Some of the most durable w species vommonly grown in T as include black locust, bois d' catalpa, cedar, cypress and jui er. However, only the heartw of these durable species res fungus attack. When used in tact with the ground, even tl woods may fail, since decay fi eat away the sapwood in a s time. hus, only the durable he wood core remains for sun and strength. On the other h the sapwood of all our const tion species, when properly t ed with approved preservat can effectively resist decay for least 30 years.
