last railroad in the U. S. operatlast railroad in the U. S. operat-
ing a year-round mixed train (one that carries both freight and passengers).
The line was built in 1898 and except for having to slow down
now and then when it crosses $U$. now and then when it crosses $U$.
$S$. Highway 59 , is run pretty S. Highway 59, is rūn pretty much the same way as then.
The train is pulled by that most soul satisfying form of motive power- the steam locomotive
and helped build the Panama Ca nal.
She's a shiny little Mogul type with a tall stack and old-fashion ed square steam chests.
And when you hear her lonesome whistle down the tall corridors of the pines, it makes yo light. At Moscow, the MC\&SA con nects with the "high iron" or the Southern Pacific which, for all its 152 pound rails and 50 -mile-anhour diesels, carries, alas, no pas engers.
