

The car is a 1961 Lincoln Continental which literally was cut in half, reinforced and extended in length by more than three and one-half feet. A series of roof choices — two-piece-metal, clear plastic, fabric or use as an open-air convertible — make the car one of the most unusual custom automobiles ever built. In addition to the roof versions shown above, portions of each roof type can be used separately or in combinations over the rear, middle and front compartments.
