since the fungus which causes mildew is difficult to control.

Rust stains in wood from nails or other metal and mineral streaks from water stains may be removed by repeated scrubbing with oxalic acid mixed 5 ounces per gallon of cold water.

The pitch in pine lumber frequently works out of the boards and accumulates in streaks or patches on the surface. If the pitch is hard, it can be chipped or sanded off. If soft, it can be removed by scrubbing with denatured alcohol. After using these stain removers, the wood surface should always be thoroughly rinsed with clean water
