In the past couple of weeks the price of gold has become an mportant item in the news. A speculative wave of buying took although it dropped back close to the U. S. price of $\$ 35$ an ounce in bargo, a devaluation of the dollar a matter of a few days. This interest was caused primarily by the
fear that the United States might ear that the United States might the price of gold. There is also fear of a greater inflation in this country as a result of governof the presidential candidates which could lead to an unbalanced budget. There has probably been some selling of American stocks by European investors who are in the country at this time Further liquidation is possible along with further withdrawal of gold if the sentiment towards inflation continues. Finally, interest rates in wide spread between the return one can get from European bonds as compared to American bonds. ties at are so many uncertainties at the present time that it
would be very difficult to forecast the future outlook for gold prices. The current Administration has assured the British Government they will maintain the $\$ 35$ price for gold, but if the outflow
continues on the basis at which it has in the past year eventually some action might have to be
taken within the form of an em.
$\qquad$ The only other possible alternative would be the payment of subsidie o increase gold mining comp.
Gold stocks are speeulative and probably should not be included in the small investor's portfolio, but he sophisticated investor who

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## WASHINGTONAND

| The Attorney General of the State of California has filed an action for over a million dollars in the Federal Courts that will be watched with great interest as it could result in achieving another milestone in the enforcetrust laws. <br> Defendants in this suit are six n:anufacturers of folding bleacher seats. The suit charges that school C. W. Harder districts in the state suffered provable damages of almost $\mathbf{\$ 3 5 0 , 0 0 0}$ because the defendants conspired to allocate beiness among themselves and fix prices charged to the schools. <br> Last year these same six manufacturers were the defendants in a criminal action brought by the United States Department of Justice for conspiring to fix prices, allocate a a fine of $\$ 24.000$. <br> But California's Attorney General, Stanley Mosk, does not believe this constlitutes adequate reparations to the 82 school districts and four state colleges he is representing in this action, nor to the taxpayers who support these schools. <br> According to the suit filed, it is claimed that it can be proved that because of this conspiracy among the six manufacturers, these schools over paid $\$ 344,889$ for folding bleachers. <br> California's Attorney General has seen fit to file under the provisions of the anti-trust laws regarding rights to triple damages. If this suit is successful | the school districts would then collect $\$ 1,034,667$. <br> Undoubtedly this would be a powerful deterrent to further conspiracy in selling to schools. <br> The suit also injects another far reaching issue. While there has been several triple damage sults brought by business firms who have been injured by unfair competitive prices, this is a case where the buyers are seeking triple damages. <br> There are even greater and more far reaching affects possible as the outcome of this suit. <br> This could go a long way to establishing joint action in antl trust enforcement between the U. S. Justice Department and the various states. <br> It has long been felt by many that school districts especially, have been victimized by the practice of collusive bidding. This is probably due to the peculiar set up that exists largely in the handling of funds and contracts for school purposes. <br> Usually schooi administrators are required to be primarily teachers, with no business experience required. School boards are generally composed of volunteers who meet once or twice per month, but are occupied with their own affalrs. <br> * * * <br> Thus, althourh schools represent growing share of local tax dollars, supervision of the business aspects of school systems is generally weak. <br> However, a successful conclusion of the action started in California, especially if carried on in other states, could undcubtedly accomplish a great deal in bringing down the costs of schools. |
