First, we hear, student tickets to the Brahma-Hornet game will be 75c adults \$2. Hearsay.

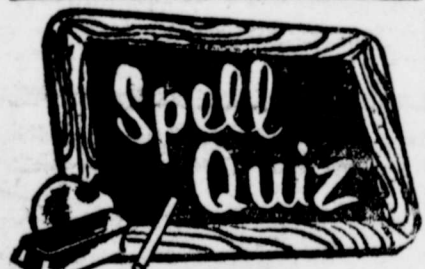
Second, a petition is being circulated to close all businesses in Gatesville at 4 p. m., Friday so's you can get there in one piece, without too much hurrv.

# 15-14

It Began With Joe's Toe, and Ended With Joe's Toe!

Joe Carothers, Hornet quarterback kicked off the ball game and kicked the 1960 Edition of Gatesville High School Hornets right into the quarter finals 1960 AA Championship playoff of Texas International League Football.

Gatesville Hornets play Bellville Brahmans at Austin's House Park at 8 o'clock, Friday evening, December 2. Both teams are 12-0 for the 1960 season. Gatesville won over Taylor 15-14 and Bellville beat Liberty 50-28.

In the 'aftertime' 19-yard 45 degree angle place-kick, Bob cott held, Charles Allen passed expertly from center, and 8 other Hornets, backs and linemen, executed their positions expertly, as Joe Carothers lofted his truly "golden" kick thru the uprights for the winning ONE point. It was a "tem effort" expertly executed, and the calmest man, in stands or field, was Joe and his Toe!

Carothers chance came, with a Taylor lineman jumped off side with 2 seconds to go. Time expired on the penalty and Gatesville was given one more play, resulting in the win.

Carothers booted a similar 19-yarder in last week's game with the Brady Houn' Dawgs that proved the difference in that bidistrict game.

The toe, turned to gold, actually included some 4,737 cash customers, with a net gate of \$8,681, and estimates of a complete count, nearly 6,000.

The Hornets took an early lead driving 57 yards the first time they got the ball, Carothers mixing 2 pass completions with the nifty running of Bob Edwards, Sammy Petty and Jerry Gilchrest, Petty getting a 1st on he Taylor 7, Carothers got 2, Gilchrest3 and Edwards dived into the end zone with 2:17 left in the first quarter

The plunge try for extra was bad.

Pat Roach swiped a Taylor pass on the Duck 29, and the TD in 4 plays, 25 yards of them Hornets moved to a 2nd quarter being made by Gilchrest on a scamper to the 4, and then he bulled over from the 3 with 4:29 left in the half. Again the try for the extra failed!

Taylor rolled 59 yards for it's 2nd period TD after Jan Mohel's 26-yard kickoff return. Darrell Mott made a great catch of Billy Davis' 7-yard pass in the end zone for the Taylor score. Budgie Ford, no Model T back, blasted the end zone for the 2 extra.

In the 3rd, Taylor recovered a Hornet fumble midfield and drove to the 7 before bogging down, and in the final period with Ford carrying most of the way, they went 90 yards on 20 plays to put themselves out in front 14-12; a pass for the extra failed. 4:04 was left in the game. A clipping penalty nullified a 27-yard scamper by Carothers and that looke to be about it.

Going on for the last 60 yards, the Hornets made it in 15 plays, setting up the final boot by Carothers to put the game on ice.

Here's the play-by-play of the last and final counter: Roger Youngblood kicked to Bob Scott on the 30, returned to 39. Gilchrest start by Rita Hemond

on the 41. Tommy Valenta stoppe Edwards for none. Carothers takes to 34. Hornets clipped ball on 59. Gilchrest makes 1st., Jan Mohel and Valenta stop. Carothers to Scott, Jimmy Kincl stops, 6 yds. Edwards goes to 35, 1st D.

Edwards gets 7, Scott gets 2. Eddie Carrizales stops. Pass to Billy Saltow gets 1st D. Jim Welch stops. Carothers stopt by Darrell Mott, none. Carothers Saltow pass, incomplete. Pass to Edwards gets to 5. Edwards gets 3. 13 seconds. Flag. Taylor off-side. Hornets on 1 E-2 yard line. Time already out.

Charles Allen passes from center to Bob Scott who holds, and Carothers boots at 45 degree angle for 3 points and pandemonium reigns.

## COURT DECIDES HWY. DEPT. ERRED IN ROAD MOVE IN EVANT

The State Supreme Court held Wednesday the State Highway Department had overstepped its authority in trying to build a highway on private land without acquiring title to the land.

Two private owners in Coryell County, McNeil and C. J. Griffin brought suit against county officials, the State Highway Commission and the Department. The highway commission argued the action represented a suit against the state without the necessary legislative authority.

"Acts of officials which are not lawfully authorized are not acts of the state," said Judge Ruel Walker in writing the court's opinion.

"If the present suit could not be maintained without legislative consent, officials of the state would never have to condemn land legally. They could simply appropriate it and the land owner would be entitled to no compensation unless the Legislature granted him permission to sue," Walker said.

Lower courts dismissed the highway

commission and department from the trespass suit.

"The Supreme Court does not agree with the court of civil appeals that the pleas of the state officers were properly sustained because the suit against them is to prevent performance by the state of a function of sovereignty," the court said.

Walker said there is no law conferring upon the highway dept. the authority to construct a highway across privately owned property without acquiring legal right to do so. The question is not whether respondent (highway officials) were acting on behalf of the state to accomplish a governmental purpose but whether the action they were about to take is authorized by law.

The case was sent back to Coryell County.

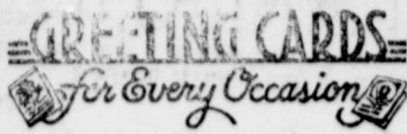

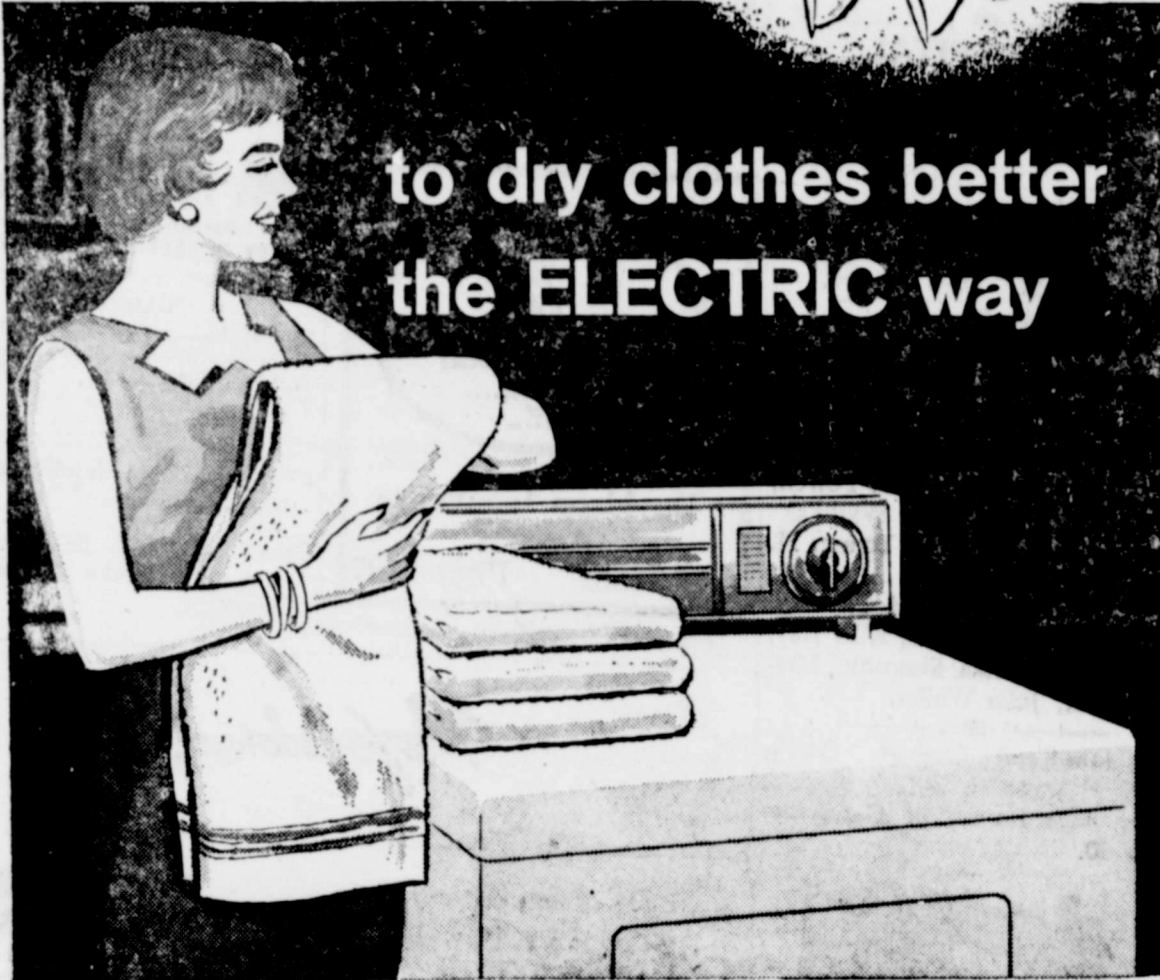

This is fundamental."

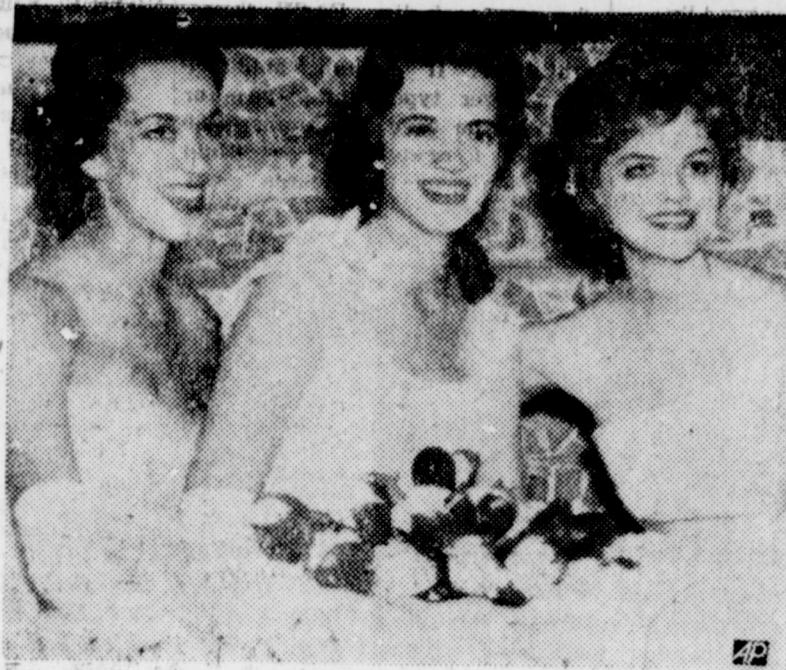

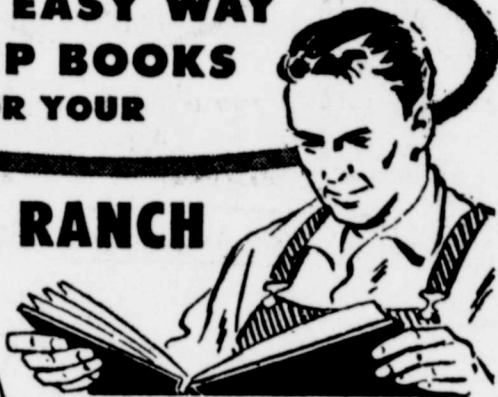

**WOOD WARPING**

Warp is a common term applied to lumber which has changed from its flat form to a bent shape. Thin boards tend to warp more rapidly than thick boards. Frequently, the condition is not the fault of the lumber, but results from improper conditions of use. Properly manufactured and seasoned lumber, when applied in a dry condition and kept dry, will not warp.

Warping can assume several forms. Cupping of lumber describes a condition which resembles a soda-straw cut in half lengthwise. Bowing refers to a lengthwise appearance of lumber which assumes the curved shape

of a rocker on a rocking chair. Crook is the same sort of deformation as bow, but in an edgewise direction. Twist is the condition of lumber somewhat like that of a twisted leather strap. Warping often causes wood to tear loose from its fastening.

Warping of lumber can be controlled by treatment with water repellents, by use of paints or other finishes, and especially through the installation of dry lumber and the maintenance of a suitable moisture content level.
