HIKE IN COTTON ACREAGE FOR CORYELL COUNTY IN 1961: UP 2500 BALES

Allotment for the 1961 Coryell County cotton crop is 21,752 acres or 2,360 more acres than that for 1960 which was 19,372 acres.

Notices of individual farm allotments have been mailed to 1,036 farmers, and Dec. 13, these and their wives will vote on a cotton marketing quota referendum at Gatesville, Turnersville and Oglethorpe from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m. Absentees can get ballots at the ASC office.

Marketing cards for 1961 have been mailed out and farmers who have not notified the ASC office have been urged to do so, so that acreage measuring to check compliance can be made.

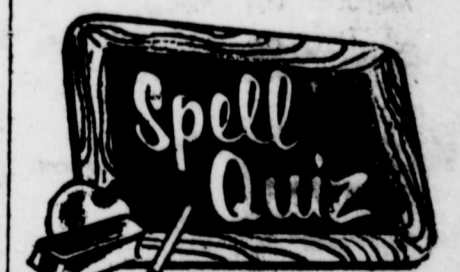

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SHURRY SEAL GIVEN TEST AT GATESVILLE

Gatesville is experimenting with the new slurry seal method of topping paved streets. A trial run was made Thursday and Friday on the portion of Leon Street running from the downtown square east to Lutterloh Avenue. The paving work was done by H&L Construction Co. "If the Leon job works out satisfactorily, we will probably give the same treatment to other streets," Mayor Dan McNeil said. Workmen also have completed cleaning and repainting, inside and out, the water tank and tower at the East Gatesville pump station. This job cost \$2,100.

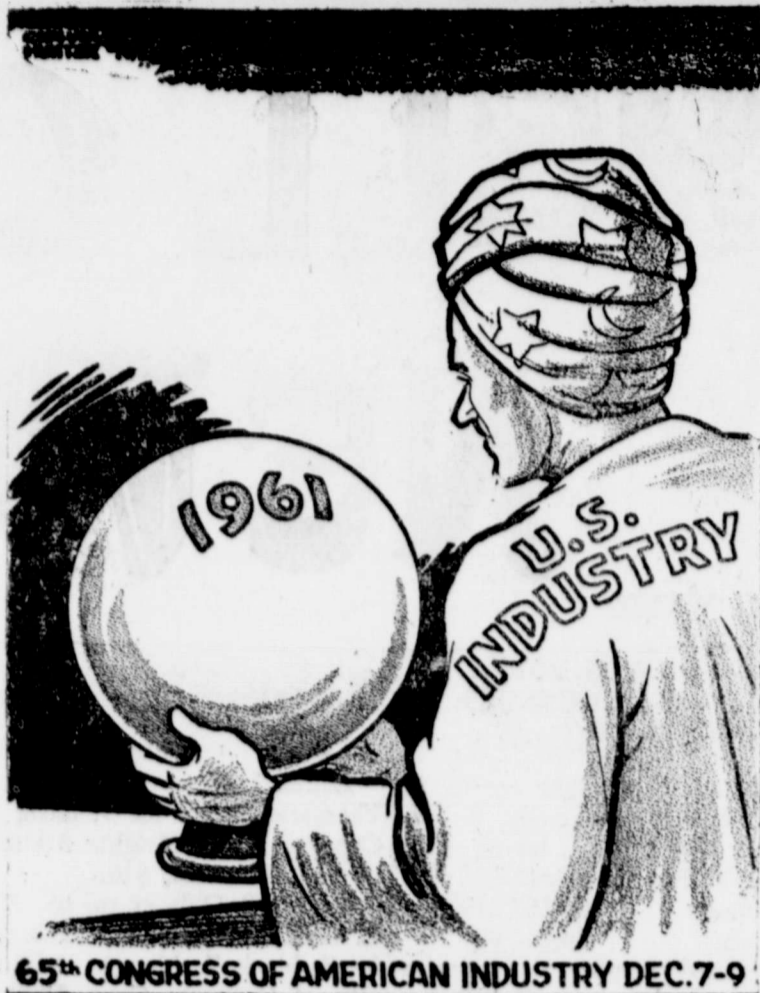
CUB PACK 72 HAS THEME "NEW WORLDS AT NOVEMBER MEETING"

IF YOU'RE THINKING OF OIL ELIGIBILITY, HERE IT IS BY RATLIFF

The amateur rule of the Texas Interscholastic League again is in the news with the usual protestations of those running afoul of it that "it's ridiculous."

Most everybody is pro-minded about athletics except the high school people. The outsiders don't think there's anything wrong with paying a schoolboy something in appreciation of his athletic ability. They also take the attitude that it is penurious to limit what may be given to a boy for his participation.

Actually this protestation never will get anywhere — the interscholastic League will go right on with its amateur rule because it believes that when a sport is supposed to be amateur, it should be conducted that way.

Since this is the time of year when most alumni of the colleges start getting in their recruiting licks, it is well to advise the boys what they can not do in order to retain their eligibility for the remainder of the school year.

The amateur rule prohibits the acceptance of cash or valuable consideration for participation in athletics and it also says that a boy cannot compete on an athletic team with a paid player or for valuable consideration allows his name to be used for the promotion of any product, plan or service.

Baseball, basketball, bowling, boxing, football, golf, rodeo event softball, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, weight lifting and wrestling are sports covered by the amateur rule.

A boy may play against a paid player but he cannot play on the same team with a paid player. Acceptance of cash or valuable consideration by someone else for the boy is evading the rule and is interpreted the same as the boy's receiving these items, says the Interscholastic League. Acceptance of golf balls, bags, clubs, etc. and playing on any golf team with a paid player is in violation of the rule.

The signing of a letter of intent with a college is a violation. The boy is receiving valuable consideration — the contract for an athletic scholarship.

Violation of the rule results not from participating in a rodeo event but in accepting valuable consideration for it. A boy may enter a rodeo contest as an individual entry and win the event without violating the amateur rule — but if he accepts cash or valuable consideration he violates the rule.

A boy may play summer baseball must not be on the same team with a paid player although he can play against other teams that have paid players. He cannot receive expense money for travel meals or lodging. The manager of the team has to handle this money in the same way that he high school coach would handle the money. The boy must not receive any cash or transportation tickets.

Gate receipts can not be distributed among the players and although a boy did not accept his share he still would violate the rule because he would be on a team that had paid players.

If a boy should hit a home run and somebody took up a collection to reward him, he could not accept the money because they would be on a team that had a paid player.

If some college alumnus pays for lodging, meals, transportation tickets from other than the immediate family would be interpreted as a violation of the amateur rule.

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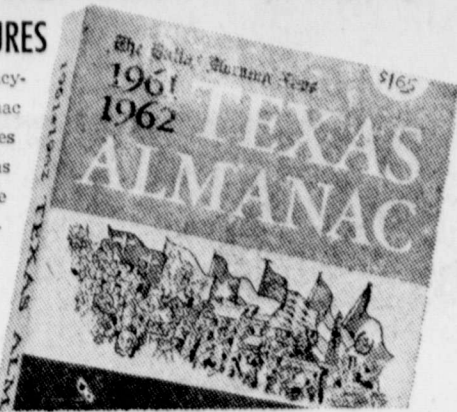

It was the Tigers' first loss in 11 games this season.

Norman Diersche, big Hawk back, gunned his club past the hustling Coryell County entry by scoring 38 points and passing for 12 more. He completely hogged the spotlight as he assured the Wall six of its second straight regional title.

Wall scored in the first two minutes of the contest, but Oglesby bounced back on a 40 yard pass play from Leslie Vincent to Donald West and the count was knotted at 6-all with 5:37 left in the opening quarter.

Wall broke through to two more touchdowns in the next five minutes and never lost the lead again.

The Hawks scored 14 points in the second period while Oglesby was racking up 12 on a 19 yard pass from West to Bill Schraeder and on a 35 yard jaunt by West. The scoreboard reading 34-18 at halftime.

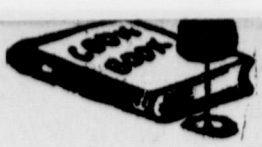

COMMEMORATIVE COIN SHOWS WHEN ME CHURCH WAS ORGANIZED

A. I. Sheppard of Gatesville has a commemorative coin of copper, about the size of a silver dollar, which shows when the Methodist Episcopal Church was organized in 1784.

At the organization, Bishop Asbury presided and also an M. Simpson, in the year 1884, 100 years later.

The coin, or medal, which is to be worn around the neck on a string or chain, is probably the only one in existence in this part of the world, Mr. Sheppard says.

The first half was one long nightmare for Gatesville. Interference in a fair catch gave Bellville the ball at the Gatesville 28 o set up the Brahmans first touch- down, and a penalty canceled a Gatesville score on the ensuing kick-off.

The Brahmans rammied for 92, 70, and 85 yards for their next three touchdowns. The 79-yard march took only two plays with Larry Wietstruck scampering the last 71 yards. The 85-yarder was a one play affair with Billy Johnson throwing to Koy for the score as time ran out in the half.

Koy capped the 28-yard Bellville march as he punched across from five yards out on the fifth play of the drive. He also got the two extra points on a run to put Bellville ahead for good at 8-0 with 6:20 left in the first quarter.

On the kickoff to Gatesville, Bob Edwards received and headed up the middle, handing off to Jerry Gilcrest on the 25.

Gilcrest swerved to the right sideline, picked up a bevy of blockers waiting there and went all the way. A clipping penalty killed the play however.

Edwards kicked dead on the Bellville eight late in the first quarter and the Hornets looked to be in good shape. But the Brahmans promptly went the 92-yards in 11 plays to score again.

A 38-yard dash by Koy was the big gainer. Lynn crashed over from a yard away for the score. And after the extra point failed, Bellville led 14-0, with 10:49 left in the second quarter.

The Hornets best showing of the first half came after Koy

ble killed the threat with only 3 minutes left in the half.

Joe Carothers, Edwards and David Bell alternated carries to propel Gatesville on its 13-play, 66-yard drive.

It was Lynn who gobbled up a Gatesville pitchout that went awry on the Brahma bl.

After Lynn got eight yards, Wietstruck rambled 71 yards for Bellville's third touchdown. Taking a pitchout to the left side, he cut back up the middle and went all the way with the nearest Hornet 15 yards behind.

Koy tossed to Lynn for two extra points with 2:14 yest before intermission for a 22-0 Bellville lead.

With only 25 seconds left in the half, Bellville took over after a Gatesville punt on its 15. On first down, Johnson threw complete to Koy on the Bellville 45 and the speedy halfback raced over the goal untouched as time ran out in the half.

Lynn booted the extra point to bring up the 29-0 halftime score.

Bellville went 69 yards in four plays early in the third quarter to pad its lead. Lynn accounted for the last 40 on a blast up the middle with 6:10 left in the third point to leave the Brahmans ahead 35-0.

After the kickoff, the Hornets got down to Bellville's 12, but again a fumble stopped them.

With a first on the 12, Lynn ripped up the middle for 88 yards on the first play to end Bellville's scoring for the night with 3:10 left in the third quarter. Again there was no extra point and the Brahmans had their 41-0 bulge.

Early in the fourth period the Hornets reached Bellville's 8-yard line, but the tough Brahma took over there on downs.

Gatesville's lone touch down drive, a 61-yarder, took eight plays. Gilcrest banged over from a yard out, and Carothers swept the right side for two extra points with 3:45 left to play for the final 41-8 count. A crowd of 6,000 was on hand at House Park.

Gatesville got close on several occasions but fumbled when the Bellville defense prevailed. The Hornets reached the Bellville 14 in the first half and drove to the Brahma 30, 13 and eight in the last half, but it wasn't until only 3:45 remained that Gatesville was able to score.

In a paradox of the statistics, Gatesville lead in first downs, 25-16, and trailed in rushing yardage by only 60 yards.

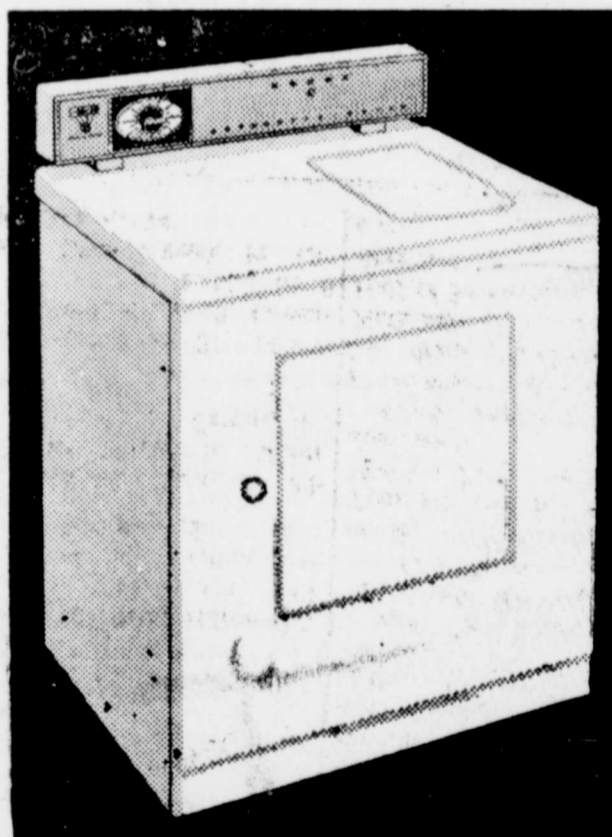
