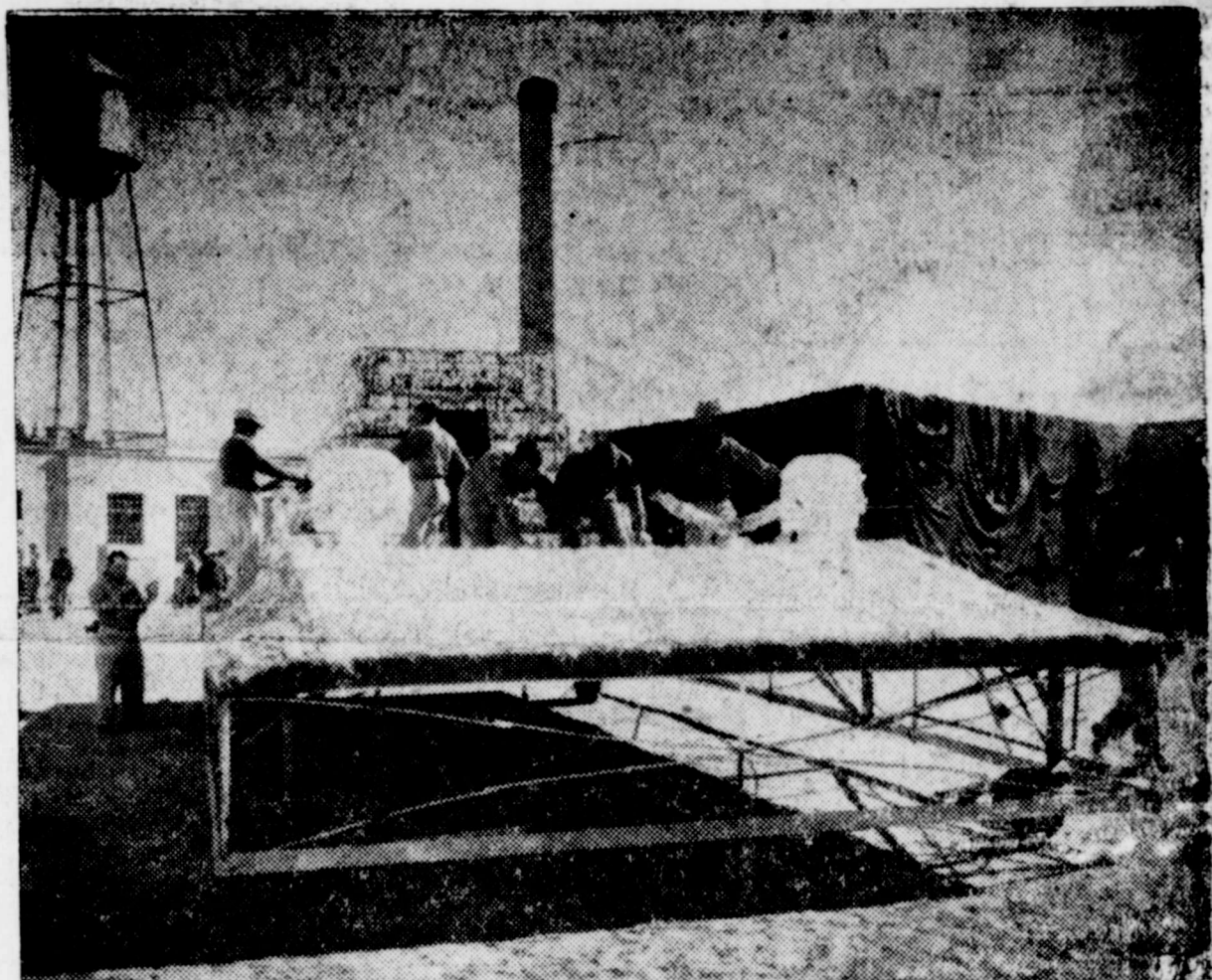

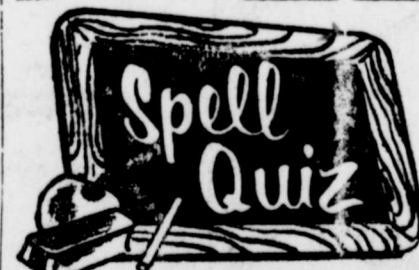

Four appropriate contest-games were played. Mrs. Albert Ledeham was high-scorer winning two of the four contests.

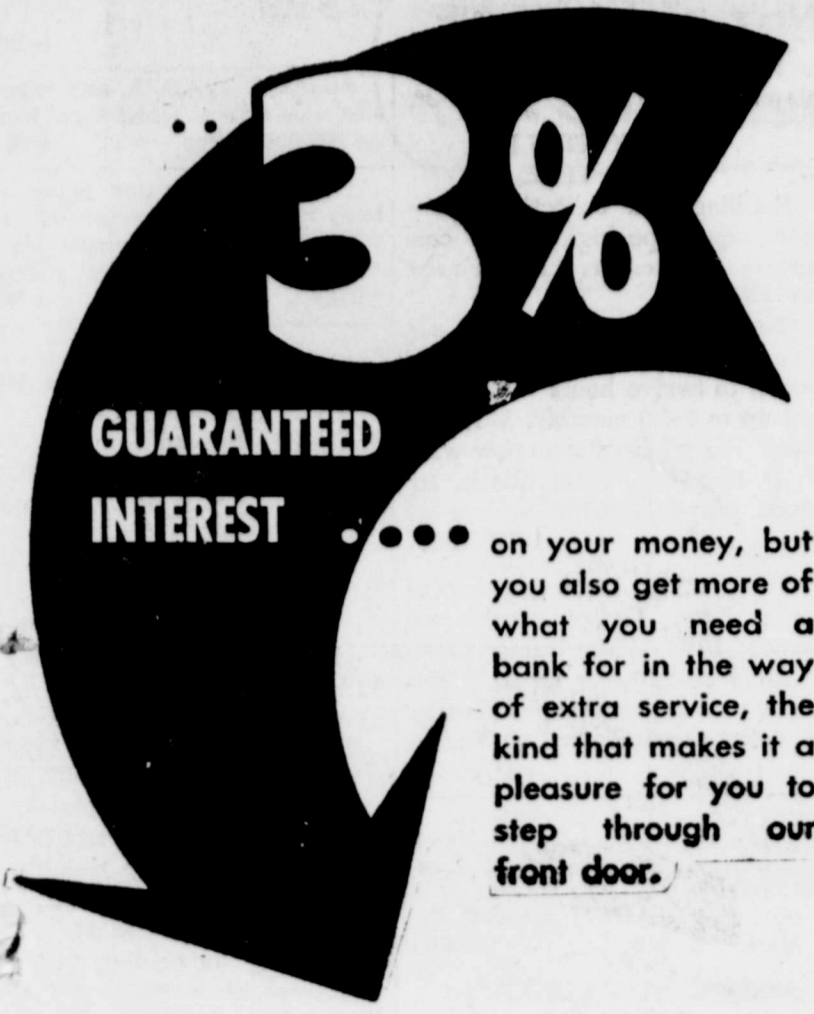
