**REP. LEAVERTON TELLS WHAT HAPPENED IN LEGISLATURE**

The Coryell County News has received a letter for publication from the Honorable H. A. Leaverton, State Representative from this District. Here it is:

Perhaps it is appropriate that I make a report on the Legisla- tive situation at Austin. For brevity, I will write four letters on different phases of that situa- tion as follows:

1. What actually happened
2. Some pertinent facts
3. The difficulty
4. The present thinking of your representative

**WHAT ACTUALLY HAPPENED**

It is conceded, I think, that the 57th Legislature worked hard. Resolutions and Bills In- troduced: SJR 25; HJR 83; SB 480; HB 1146.

Resolutions and Bills Passed: SJR 8; HJR 6; SB 235; HB 314.

Committee hearings, general- ly, were long and painstaking. Many bad bills were weeked out but some of the more important were passed to the floor for fur- ther consideration tho opposed by the committee. Only a few bills can be named; we mention:

Appropriation of each body, Hale-Aikin, Old Age Amendment ifplemented. Creating Saving & Loan Dept. & Commissioner, Exempted from taxation dwell- ing of Ministers, Uniform Nar- cotic Drug Act Amendment, Com- mercial Fertilizer Act, Regulated Sale and Manufacture of Food, drugs, etc., Redistricted State for Senate and Representatives, Leg- islative Re-organization Act, Restricted movement of Live- stock from quarantine into State, Milk Inspection, Boll, and scores on schools and water, 563 in all.

About the only big problem not solved was taxes. Practically all tax bills were passed to the floor; they were not bottled in the committee. H. B. 334, de- signed to pay deficit, was passed March 28th and sent to the Senate with revenue of about \$50 million. The deficit was about \$58 million. H. B. 334 was a broad captioned bill that would take almost any amendment; it was hoped that the Senate would build it up while the House worked on the main tax bill. On April 21, the House passed H. B. 727 by a vote of 72 to 71. It was alimited 2 per cent sales tax with revenue of about \$264.5 million, making a total of about \$314.5 million passed by the House. (It is difficult to estimate quickly, large tax bills. I am using figures of he Texas Re- search League. Experts differ).

When H. B. 727 passed, it was not known what revenue was needed as the appropriation, Hale-Aikin and Old Age Bills year rotation of cotton, clover, grain sorghum and oats, and by ACTUAL experience, and keep- ing accurate records shows a good profit (better than any business) even sitting in his chair at the Experiment Station, and hiring the labor. The Senate decided to ignore H. B. 727 and put everything in H. B. 334. They wrote a new Sales Tax Bill similar to the House Bill carrying revenue of \$328 million. To this they added special taxes: Increased franchise tax on all corporation (instead of increasing taxes on interstate corporations as passed by House —more comparable with domestic corporations) and increased nat- ural gas taxes; making both tem- porary; raised auto operators licenses 50 per cent. This bill was passed May 18— 10 days be- fore adjournment by a vote of 17 to 14. The Governor said the would veto the bill unless amend- ed. It was put in a Conference Committee in an effort to work out differences. Some experts claim only 10 per cent of the tax was on business and a big part of that was temporary; while others claimed the business tax was 30 per cent. The House refused after Conference Com- mittee failed, to concur at late hour of night of adjournment.

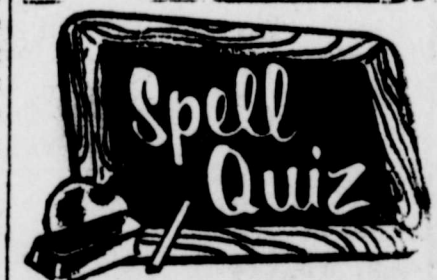

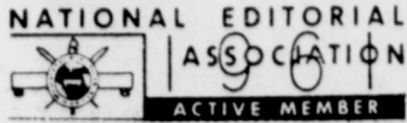

ment's food and agriculture menu now before Congress? It's strictly a la carte. The ingredients were stirred up by President Kennedy. The chef is Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman. The result is the doggonedest stew ever laid on a farmer's table.

This omnibus farm bill (H.R. 6400 and S. 1643) would give Mr Freeman the authority to formulate and implement production and marketing controls on every agricultural commodity produced in the United States— some 256 different items!

The bill authorizes the Secretary to extend the application of marketing quotas and orders, acreage allotments, direct subsidies, price support and surplus disposal.

Here's how the farm plan would work:

Programs developed by Secretary Freeman and Freeman-appointed farmer advisory committees would be outlined to Congress. If not vetoed within 60 days, the program then would be offered for vote by selected farmers and would become law if approved by two thirds of those voting.

The American Farm Bureau Federation had this to say to the House Agriculture Committee:

"Title 1 (of H.R. 6400) is a bid to concentrate unprecedented power over the destiny of American agriculture in the hands of the Secretary of Agriculture and the Executive Branch of government.

"It is incredible to us that the Congress would abdicate to any official of the Executive Branch your constitutional prerogative to determine legislative policy."

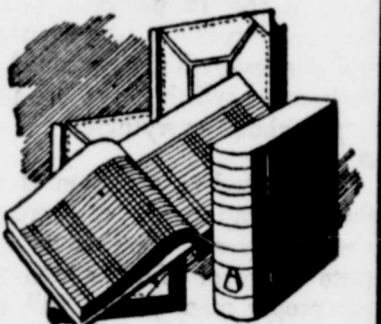
Once a legislative body abjectly surrenders power to the executive branch of government, it seldom regains it.

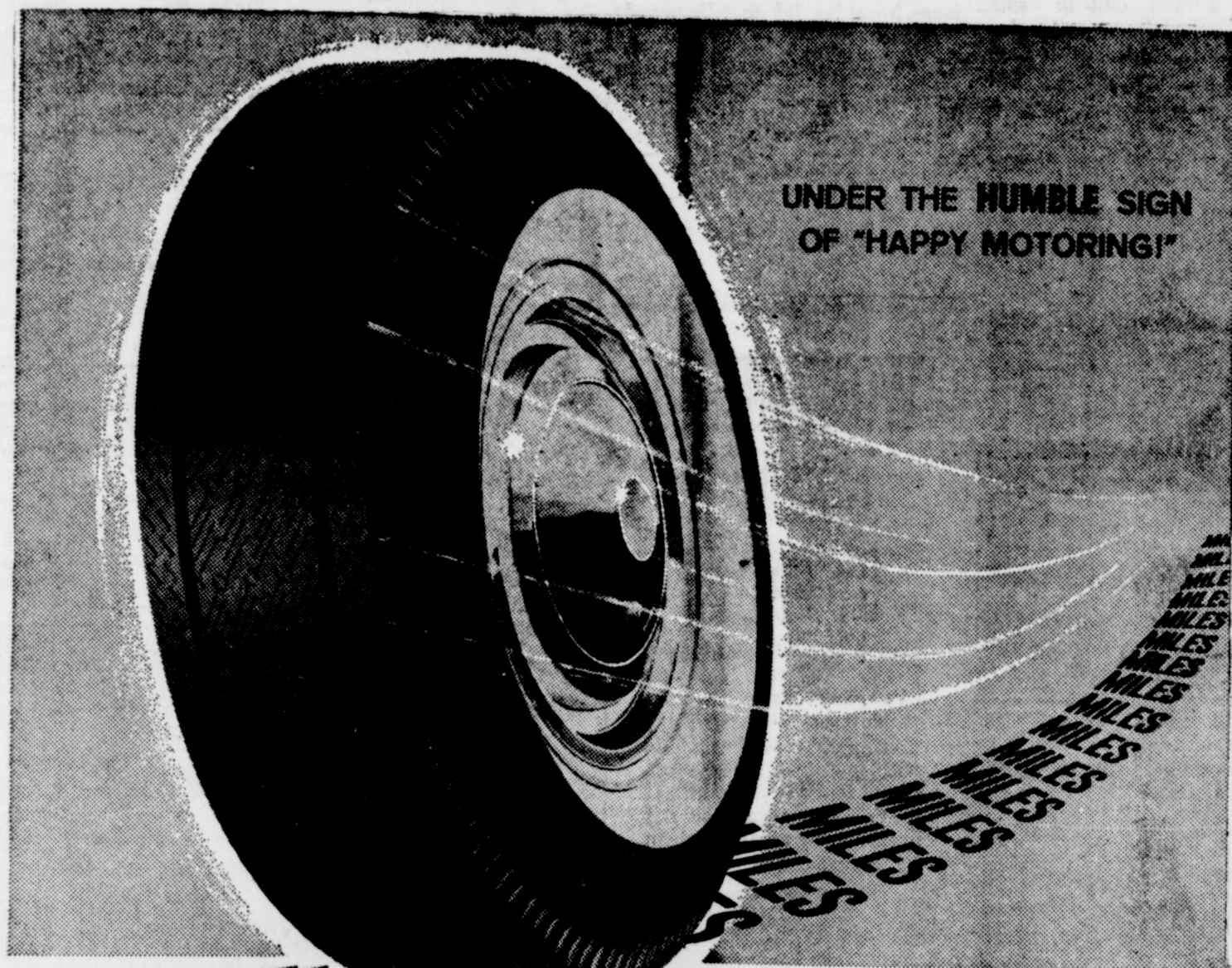

558 applications signed on '61 Feed Grain Program; no grazing permitted on diverted acreage, must not have had anything harvested for grain or hay, either before or after signing an application.

If corn or grain sorghum is plowed up to comply it will be necessary that a good job be done in destroying the crop. Scattered stalks cannot be left. Corn may be destroyed by shredding; grain sorghum must be plowed under. Diverted land may be kept plowed in preparation for planting a fall crop of small grains. If oats left on, and volunteer cro is obtained this fall, the oats may not be grazed; if they are sowed with a drill for grain, they may.

If a crop has not been destroyed when the farm is measured, a charge of \$4 for the first plot plus \$2 for each additional plot for going back to the farm to measure the destroyed corn or grain sorghum will be made. Farmers have 15 days to plow up the excess corn or grain sorghum or excess cotton.

Crop measuring will start in a few days, as the loans cannot be made or marketing cards issued until the crops are measured.

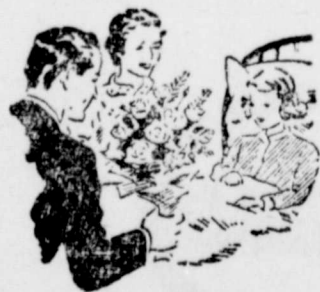

from our Congressman **BOB POAGE**

Dear Friends:

All of those who are familiar with Washington, D. C. know that the rate of violent crimes is very high here. I think this is due, at least, to the extremely lenient courts and parole offices. Too often it seems that the local courts feel that the excuse for their existence is to protect criminals from punishment. I think that this is unfair to our law-abiding citizens who make up the great majority of any community. I think the certainty of punishment (not excessive punishment in a few cases) is the best deterrent to crime.

We need to give those accused of crime every presumption of innocence, but we should not deny the State the right to prove the guilt of a lawbreaker.

Seven years ago a chronic criminal named Mallory was accused of rape in Washington. He was arrested late one night and put in jail where he stayed till business hours the next day. He signed a confession and made no claim that he was mistreated or roughly handled in any way.

The Supreme Court of the United States held that this delay of 7½ hours in arraigning him after his arrest rendered the confession inadmissible. This is what came to be known as the Mallory decision. Mallory was turned loose to commit new crimes. He is now lodged in jail in Pennsylvania.

This week the House passed a bill to set this court decision aside insofar as we can do so. (Congress, of course, cannot and should not remove any Constitutional guarantees). We provided that an otherwise voluntary confession shall not be inadmissible solely because of delay. I voted for the bill.

There has been a vast amount of misrepresentation regarding this bill. By no stretch of the imagination does it undertake to permit the use of confessions which are obtained through threats, coercion or duress.

I feel that this whole matter clearly slows up the trend of too many people to protect wrongdoers. I think it is closely related to the protection which our Supreme Court has given to those who refuse to testify and those who refuse to take an oath of allegiance to our country even when they are asking for help from the country. I think that the Constitution only intended to protect a citizen's right to give evidence against himself. I don't think that anyone has the right to refuse to cooperate with the enforcement of the law by refusing to give testimony just because he doesn't agree with the law.

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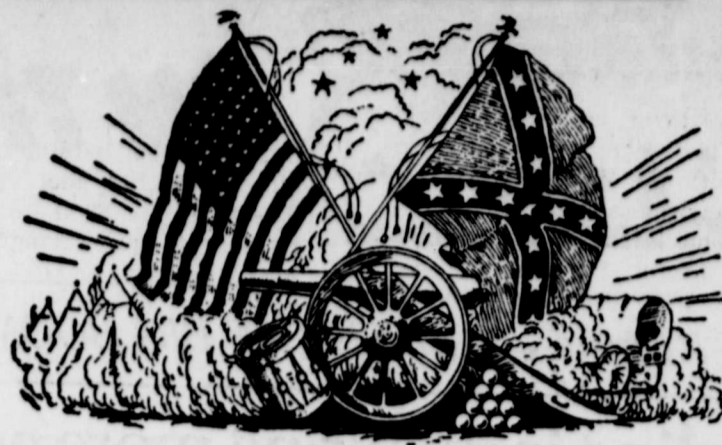
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## 100 years of Reunion 1861 - 1961



### THE CIVIL WAR CENTENNIAL

A letter from the president of Waco's Civil War Round Table a few days ago, inviting this writer to become a member of that group, served as a reminder that Texas has only two such Round Tables at present; the one in Waco and another in Houston.

The Round Tables, organized to bring together those interested in one of the most colorful and critical periods of American History, are experiencing a phenomenal growth due to the increased interest brought on by the approach of the Centennial. There are now some well-organized groups scattered throughout the United States and in three foreign countries. England, Germany and Canada each have at least one Round Table group. Members of the Round Table meet periodically to talk about and hear discussed various areas and personalities of the war.

The Waco Round Table is headed by Air Force Col. Harold B. Simpson, who is an ardent student of the war. He is currently involved in writing a definitive work on Gen. John Bell Hook's Texas Brigade, of which Jefferson Davis said in an address to the Texans near Richmond in 1861: "The troops of other States have their reputations to gain; the Sons of the Defenders of the Alamo have theirs to maintain! I am assured that you will be faithful to the trust."

If the plans outlined by Col.

Simpson for the Waco group's second year of operation are any indication, there should be some lively programs and discussions between now and next June.

Some of the members of the Round Table who will be featured in regular programs include Waco attorney Sam Latham, who will speak on "Dick Dowling and the Battle of Sabine Pass"; Lt. Ed Leland of James Connally Air Force Base on "The Battle of Vicksburg"; and Col. Simpson who will talk about his favorite subject, "The Texas Brigade in Battle."

Colonel Simpson says one does not have to be an expert on Civil War to be a member of the Round Table, for most of them merely have an interest in the War and want to learn more about it.

Well-known central Texans to be found among the membership are Tommy Turner, chief of the Dallas News; Central Texas Bureau; Dr. James D. Carter, editor of the Texas Grand Lodge Magazine; Roger Conger, the Waco historian; and Professor Dencan of Texas A & M College.

The monthly meeting offers an appetizing menu for those interested in the War. The "mustez" period, preceding the evening program, features exhibits of original Civil War newspapers, current Civil War publications of other Round Tables and relics of the war.

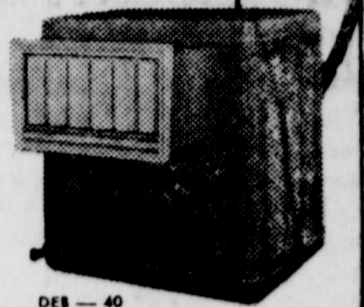
