GATESVILLE'S LONE FACTORY MOVING PLANT TO WACO

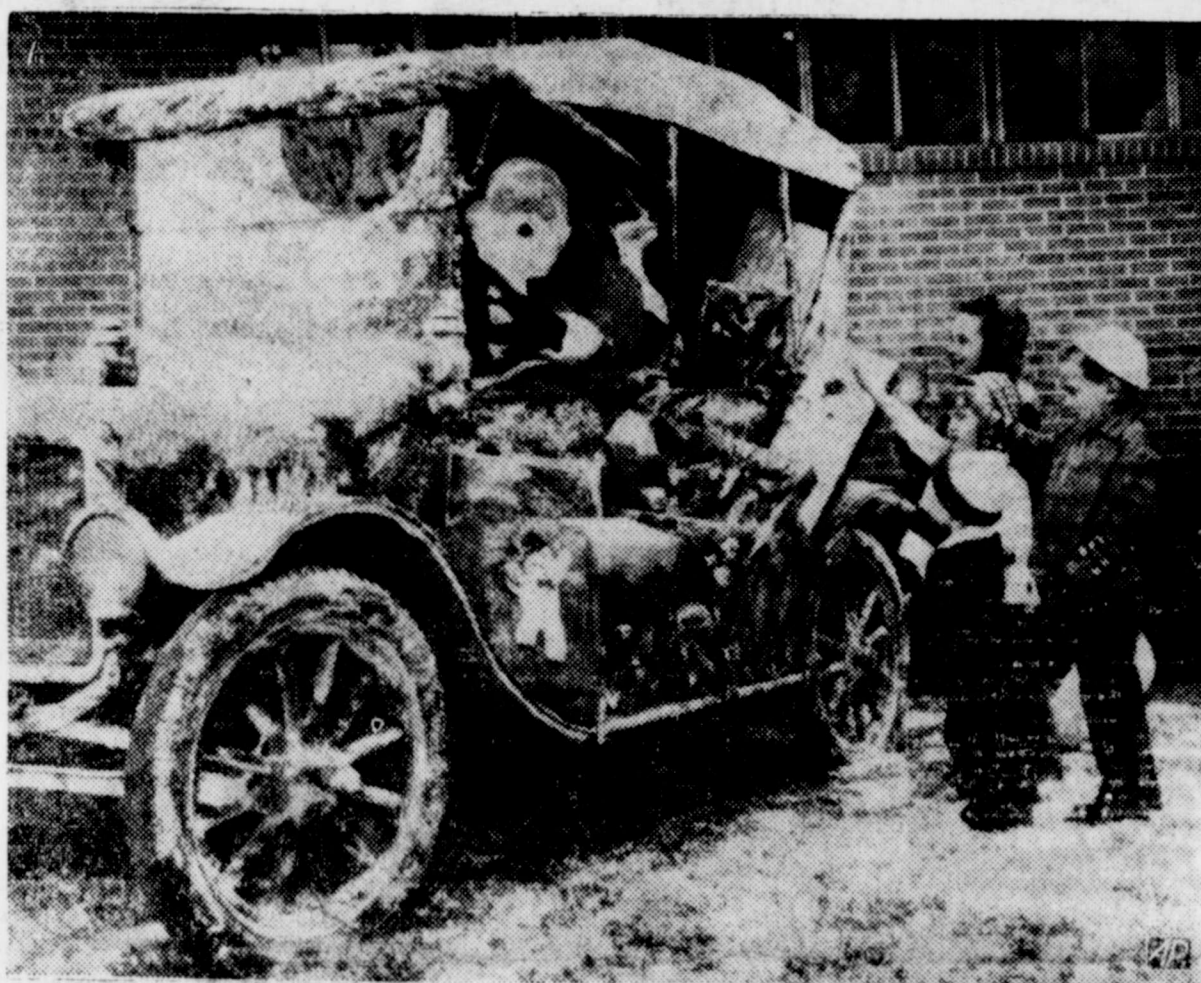
Gatesville lone factory, ither than what's been here forever, is being moved to Waco.

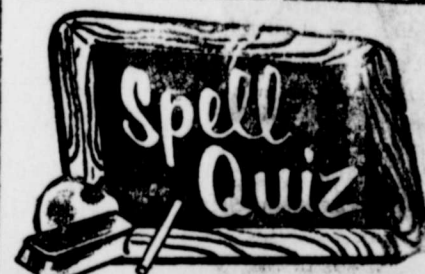

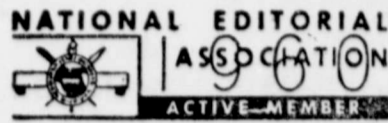

Between assemblies, the circuit director visits each congregation in Central Texas to spend one week giving Bible instruction and training in the ministry carried on by the witnesses.

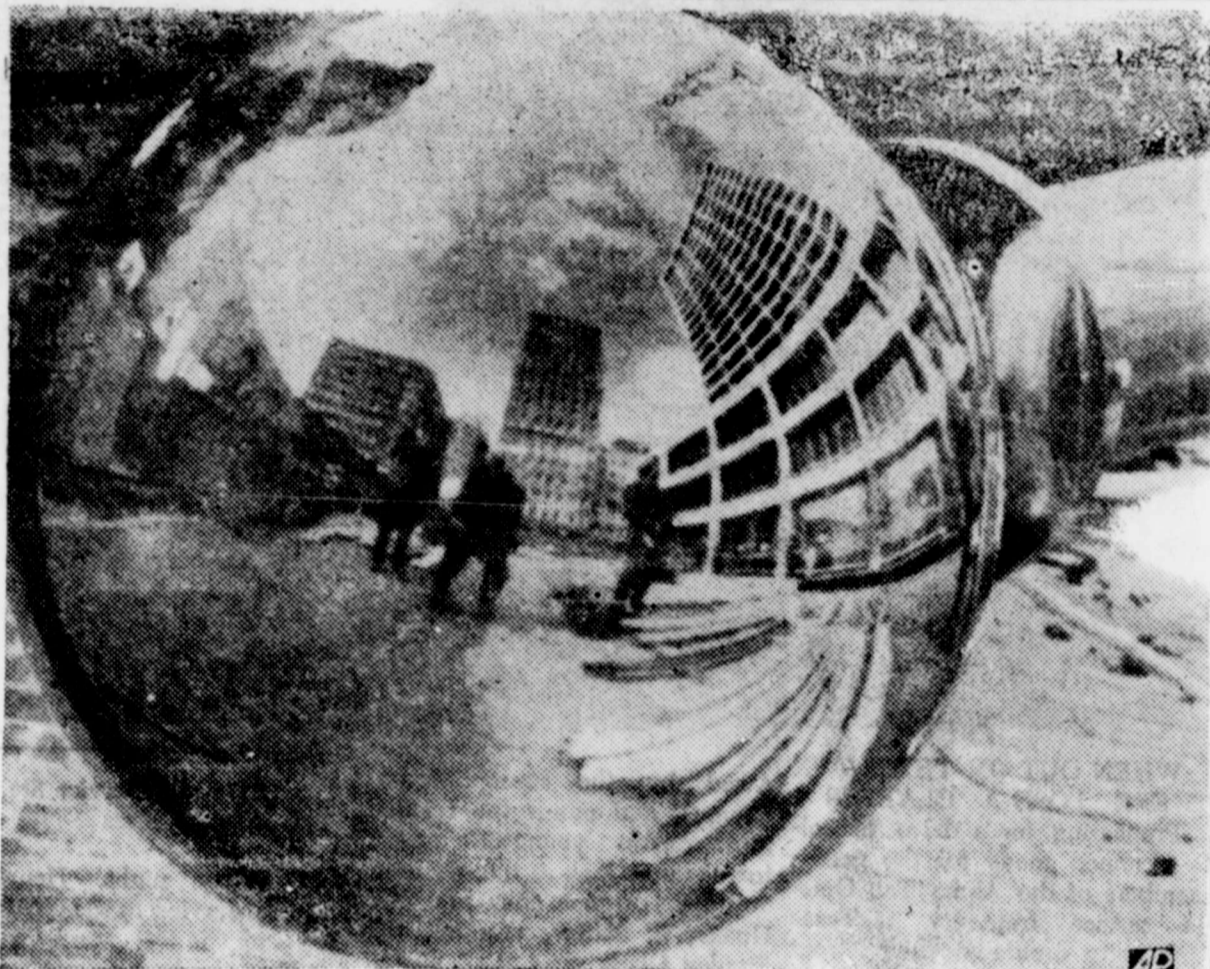
MIKE BRATTON QUITS AS DEPUTY SHERIFF

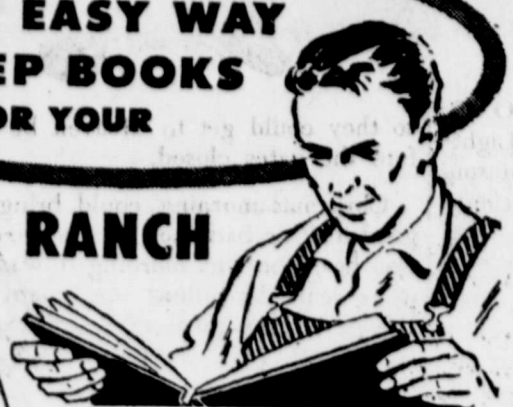

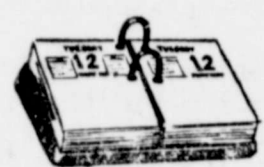

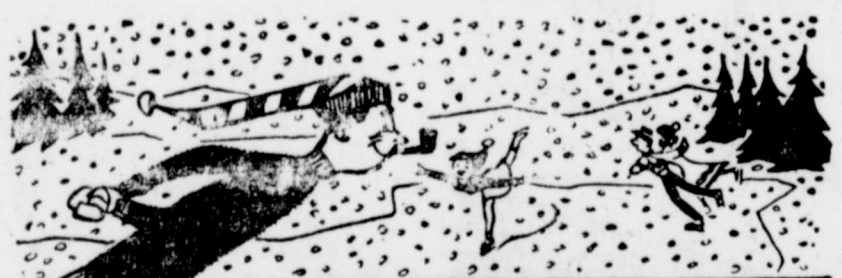

SUPERSTITIONS OF CHRISTMAS

Legends and superstitions are part of every theme of Christmas today. There are tales about yule logs, Christmas decorations, legends of carols and Christmas hymns and even superstitions of animals and trees at Christmas.

One belief was that as the hour of Christ's birth approaches, all the cattle fall on their knees and honor Him. Many people saw this happen, and even though we today know cattle always rise hind feet first, with front knees still on the ground, it still makes a beautiful story.

Also, at this hour there was a widespread idea that oxen were able to speak. Many people have heard the oxen talking, but the listeners never heard anything good of themselves.

An old Irish superstition says that at midnight on Christmas the gates of Heaven open, so anyone who dies can go straight to Paradise without entering purgatory first. Often, if people were dying, but friends or relatives thought the sick might last until after midnight, they were "helped along"

so they could get to Heaven before the gates closed.

Christmas morning could bring good luck or bad luck for the cow was heard on this morning it was ming year, depending on many things. If the chirp of a cricket considered good luck just as to bring anything made of leather into the house was considered unlucky. A woman or girl entering the house first was bad luck and a dark-haired boy meant more good luck than a fair-haired lad. Young girls approaching marriageable age could learn a little about their future husband. On

Christmas morning she would knock on the door of a pig sty. If an old hog grunted first her husband would be an old man; but if a young pig squealed her husband would be young.

It used to be believed every Christmas a number of angels were sent from Heaven to waken an infant from its first sleep so it could be taken to Paradise to sing a carol in honor of the Christ Child.

These superstitions, the pretty and the fanciful alike, are antiquated today but they still make for interesting story telling

thrilling game because the lead exchanged quite a few times between the teams. Finally the Wildcats took the lead and kept it, but not by such a great margin as before.

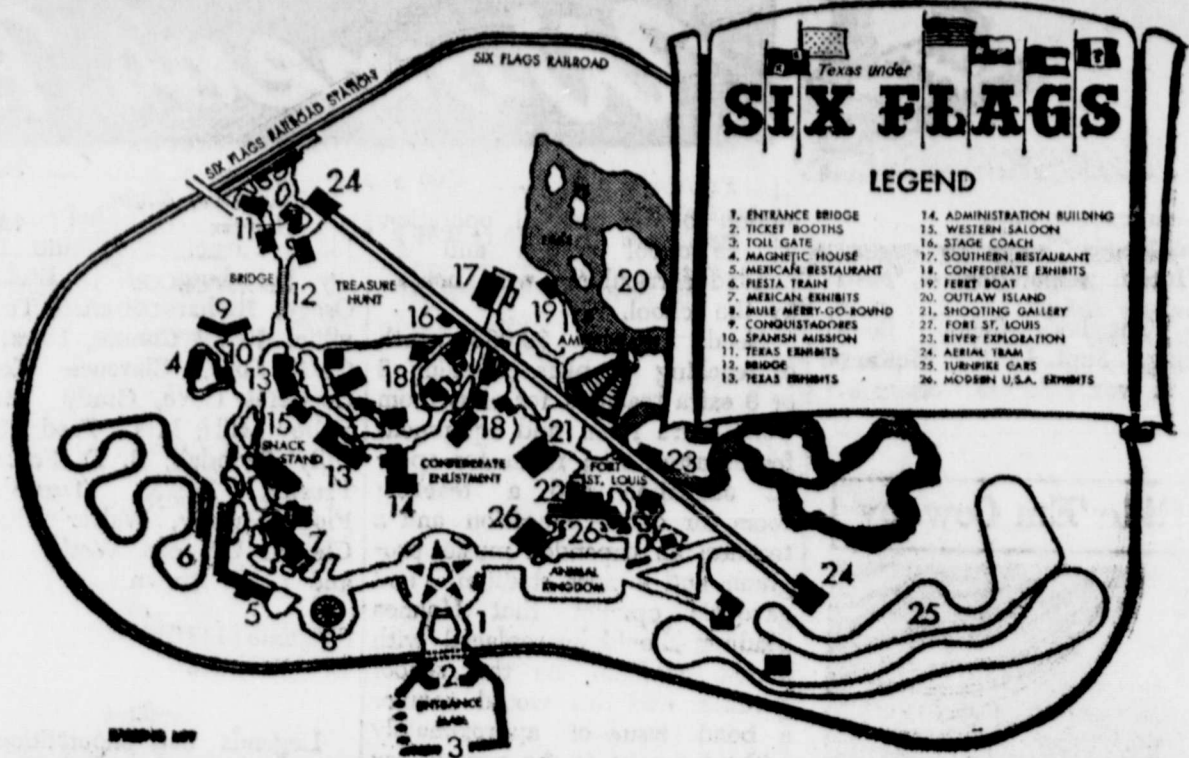

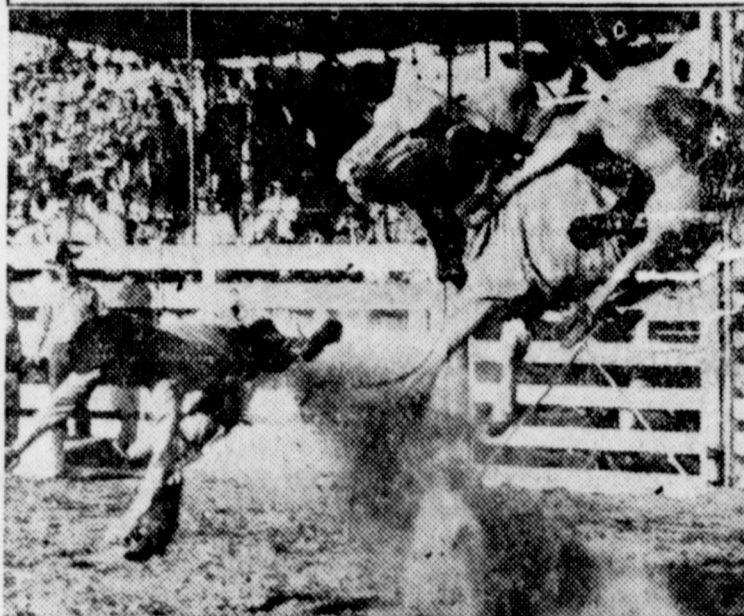

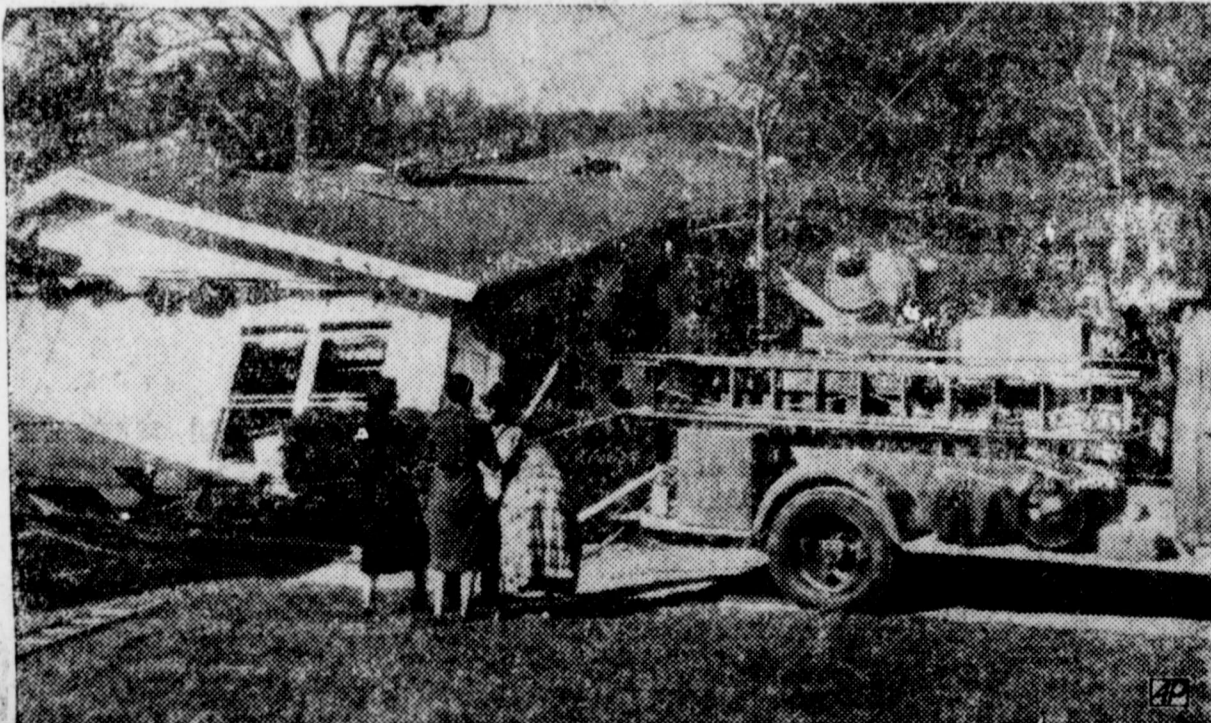
