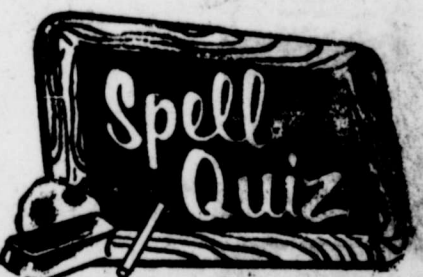

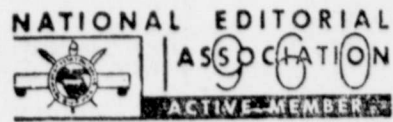

FO-BITS FOR RIDE**

The Moscow Camden & San Augustine Railroad rumbles daily except Saturday and Sunday — 14 miles through the piney woods of East Texas. Its passengers pay 50 cents for the trip.

The No. 1 mixed train leaves Camden at 10:40 a. m. and proceeds westward seven miles to Moscow at the orderly pace of 14 miles per hour.

Then it returns to Camden tail-first. There is a turntable at Moscow, but the engine doesn't fit it.

The MC&SA is probably the last railroad in the U. S. operating a year-round mixed train (one that carries both freight and passengers).

The line was built in 1898 and except for having to slow down now and then when it crosses U. S. Highway 59, is run pretty much the same way as then.

The train is pulled by that most soul satisfying form of motive power—the steam locomotive

and helped build the Panama Canal.

She's a shiny little Mogul type with a tall stack and old-fashioned square steam chests.

And when you hear her lonesome whistle down the tall corridors of the pines, it makes you want to cry, even in broad daylight.

At Moscow, the MC&SA connects with the "high iron" or the Southern Pacific which, for all its 152 pound rails and 50-mile-an-hour diesels, carries, alas, no passengers.

Camden, off in the woods of Polk County is a lumber town. The W. T. Carter was one of the early day lumbering giants. He built the town and the railroad the same year. Up until 1955 the Carter lumber railroad system poked 40 miles or more of iron pike into the surrounding woods.

Now the Carter roads have been jerked up, leaving only the rusting ghosts of the Carter locomotives.

Train time at Camden is still an occasion. The engine spends the early morning snorting and shuffling along the sidings at the mill. Thirty minutes before de-

partes in front of the big, wooden general store of the W. T. Carter outfit.

The store stands three stories high behind a taller false front. Between the porch and the rails of the MC&SA is a dirt lane which is Main Street for Camden.

Everybody in Camden works for the company, but there are always a few spectators — silent Coushatta Indians from the nearby reservation, company wives or kids down to see the train off.

"No tickets. Just give me your money," says conductor Carl Vincent as you board.

The passenger conveyance is a wooden combine coach which the Long Island Railroad thought it had worn out when the MC&SA got it in 1927. It's a flaky red color with indications that the roof once was green. The ghost of the former ownership — the words "Long Island Railroad" shows through the remaining paint.

Built, like the railroad, in 1898 the coach has its original rattan seats and the big tanks and gauges used with the old carbide lighting system.

Railroad historian Lucius Beeb says it once hauled commuters be-

tween Bay Shore and Montauk Point. Fancy frosted glass in the windows lets us know that all has not always been branch line and backwoods.

For a seven-mile railroad you have to hunt to find the MC&SA has a slew of passengers.

"Two thousand the first eight months of this year," conductor Vincent says. "Whole schoolbus load of kids come down to ride behind a steam engine. Lots of people drive a hundred miles out of the way. We've had this old coach plumb full this year."

Leaving Camden, the train proceeds at a nice lazy wallow up a 2.5 per cent hill just out of town, then plunges immediately into the lonely grandeur of the pines.

The right of way is unfenced, there are only two sandy ruts of roads which cross the rails. Pole Cat Curve, a long easy tangent, is the only kink in the line.

The streams run clear under the trestles and a blue-water lake is populated with white herons which hardly bother to rise into the air when engineer Earl Amerine blows his whistle.

Amerine, unfettered by main line regulations, is a real whistle artist. He makes his sad notes hang in the air, pushing one sound out with another, then lets the melody chuckle in the whistle's throat. Is there a sweeter sound in America, you ask yourself, than a talking whistle?

The only house near the right of way furnishes a gaggle of kids who stand by the tracks, waiting for conductor Vincent to throw out a handful of candy as he passes.

The town of Moscow is behind the hill from the station. The MC&SA crew told us rather bitterly that the SP kept an agent there for 79 years, closing the quaint little gothic structure only in September.

Moscow, a town which dates back to the Republic of Texas was the end if the line for the narrow gauge Houston East and West Texas (Hell Either Way Taken) before it was extended to Shreveport, converted to standard gauge and bought by the SP.

The return to Camden, backing, is faster because the load is mainly empties. On some days, the Carter store gets a load of shampoo, toothpaste and other sudsy packages.

The front porch of the store serves as the unloading dock. C. F. Purdue, the auditor, traffic manager and assistant superintendent comes over from the tiny white station at Camden to check the load.

His wife runs the station and

handles the billing. The waiting rooms, closet size have been boarded up. Passengers now wait on the porch or in the air-conditioned drug store.

The town is down for the return trip too. A sign near the tracks warns, "No Parking Between Here and the Porch. You might get nudged by a locomotive."

The loungers on the porch exchange remarks with the trainmen as they unload packages. Beside Amerine and Vincent there is reliever O. T. Sowell and fireman Sethy Barnes — the latter an immense Negro man of dignified gait and proportions.

Add the big steep-roofed white house just across the tracks from the store, frame the whole thing in cottonwoods, and you've got 1910 every way but the calendar.

A fit setting for the last train to yesterday.

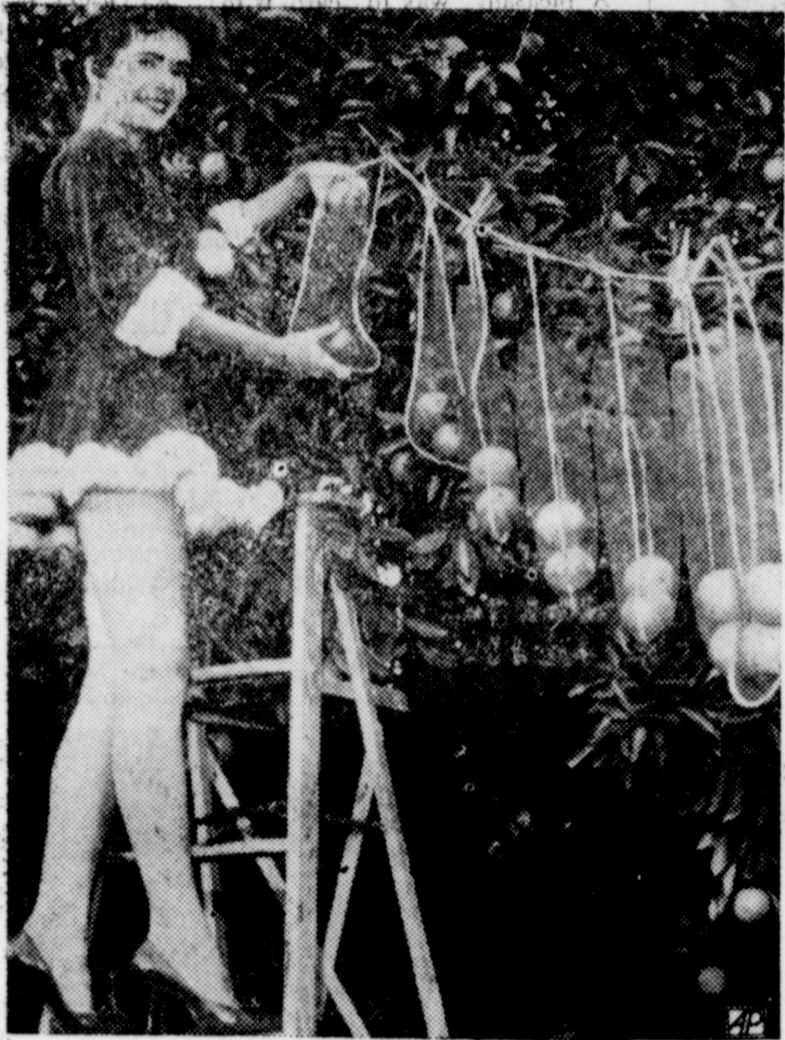

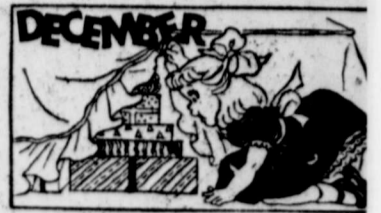

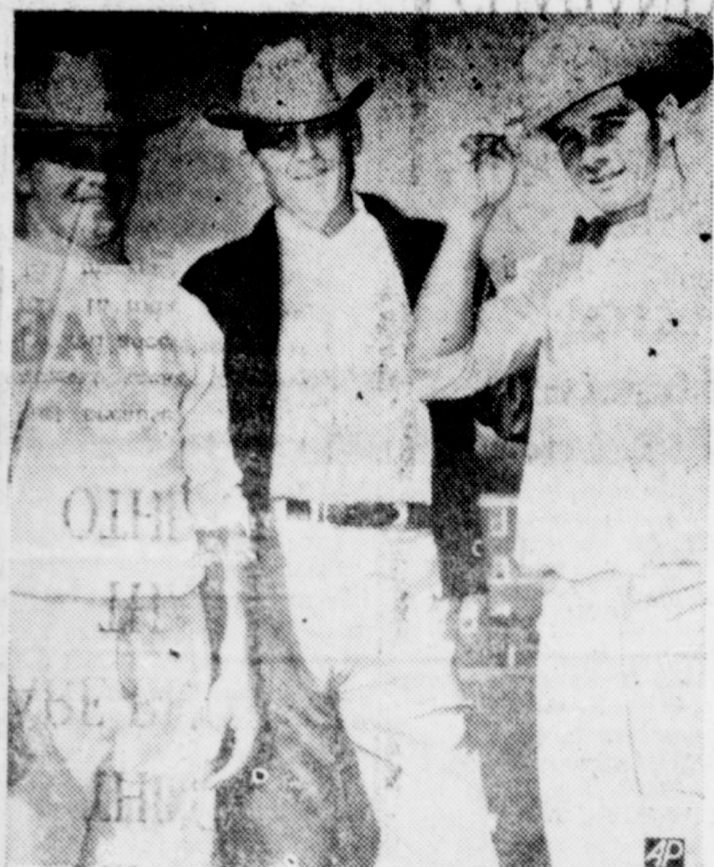
