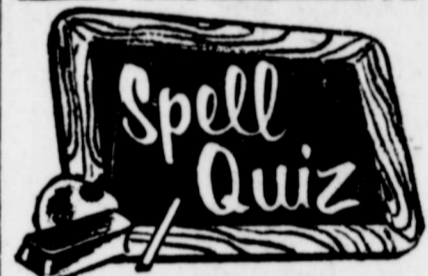

PRESIDENT TEMPLE JC TUESDAY SPEAKER AT GATESVILLE KIWANIS

Hubert M. Dawson, President of Temple Junior College was the speaker Tuesday evening at 6:30 at the luncheon of the Gatesville Kiwanis Club at Melton's Dining Room.

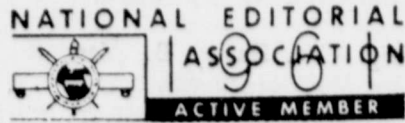

"What this country needs is release from a harassing structure of tax rates and methods which defeats the public interest."

Credit for the quotation goes to Charles R. Sligh Jr., chief staff officer of the National Association of Manufacturers. He made the statement during a recent testimony before the House Ways and Means Committee sessions on the government's tax package. And Mr. Sligh knows a fact or two about the onerous taxes on your business.

The NAM spokesman knows something else. He's well aware that personal income taxes hurt like you know what. That's why he's pushing for the Herlong-Baker Bill which, among other benefits, would moderate the rates of individual taxes.

Here's we all come in. We suggest that you write your representatives to get behind the Herlong-Baker bills, which have bipartisan backing. And remind them of this:

Personal Income Tax The Problem
The ruthless graduation chokes off venture capital at its source, discourages risk-taking, smother's incentives, curtails business starts and expansions - all of which prevents job creation. It is the source of small business and the men on the ladder. By exacting stiff penalties on hard work and long hours, graduation is in direct conflict with the universally accepted principle of reward for extra effort and achievement. Rates top out at 91 per cent, hit 50 per cent at \$16,000 of taxable income from a start of 20 per cent.

The Solution
Over a 5-year period the rate would be stringently compressed with the top rate reduced to 47 per cent and the other graduated rates lowered in a consistent pattern. Every personal taxpayer would get a minimum reduction of 25 per cent, with the first rate reduced to 15 per cent. On the principle that no unincorporated business, professional person, or other individual tax-payer should pay a higher tax rate than a corporation, the new top of 47 per cent would be the same as that on corporate income.

HOW TO OPEN YOUR EYES

When puppies are born into this world, their eyes are tightly shut. They cannot see a thing, and for quite a length of time the puppies remain blind until their eyes open to a big, bright, new world.

As soon as they see the sunshine, the grass and the trees, they begin to move about. I like to think that their first little barks of ecstasy are in thanksgiving to God for opening their eyes.

I am reminded of a man in the Bible who was blind from birth. Jesus passed by and healed him, and the man began to see—his eyes were opened.

Now when a man gets his eyes opened, things begin to happen. He experiences a great change in his life. He begins to compare what he was with what he is, what he had with what he has. And the man in the Bible was no exception. When he was asked how it all had happened, he couldn't answer. He didn't know how Christ had healed him. But he said, "One thing I know, that, whereas I was blind, now I see" (John 9:25).

at Freeport, where we are now converting sea water into fresh water. This is the first of five desalination plants which the government is building. Each one will use a different method in an effort to obtain the most effective and economic process. In my opinion, it is of tremendous importance that we develop a cheap and reliable method of removing salt from water. By doing this we can offer the most tangible kind of help to vast regions of the world as well as to many areas at home. Most people have no idea just what a large part of the surface of the earth needs fresh water.

After leaving Freeport we flew to Corpus Christi and visited Padre Island. We later flew the length of the Island to Brownsville and then back to Washington arriving here at 2 a. m.

I think there is no question but that Padre Island should be acquired by the government as a national seashore park. It is, of course nothing more than a beach, but it is a beautiful beach and in the years to come ocean beaches available to all the people are going to become more and more limited.

While speaking of parks I have long wanted to see Texas acquire a number of outstanding local beauty spots as state parks. I think for instance that the State should definitely own Hamilton's Pool, Bear Mountain, Enchanted Rock, the Double Mountain, etc., and that we should connect most

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of these spot with scenic drives or parkways. If we don't acquire these areas soon, they may be lost to the public forever because of commercialization.

Yesterday the House passed the Housing Bill, which continues the authority for government — guaranteed loans which play such an important part in our present day real estate business, for the Marlin Elderly Housing and for the Urban Renewal Program,

which is of such vital importance to Waco in connection with development incident to our new highway system through the city I voted for the bill.

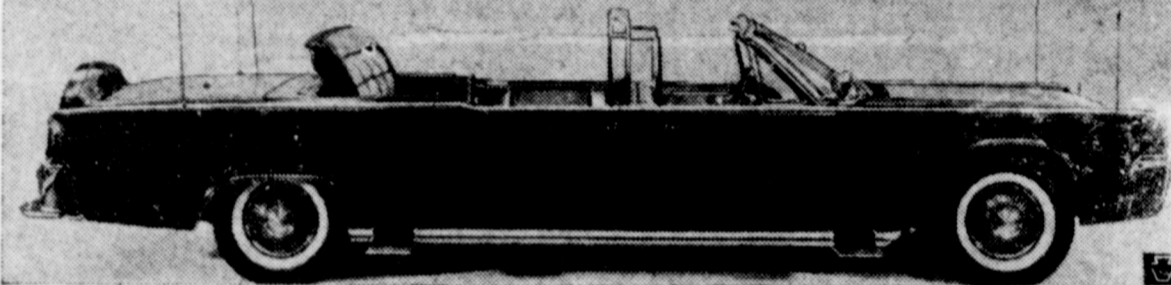
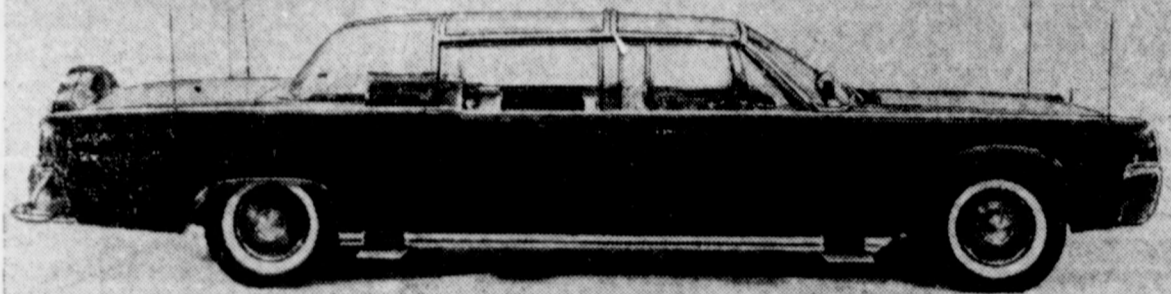
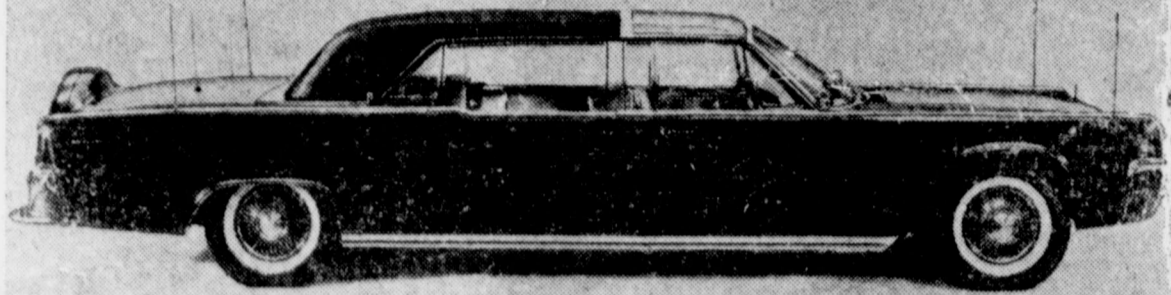

AN ARRAY OF ROOFS — A suitable roof type for use on any occasion in any weather is a highlight feature of the new custom-built Presidential Continental now being used at the White House. The car is a 1961 Lincoln Continental which literally was cut in half, reinforced and extended in length by more than three and one-half feet. A series of roof choices — two-piece-metal, clear plastic, fabric or use as an open-air convertible — make the car one of the most unusual custom automobiles ever built. In addition to the roof versions shown above, portions of each roof type can be used separately or in combinations over the rear, middle and front compartments. The car also has retractable foot stands for Secret Service personnel and an "elevator" rear seat which raises up to 10½ inches to help parade crowds see the occupants.

KELLEY'S CIVIL WAR STORIES APPEARED IN TEXAS PRESS MESSENGER

BELTON, June 27 — "Texas Newspapers and the Civil War," a lengthy article appearing in the current issue of The Texas Press Messenger, was written by Dayton Kelley, director of journalism and publicity at Mary Hardin-Baylor College whose weekly column "The Civil War Centennial" is carried by The Coryell County News.

The story highlights the widely divergent opinions of Texas newspapers regarding the secession movement and points out that the coverage of General John Bankhead Magruder's brilliantly executed recapture of Galveston has been recognized as the birth of modern newspaper reporting in Texas and also marks the first time the telegraph was brought into use to relay an important news event while it was happening.

Kelley, who has written dozens of feature stories for state and national publications, is currently writing a Civil War column for weekly Texas newspapers.
