





DOES IT MATTER?

neck is too valuable to risk under the sword of such a ask the life of a lowly widow? mighty warrior as Goliath"?

Would it have mattered? What if Abraham had said, "Ask anything, but do not ask the life of my son Isaac"?

What if Esther had said, dare not face King Ahasuerus, for he will destroy me"?

What if the lowly widow had said. "Elijah shall not have the little measure of meal and oil which stands between my son and me and starvation"?

Who would have blamed any of them for refusal under their circumstances, and would it really have mattered if they had acted otherwise? Does it matter how you act in your circumstances of life?

We know the great spiritual significance of Abraham's willingness to kill his own son in obedience to God. We know the course of the history of the physical world would have been changed if Coliath had slain David. Esther's decision was in behalf of a great people. Per-haps, more than they realized it, we now realize the significance to others of their decisions. But did it really matter? Couldn't it have been worked out some other way?

What if David had said, "My lived or died made no difference historically or otherwise. Why Did it really matter that much?

If life matters, it matters what we do about our call from God.



The United States Post Office is quietly studying possible action on the anti-monopoly front which if it takes action, could go a long way into alleviating one vicious situation.

It would be quite humorous, toe, if the Post Office, not charged with enforcing anti trust laws. did an area in which the Federal Trade Com-

In the constant drive of a few big packers and manufacturers to eliminate regional competition, bigger competitions for prizes are being launched.

If the winners are determined largely by chance, then it is against postal regulations for magazines, other publications entering the mails to carry the details on a game of chance.

Now if the makers of Crunchies decide they have fooled around with local competitors long enough and now is the time to drive them off the retail shelves, they might very well dream up a contest with huge prizes given to those who send in to them, with a box top, in 25 words or less, stating "I like Crunchies because . .

Now first of all, it is hard to imagine any manufacturer paying for the manhours necessary to carefully evaluate a million entries. But this factor

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


