One hundred and eighty-five years ago we affirmed our determination to fight for the independence of our land. This fight has never wholly ended. Every generation has faceda tyranny from without or within and steadfastly and successfully fought for freedom.

But now we face the greatest challenge in human history, where materalistic forces of the left - the tyranny of regimentation - are determined to conquer our nation and the whole world; and materialistic forces of the right - the tyranny of self-interest - are determined to remain undisturbed in the face of the tremendous needs of mankind.

Frank Buchanan, the initiator of Moral Re-Armament, in his world-wide birthday message "Brave Men Choose" clearly expressed the choikes facing us in this battle today: "We can give in, and some are ready to do just that. Or we can fight it
out, and that means the risk of global suicide. Or we can find a superior idelogy that shows the next step ahead for the Communist and the non-Communist world alike."

We are responsible for the future of the world. As Americans we must choose ${ }^{\text {to }}$ find and live that supeior ideology. It is based, as were the basic convictions of our founding fathers, on obedience to the Divine will and the necessity of absolute moral standards. True patriots know that these are no longer a personal matter but a condition of world survival.

July 4th is a day when as Americans we commit ourselves to what Admiral William H. Stanley, former Chief of Naval Operations, calls the continuation of the American Revolution on a world scale, and declare our firm intention to fight tyranny in every form and establish a just and lasting peace for all mankind.

Heads o states, national, civic and industrial leaders of all classes, creeds and parties have welcomed it as the cure for that deed disease of the spirit from which cvilization is suffering.
