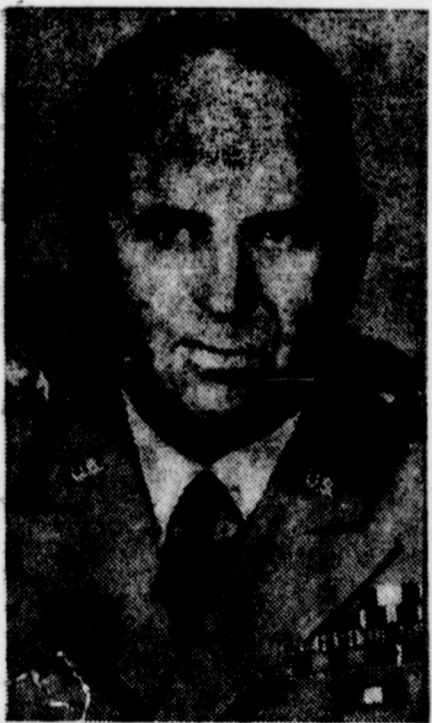

Saturday Morning — Braun

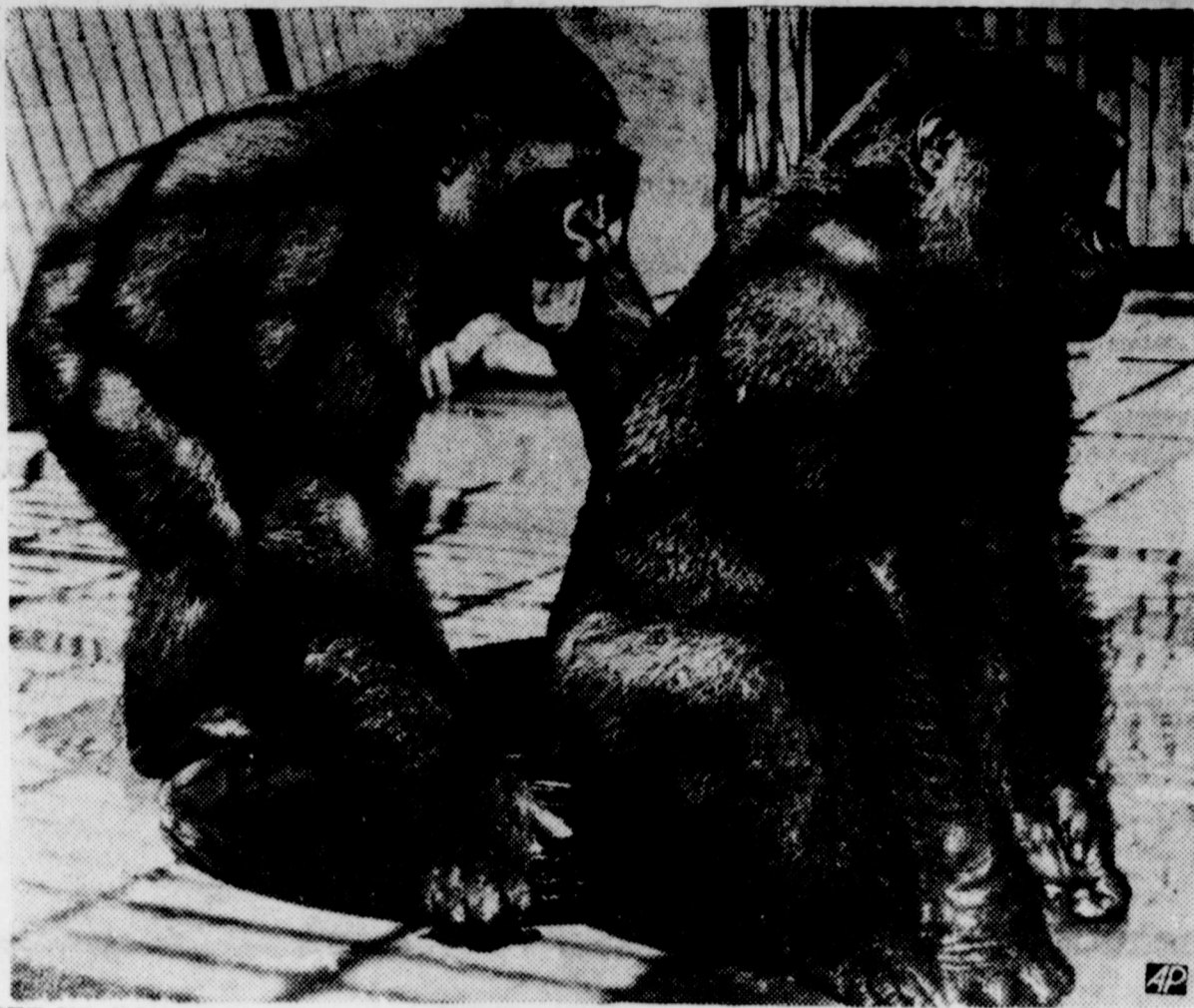

BART HENRY GETS BROKEN ARM AND LEG IN CAR MISHAP

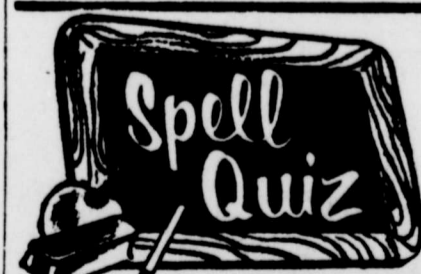
