## \$94,000 ON BETTERMENT OF HIGHWAYS TO BE SPENT IN COUNTY IN 1961

District Highway Engineer Thomas C. Collier, Waco, has announced approved expenditure of \$94,000 for highway safety and betterment in Coryell County in 1961.

55.9 highway miles in the county will be involved, under the supervision of Paul T. Hensler, Senior Resident Engineer and Richard B. Brookshire, Senior Maintenance Foreman.

Coryell County projects, all level up and seal coat, include: FM 183, US 84 South to Bee House, 10.2 miles.

FM 929, St. 36 to Coryell City 10.5 miles.

FM 932, US 84 to Hamilton County Line. 8 miles

FM 1241, Hamilton County Line to FM 932 at Purnela, 6.2 miles.

St. 36, from 6 miles Southwest of Gatesville to Bell County Line 12.5 miles.

US 84, from .7 miles west of Arnett to Leon River Bridge at Gatesville, 8.5 miles.

The entire state program, totaling \$40 million is a "housekeeping" program keyed to safety features and proper upkeep and are divided financially thruout the state with \$20 million to be spent on US and State Highway System and \$20 million for FM Road System; in 224 counties, 2,799 miles of US and State Highways and 3,686 miles of FM

## FIERY WRECK FATAL TO GATESVILLE NATIVE IN CRASH NEAR SINTON

Ammon (Red) Dyess, 45, of 1215 E. Colvin was burned to death Wednesday morning after his oil transport truck collided with another truck, then burst into flames near Sinton.

The Texas Highway Patrol reported the accident occurred 3 miles south of Sinton on Highway 77 shortly after 5 a. m. Driver of the other truck, Wilbern Martens, of Victoria, escaped injury.

Martens was attempting to pass the oil truck when the collision occurred, the Highway Patrol said. After the trucks stopped, the oil transport exploded. It was owned by Smith Transit Co., Inc., of Irving and Dallas for whom Dyess worked 13 years.

Dyess, a native of Gatesville, had lived in Ft. Worth 11 years.

Surviving are his wife; his mother, Mrs. Pearl Dyess, Gatesville; 2 sisters, Mrs. Harriet Caylor, Austin and Mrs. Mary Haynes of Garden City, Kan., and 4 brothers, Leland, Gatesville, Ezra Big Spring, Bob of Seguin and Marvin Dyess of Roswell, N. Mex.

Early Thursday, funeral arrangements had not been announced. Shannon's of Fort Worth were to announce the arrangements.

**CHRISTMAS HOME-COMING**

JAKE YANCY took no part in the holiday merriment on the train. His ears, long accustomed to prison silence, resented the gay chatter of the youngsters going home for Christmas. Even their gaiety annoyed him. For his plans were of a different kind.

With a puzzled frown, he followed her into the living room. Milly, he noted, appeared worn

"Where's Big Ben?" he said. "Oh," she said, putting a hand to her forehead. "Then you don't know. Big Ben passed away last Sunday . . . drank himself to death."

"It was the news that you were innocent, Jake." She spoke softly. "He started drinking the day the news came that another man confessed the bank robbery. He felt terribly remorseful for

Jake shook his head. "Of course not, Milly. Besides what's done is done. And this is Christmas." He smiled and walked out into the cool, crisp evening.

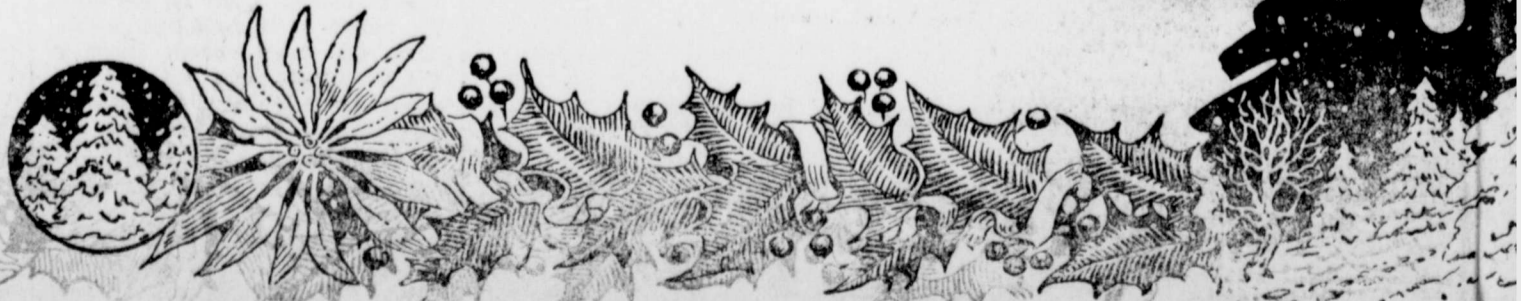
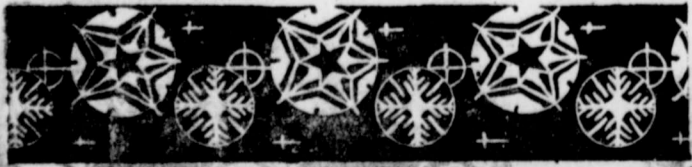

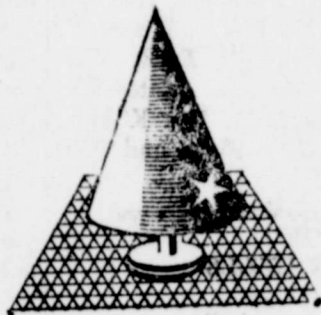

### LEGENDS OF CHRISTMAS BELLS

In olden times bells were considered to be almost human. They were said to have the power to ward off enemies and evil spirits and stave off storms. They were given names of Saints and baptised at elaborate ceremonies.

Many people believed if church bells were not baptised, they would have no power and harm could come to them. Supposedly, two bells, not baptised, were stolen by the Devil and drowned in a pond. The only time they were heard ringing was at Christmas.

Another story tells of a very sinful town in Holland where Christ walked the streets in the form of a beggar. He asked for food and shelter, but the townspeople, being very wicked, laughed and made fun of Him So Christ sent great waves to cover the whole town; but on Christmas Eve the sound of church bells could be heard coming from the exact spot where the village once stood.

In many countries it was customary to ring the biggest bell as if for a funeral, for one hour during midnight. It was called "tolling the Devil's knell" At the end of this hour all the little bells were merrily rung. This meant that the Devil had died and at midnight Christ was born.

In Germany, an old belief is that bells that had been buried in the ground during the war for safe keeping could be heard ringing on Christmas Eve by all who listened with the right faith.

So this year, as in many pasts, the joyous pealing of bells at Christmas will ring the rejoicing news to all mankind that the Christ is born in Bethlehem.

### CHRISTMAS IN OTHER LANDS

#### IRELAND . . .

The people of Ireland have a wonderful custom at Christmas. Candles are lighted and placed in every window of the house on Christmas evening. All doors are left open. This custom is symbolic of the Irish hospitality for anyone seeking shelter. The candles burn all night long.

#### CHINA . . .

On Christmas eve in China, the people dress in their finest, parade up and down the narrow winding streets carrying lanterns and singing. At midnight, this singing is stopped by sudden bursts of fire-crackers, announcing mass.

Chinese children call their tree the "Tree of Light" and it is decorated with beautiful paper flowers, cotton snow flakes and other paper decorations.

#### NORWAY . . .

One of the most interesting customs of Christmas in foreign lands is that of Norway, remembering the animals and birds in celebration of the birth of Christ. Gleaned sheaf saved from the harvest in the fall, is placed on top of a tall pole in the yard. Every gateway and door is decorated with a bundle of grain for the bird's Christmas dinner.

#### GREECE . . .

Christmas, in Greece, is a time of family reunions, parties and merrymaking. Stories and old legends and folklore are eagerly

awaited by the children as the traditional fried cakes are baked for the feast.

A legend, burning old shoes, is said to have driven away the mysterious half-human, half-monster beings who wander about for twelve days before Christmas, spreading mischief. A cross, entwined with sprigs of basil, is dipped in a vessel of Holy Water by village priests and each room in the house is sprinkled to make the "beings" disappear.

#### SYRIA . . .

Christmas Day, in the Holy Land, is observed mostly in the home with prayer and quietude. Young people, in beautiful costumes, go from door, singing. In return, they receive small coins,

sweets and other delicacies. Many Syrians travel to Bethlehem to attend midnight services on Christmas eve. A bonfire of vine stems is built in each church in memory of the Christmas birth occasion. BELGIUM . . . In Antwerp, worshippers are called to services by the chiming of ninety-nine bells in the five-hundred-year-old cathedral of the city. A colorful procession of carol-

singing children precede the services, followed by priests in jeweled robes. The procession walks on a carpet of flowers and bright pieces of paper. Christmas is truly a season of gifts and joy in Belgium every year. BRAZIL . . . The Christmas season is observed in Brazil with an open air mass at Midnight on Christmas Eve. An altar is constructed in the open church yard around

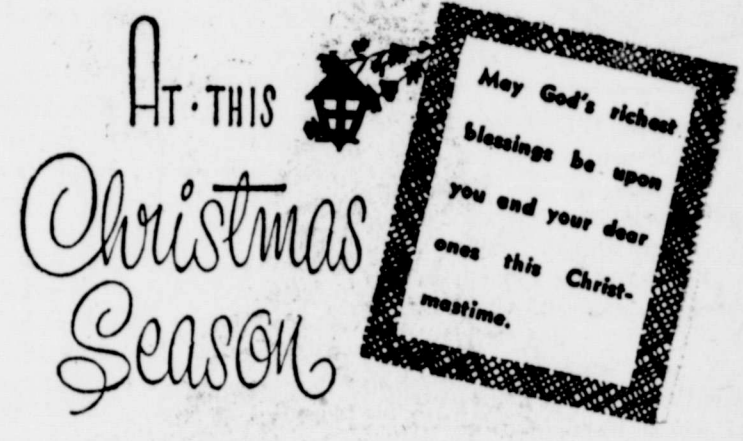

## WORKING WITH WOOD

Weathering of Wood

The weathering of wood is brought about through the combined effects of rain, wind and light. Weathering can result in color changes, roughening and checking of the surface, and in warping if boards are exposed for long periods without protective coatings. Wood which has been weathered assumes a grayish color, often

with an attractive silvery sheen. All species of wood tend to warp and split when weathered. Lumber subjected to weathering conditions should have a thickness no less than one-eighth the board width.

Surface roughening of exposed wood results from the difference in the hardness of the springwood and summerwood. The springwood, or early wood, is characterized by a cell structure having large cavities and thin walls. This is lighter in weight, weaker and softer than the thicker walled summerwood. Consequently the springwood weathers more rapidly than the summerwood. Consequently, the springwood weathers more rapidly than summerwood.

Erosion, or wearing away of the wood, is very slight and of no importance. By contrast, corrosion of metals and rusting is serious consideration in the use of unprotected metals under outdoor conditions.

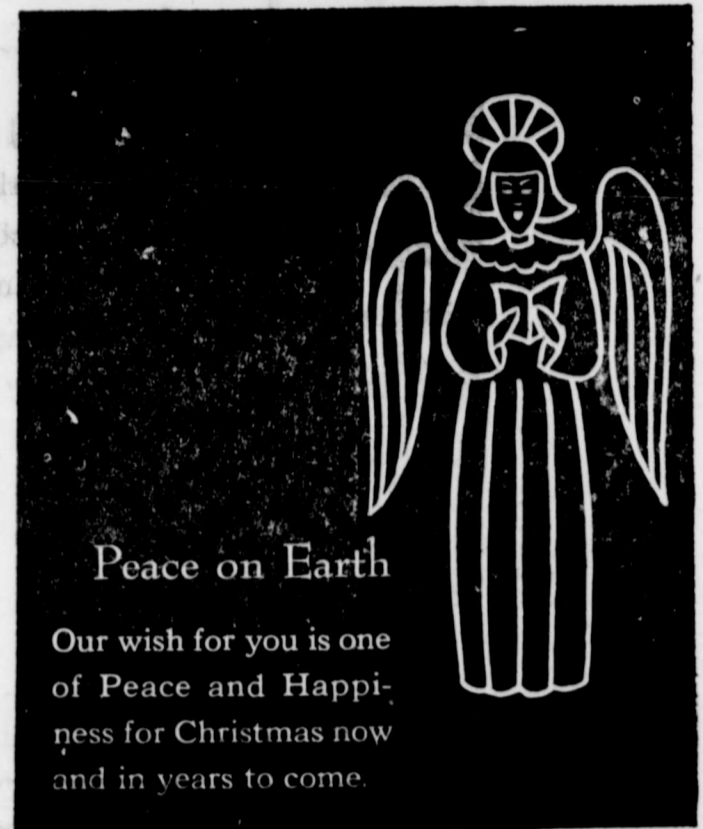

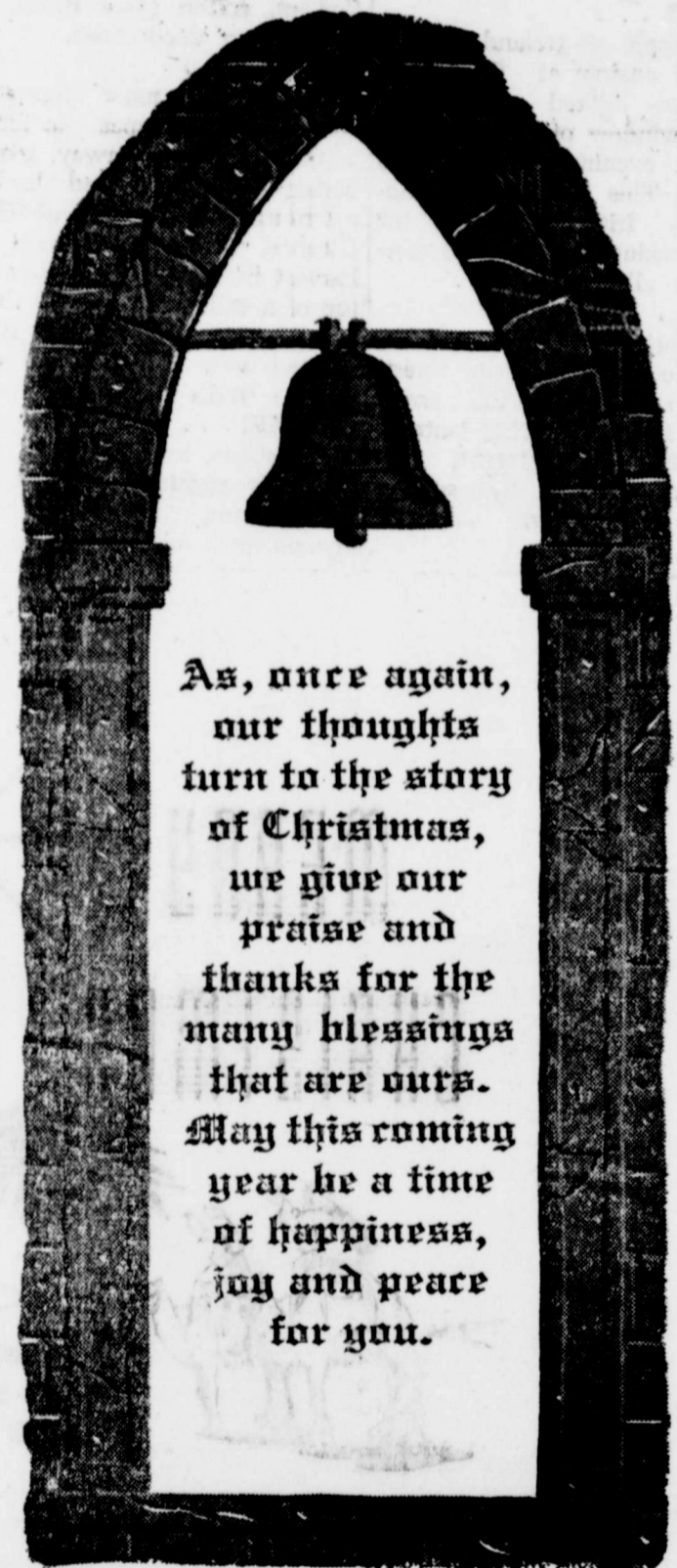

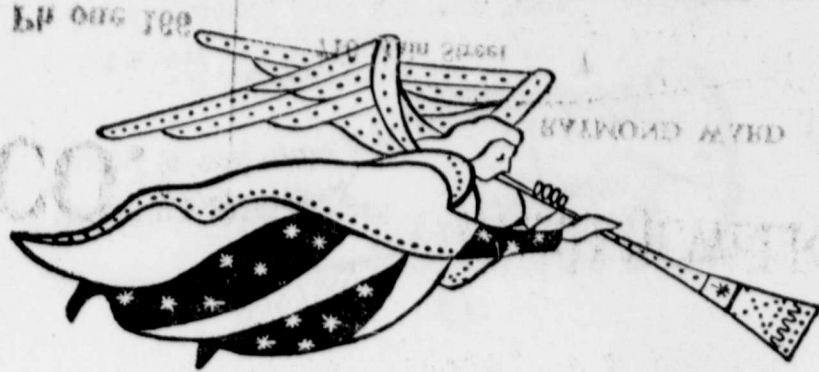
