What will happen now is anybody's guess. The council adjourned until the coming Tuesday evening.

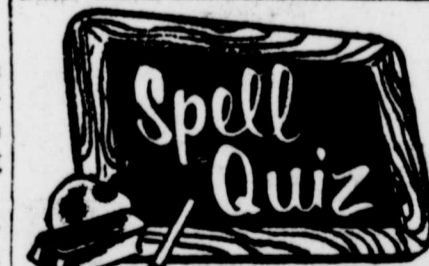

# WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER

There are some who claim that if a law had not been passed providing for income tax deductions from pay checks, that the costs of government would have declined, instead of steadily increasing.

In addition, there is quite some concern in certain quarters in Washington over the trend of the past few years to increase deductions for social security.



Congressman Harold Ostertag of northern New York recently pointed out that without any further items tagged onto social security, social security taxes on already passed legislation will continue to increase each year up to 1969 when the employer and employee both will be paying 4 1/4% each on the first \$4800 of wages and salaries each year.

This means, then, if there is no further broadening of benefits, by 1969 8 1/4% of wages up to \$4800 per year will be going into this fund. On top of this, in some states, the employer pays as high as 3.1% on the first \$3000 paid per year in unemployment taxes.

This, then, means that on employees making \$125 per week or less, for the first six months of each year, the employer will be paying a tax on this payroll over more than 7%.

In a business such as retailing, or some other enterprise where labor is the biggest cost of doing business, these welfare taxes on the employer can well equal, if not exceed, the

average net profit by a given line of commerce or industry.

Without going into the merits or demerits of any proposals to extend welfare benefits, it is perhaps well to consider that from one standpoint alone the peril point may have been already reached.

That standpoint is the supply of jobs. Inasmuch as business, unlike government, cannot look to outside sources of income to make up increases in costs, every time either government or union actions makes the cost of labor higher, great thought and study is given to finding methods, means, or equipment to replace the need for a part of the workers.

Spurred by past actions, many industries have already replaced workers, many more developments are in the preparation stage and will become operative in the near future, to further aggravate the unemployment problem.

Of course, there is quite an emotional pull to provide the fuller, richer, more carefree life for older citizens. Yet it's kind of a futile activity if it results in less and less job opportunity for the younger citizens.

This concentration by politicians on greater and greater welfare benefits, especially around times of elections, could well result in killing the goose that lays the golden egg.

After all, a sound, logical argument can be made that the father of any young family should carry at least a quarter of million dollars in life insurance. However, if in order to pay the premiums, the family has to stop eating, the arguments that sound so logical become rather silly.

## Co. Agent News

Cotton Root Rot  
Damage Predicted:

Rains that occurred during June and July will bring on a considerable amount of cotton root rot. This prediction comes from Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist. He bases it on the amount of disease carryover in the soil from last year. Due to the large amount of root rot the past four years, a high count of sclerotia is present in all infested soils.

When cotton roots grow close to the sclerotia in moist soil, the seed bodies of the fungus germinate and attack the cotton root. Within a few days large patches of dead cotton appear. The disease is nearly always more damaging on late than on early cotton.

Smith advises growers to start planning preventive measures immediately for the 1962 cotton crop. Deep plowing, 6 to 18 inches, with a mold board or disc is recommended. In a few areas, because of the type of

sub-soil, this will not be possible. However, deep plowing to as great a depth as possible will be helpful in reducing root rot the following year. In order to effectively reduce root rot, it is necessary to have 10 to 14 days of hot, dry weather following the deep plowing.

# Leaverton On Taxes

It is generally agreed that the Legislature must raise about \$550 million in new money. The question: Who will pay it? Heretofore Texas has relied on natural resources and selective taxes. Each year it has been harder. The selective taxes that produce large sums have been hit repeatedly and hard and many think the ultimate has been reached there. This has brought into consideration the sales tax. Perhaps no informed person denies that the sales tax is disproportionate to the lower income brackets. It's natural that industry favors a general sales tax and the low bracket individual opposes it. Both segments of society are constituents and have a right to fair tax treatment.

I don't think Texas is on the rocks because of her selective tax policy. Texas has increased faster than the United States in population, income created by manufacturing, retail sales, and personal income. The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research says the trend in business activity in Texas since 1940 shows a very satisfactory growth and that another highly favorable factor in our growth is shown in the index of bank debts.

I do not think the selective tax

policy has placed Texas in a bad financial situation. Most of the states have higher tax burdens, greater public debts and far more costly government than Texas. The average state family tax in the U. S. is twice that of Texas. We do have a deficit of some \$60 million but selective taxes have nothing to do with it. Last session the Legislature voted taxes that the Comptroller said would pay all bills including the deficit, but the price and production and income was cut some \$50 million. A few other items make the balance. This was not the fault of selective taxes. Many states which have large deficits because of misc-sales tax or income tax or both have cutulations on the income. In 1959 Pennsylvania, which has both an income tax and a 4 per cent sales tax had a deficit of \$142 million. Michigan, which raised its sales tax from 3 to 4 per cent on Jan. 1 still expects a general fund deficit of 55.8 million by the end of the fiscal year 1961. Many other sales tax states are similarly situated.

Because of different interests, it is unlikely that an agreement could be reached on sufficient selective taxes without oppressing badly some taxpayers. It's natural to protect our own interest, yet most people have a sense of fairness. I think the solution is a limited sales tax carrying exemptions to soften the impact in the lower brackets. I believe the Legislature and the Governor will reach a common ground including a limited sales tax. Of course too many exemptions will defeat the purpose of the bill. The House and the Senate passed limited sales tax bills. The House supplemented the sales tax with a permanent tax on business by taxing interstate corporations now lightly taxed. The Senate supplemented with temporary taxes on business by taxing gas and domestic corporations now heavily taxed. I voted for the House bill and against the Senate Bill because:

1. A vote for the bill would serve no purpose as the Governor said he would veto it.
2. I did not wish to put my approval on a useless bill tazing do- and letting interstate corporation mestic corporation very heavily now lightly taxed go free.
3. The bill was inadequate. I do not think Texas would be pleased with a sales tax and yet the deficit remain.

Congressman **BOB POAGE**

Mr. Poage has suggested that I write today's Newsletter in order to introduce myself, the newest member of his staff. After having taught in the Department of Political Science at Baylor University since 1946, I became a member of Mr. Poage's staff as of June 1st as a replacement for Mr. Lacey Sharp who was for almost twenty years the Congressman's very efficient administrative assistant. Having been in this office for only a little over a month, I am by no means "acclimated" to all aspects of my new job or to the Washington scene.

I am often asked, both as a teacher and now in this position, "Just what do a Congressman and his staff do all day?" Thinking you might have asked that same question, I am setting down some cursory observations. This session being well along, the meeting hours for both the House and the Senate will, after Fourth of July lull, lengthen by the day as more legislation advances from committee hearings to the debate and voting stages. However, regardless of the duration of the day's session, the Congressman and his staff are busy. Mr. Poage arrives in the office between 7:30 and 8:00 and reads all the correspondence which has come in the first mail delivery.

After digesting the contents of the morning mail and dictating replies and seeing that appropriate action is instituted, committee hearings ordinarily consume most of the remainder of the remainder of the Congressman's morning. Hearings normally begin at 10:00 and continue until the House convenes at noon. Mr. Poage's major committee interest is, of course, the Committee on Agriculture, of which he is the vice chairman. He is the chairman of three Agriculture sub-committees.

When any important debate or vote is anticipated on the floor of the House, Mr. Poage is there. Of course, there is a fairly steady flow of visitors to the office—sometimes constituents from the 11th District or elsewhere with problems requiring attention; sometimes simply persons dropping by to pay their respects or to avail themselves of the various services which their Congressman can provide to the visitor to Washington, such as passes to the House and Senate galleries or tours of the White House.

All in all, I am most favorably impressed with the spirit of helpfulness which prevails with your Congressman and his staff and the number and variety of actual services rendered to individuals, groups, communities, and to the district at large. They are at your disposal for about eleven hours of the day. The office is staffed from before eight o'clock to six-thirty or seven, so anytime you need the assistance of your Congressman, don't fail to call for fear he won't be "open". He usually is. Just one word of caution—if you phone, bear in mind the two-hour time difference between Central Texas and Washington.
