For the first time in six seasons, winners of the Jinx Tucker Memorial Trophy for the Super Centex Football Team was a tie, Riesel 0, Gatesville 0. Each club keeps the trophy 6 months. This was at North Junior High School Auditorium at 7:00 Wednesday evening.

Riesel, coached by former Waco High School footballer, Francis Pulattie, was tied for District 24-B with Moody and Crawford. It was the first football title in the school's history. A 3-way tie.

Gatesville, coached by Al Langford, won District 17-AA, bi-district, and regional crowns, and played losing in the quarter-finals to Bellville. That was not enough!

Coach Al Langford accepted the half-bite trophy in behalf of the Hornets. Gatesville brought it home for the 1st six months.

Earlier, 25 coaches and their players and special guests were honored at a banquet by the Tribune-Herald and the Waco Quarterback Club.

Homer Norton, was the main speaker at the junior high school,

with Dave Campbedd, of the Tribune-Herald emceeing the affair and introducing Norton. The 25 players received a framed certificate with wU greets, Ronnie Stanley, Herby Adkins and Ronnie Bull presenting them.

Honored from Gatesville were Joe Carothers, Bob Edwards and Jackie Roach, and Jim Gooch winner last year, received special recognition, since sickness and injuries slowed him this season.

Norton gave 5 prerequisites for a champion and closed his talk saying: "C is for courage, H is for heart, A is for ambition, M is for man, P is for patience. I is for intelligence, O is for opportunity, and N is for nerve.

Also receiving a certificate was Cecil Newton of Copperas Cove Bulldogs.

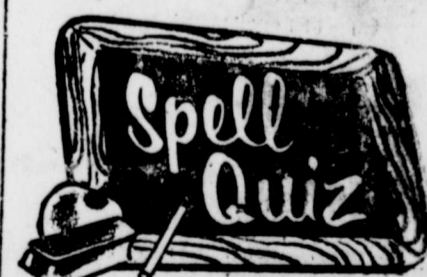

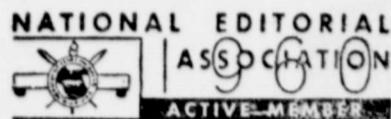

Prince Edward Islanders Favor Cherry and Cranberry Desserts

Cherries and cranberries seem to share honors as the main ingredients for desserts on Prince Edward Island, Canada's "Garden of the Gulf."

Mrs. S. W. Logan, whose husband, Sidney, is division freight agent for the Canadian National Railways at Charlottetown, the lovely little historic city where the Canadian nation was "born" back in 1864, has two favorite dessert recipes which involve the use of cherries and cranberries.

Here is how Mrs. Logan makes

Cherry Red-Hot

1 cup package biscuit mix OR
1/2 cup sugar 2 tablespoons
1 cup flour 1/2 shortening
2 teaspoons 1/2 tsp. salt
baking powder 1/2 cup milk

Mix above ingredients as for biscuits. Add 1 cup drained canned cherries or pitted fresh sour cherries cooked or uncooked, and 1 cup milk to the dry ingredients. If package biscuit mix is used, stir in enough milk to make a stiff dough—approximately 1/2 cup. Spread biscuit dough in greased 10" x 6" x 2" or 8" x 8" x 2" pan.

Mix together 1 1/4 cups cherry juice and water mixed, 2 tablespoons butter or margarine and 1 cup sugar. Heat to boiling point and pour over dough. Bake at 375° F. for 30 minutes. Dough will rise through syrup as it bakes. Serve hot or warm with milk or light cream. 6 servings.

Cranberry Crunch

1 cup quick-cook-
ing oatmeal 1/2 cup coconut
1/2 cup brown 1/2 cup butter
sugar 2 cups cranberry
1/2 cup sifted all-
purpose flour 1 tablespoon
lemon juice

Mix oatmeal, sugar, flour and coconut. Cut in butter until crumbly. Place half ingredients in to 8 inch square greased baking pan. Cover with cranberry sauce and lemon juice. Combine. Top with remaining half. Bake 40 minutes in 350° to 375° oven. Cool. Cut in squares, or serve hot with vanilla ice cream.

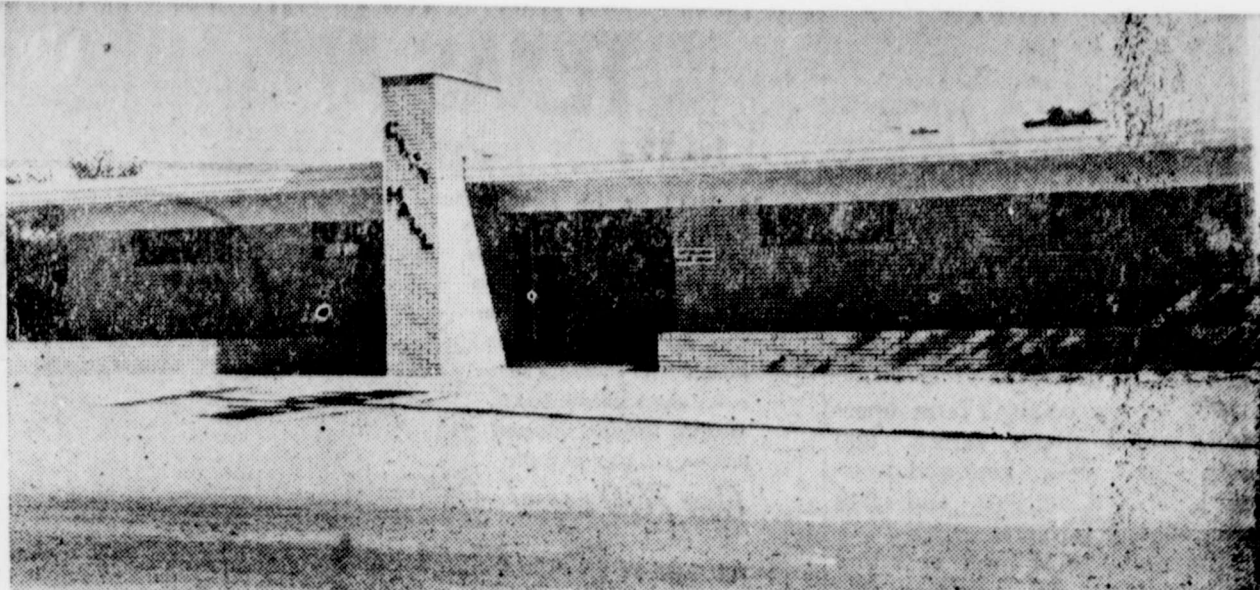

Copperas Cove opened their new \$12,000 City Hall at 509 S. Main Street Saturday afternoon, November 12.

The building has 1920 square feet of floor space and is 36x60, brick veneer, asphalt tile floors, fully insulated, completely heated and air-conditioned, and bank-type cashier fixtures in the front office.

The offices are made up of the City tax office, the water department office, a billing room, rest rooms, a 16x26 foot city library and a 16x26 Council room. The library, sponsored by the Cove Garden Club, has some 3200 books.

HELEN POE TO VISIT EVANT SCHOOL

Helen Poe will visit Evant School later on in the year. She will also visit Gatesville at the same time.

Helen Poe has spent eleven summers in Europe which gives her opportunities few people have; to see and evaluate firsthand, what is happening in our world today. From that fateful year of 1939, when she saw Adolph Hitler deliver a high-pitched tirade at Nuremberg and viewed Mussolini standing on a balcony to address a throng in the square at Rome, Helen Poe has had a consuming interest in what is happening in the world.

Helen was a college student when she saw Hitler and Mussolini. Ten years later, she was one of the first American women to see the disaster and ruin brought about by these dictators. As a guest of United Nations Personnel, she retraced her steps and made her own vivid comparisons.

Since 1949 she has continued her journeys to see the other forces at work in the world by making the following travels:

- 1949: Ruins of Hitler and Mussolini; Russian occupied territory.
 - 1951: Continental Europe
 - 1952: Spain and North Africa
 - 1953: Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II and British Isles.
 - 1954: Europe and North Africa
 - 1955: Middle East, Scandinavia, and Greece
 - 1956: Yugoslavia, Greece and Europe.
 - 1957: The Orient: Japan, Hong Kong, Thailand, India, Pakistan, Iran, Syria, Lebanon, and Middle East.
 - 1958: Russia, Poland, Czechoslovakia, and the Mediterranean
 - 1959: Middle East, Greece, Yugoslavia, Rumania, Hungary, Poland and Western Europe.
 - 1960: Around the World.
- The speech given by Helen Poe in Lampasas on Monday

night, November 21 will be played by tape recording to the grades 7-12 in assembly on Dec-13 at 1:45. All parents are invited to come and hear this tape recording of the speech. We believe that everyone will enjoy hearing this tape. Please come!

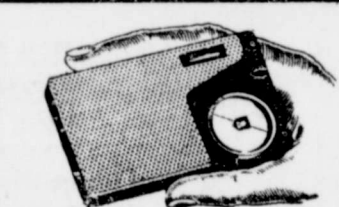

The '59 Census of Agriculture, conducted in Coryell County last fall, counted 1,315 farms, the preliminary report of the Bureau of the Census, USDC shows. Total land in farms was 646,296 acres, and the average size farm was 491.1 acres, and average value of farms and buildings was \$31,963.

759 of the county's farm operators owned their farms, 300 owned part of the land and rented additional acreage and 249 were tenant farmers.

Average age of farm operators was 53 years, and there were 266 65 or more years of age. Of the 1,316 farms, 800 were commercial farms. For a dime, 10c you can get statistics on crops, livestock, equipment, etc., from Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C.

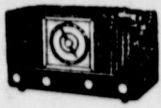

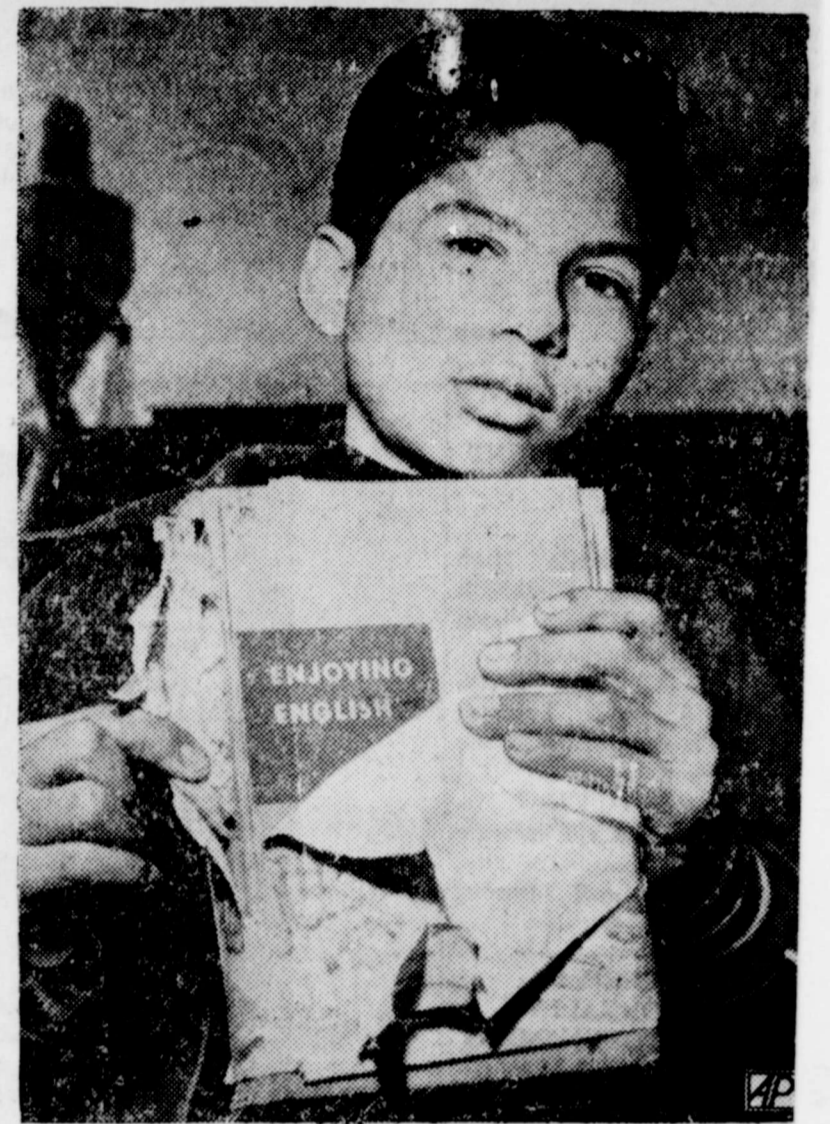

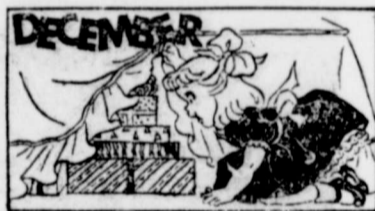
