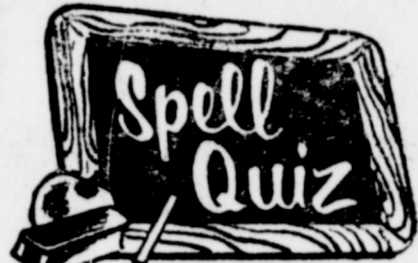

CITY COUNCIL GRANTS! NEW PHONE RATES: IT'S A 32 PERCENT RAISE

Tuesday night last, Gatesville City Council granted a 32 percent raise in rates to Gulf States Telephone Company.

The rates, new and old are:

Rates will be in effect "commencing with the first regular billing date of the company on or after completion of the installation and cutting into service the new dial telephone equipment and outside plant facilities."

The ordinance calls for the new dial system to be ready in 16 months. It also states the Council has the right to reexamine the rates, and their effects and to adjust such rates should it determine that such rates yield more or less than a fair return on the company's property, and the company shall, on request in writing by the city, within 60 days, submit a financial statement for the fiscal year ending on the last day of the preceding, March, June or September whichever date is most recent.

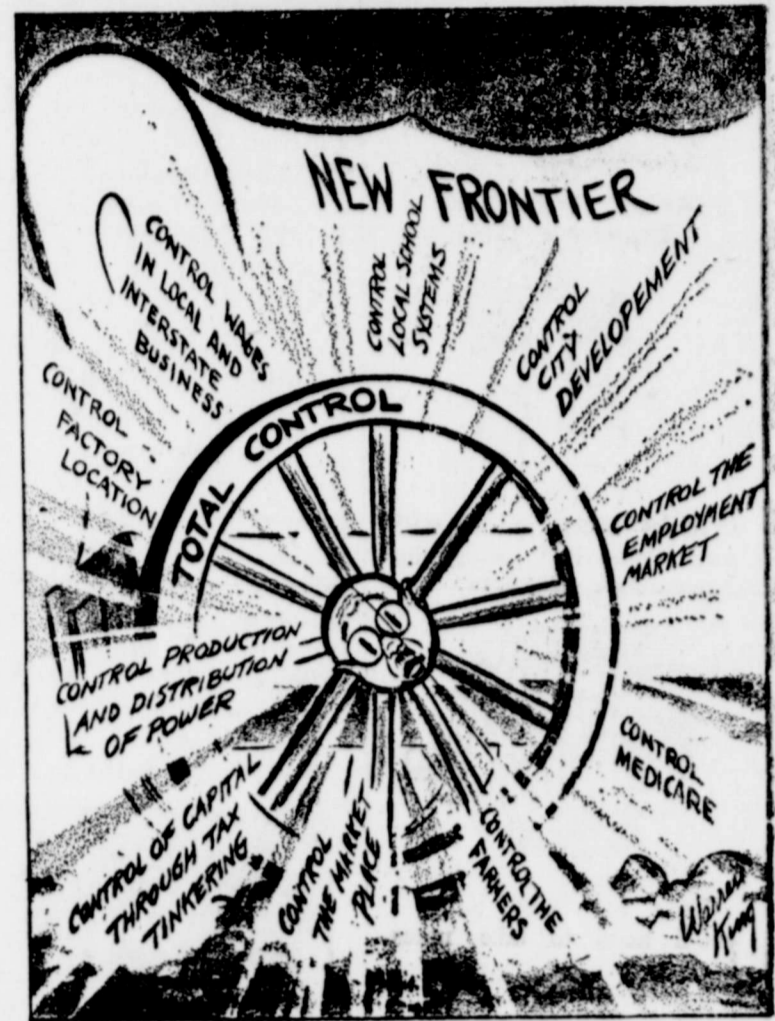
FLOYD W. THARP

Gins, What's Left Of Them Are Moving To The Country!

RICHARDSON, Tex., Aug. 16 (AP) — The trend in recent years has been to the suburbs. Families and industries have been deserting the cities for more space in the country. Now even a cotton gin is moving to the country.

It all started in January of this year when the Farmers Co-Op Society of Richardson decided to move its gin out of town.

Built around the turn of the century when Richardson was a village, the gin in recent years became surrounded by new buildings and hundreds of homes.

As Richardson grew into a relatively large town, acreage that

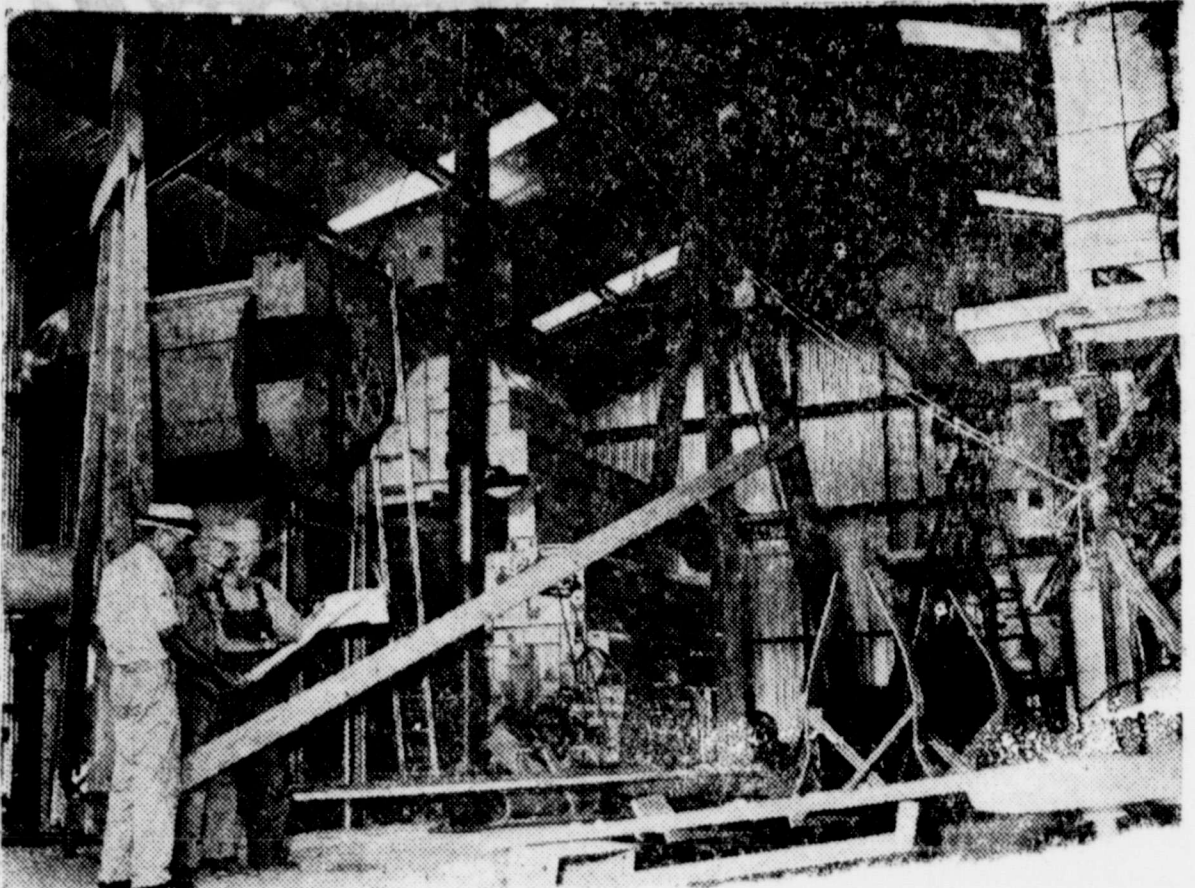
once grew cotton was sold and home built on the land. Each year for the past five years the cotton crop around the area has diminished.

Farmers who still raise the crop found it difficult to get to the gin because of the traffic problem created by swarms of cars and people shopping at nearby centers.

Besides that, the city fathers were disturbed by the burning of cotton seed hulls with the resulting smoke and fire hazard.

So in January the 75 members of the Co-op, headed by their met and decided it was time to move the plant to the suburbs. The organization bought five acres at Renner, some 6 miles to the north and closer to cotton farmers.

"We figured it was time to

move," said Huffhines. "Last year about 1,000 acres of land went into building lots with a loss of about 400 bales of cotton."

The actual move began in April and all buildings were moved except the main gin. The cotton house and seed house were cut in sections and moved to the new site, where they were reassembled. The main gin, obsolete by modern methods, was scrapped, and a modern, fire-proof plant erected on the new grounds. In the new plant all machinery will be powered by electricity instead of diesel power which turned the wheels of the old plant.

It cost about \$60,000 to move the plant and it should be complete and ready for the first cotton around the last of August.

All agree the move was for the best. "We hope to gain twice the amount lost last year," said A. J. McGee, the ginner.

"There will be a lot more room for wagons coming to the gin and more space for the plant and office," says Huffhines, adding, "we plan a farm store where supplies can be purchased along with fertilizer, and the railroad siding will help us to get supplies with less trouble. Why we are even making plans to turn burrs into fertilizer rather than burn them like we did before."

So the spot where many an old-timer passed the time of day chatting with his cronies or playing a game of dominoes will soon be a thing of the past in the rapid growing north central Texas community.

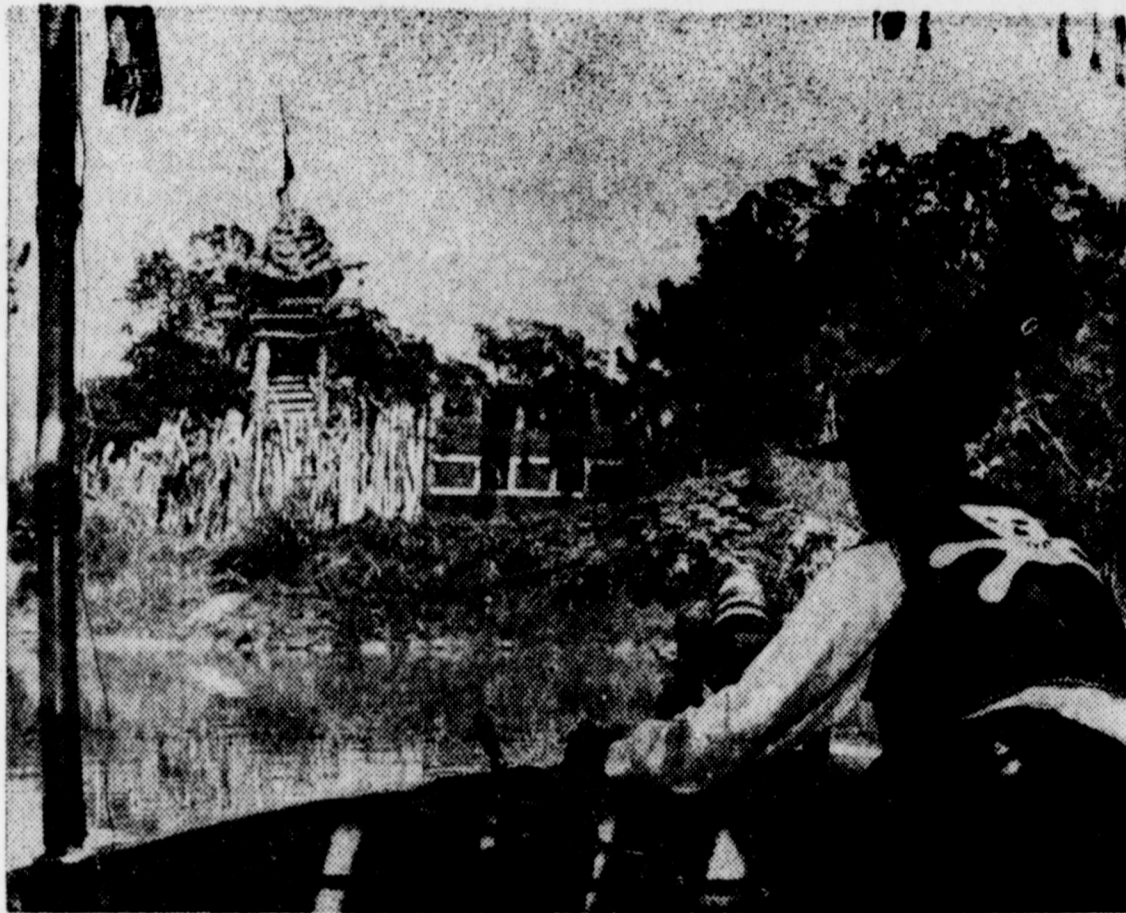

needs to receive retirement benefits for himself or to qualify his family for dependents or survivors benefits.

If you believe that you or some one in your family may now be eligible for benefits because of this change in the law, get in touch with your social security office promptly.

You may have inquired after the law was changed by Congress in September 1960, but do so again; this is a new change that makes it possible for people to get benefits with even less credit for work covered by social security. As before, however, no one can become entitled to benefits with a total of less than a year and a half of work in employment or self-employment covered by social security.

In my first article on the new amendments to the Social Security Law I described the provision which gives men the option to retire between ages 62 and 65 with reduced benefits.

In today's article, I want to cover another important change in the law — the one which reduces the length of time a person needs to have worked under social security to get retirement benefits for himself or to qualify his family for survivors benefits in case of his death.


Some 160,000 older people will become eligible for cash benefits because of this change in the law older men and women workers, their wives or dependant husbands and the widows, dependent widowers and aged dependent parents of workers who have died. First payments to newly eligible persons can be made for the month of August 1961.

Under the new law, a man reaching age 65, or a woman reaching age 62, this year will need social security credit for only 2 1/2 years of work under social security rather than the present requirement of 3 1/4 years. A man who reached 65, or a woman age 62, before 1958 needs only a year and a half of work under social security to be eligible for social security retirement benefits.

The survivors of workers who died before 1958 may also become eligible for benefits under this change in the law if the worker before his death had earned social security credit for at least a year and a half.

I should point out that credit for work under social security is counted in three-month "calendar quarters." Therefore, a person need not have worked for a continuous period of one and a half or two and a half years as the case may be. Social Security credit for calendar quarters earned at any time since 1936 can be counted toward the amount of work he

A House Amendment to the permissive bill stipulated that permission to sue did not constitute admission of liability.

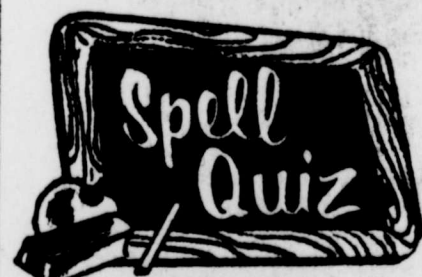

**DA Truman Roberts
And Governor Daniel
Agree On Suggestions**

District Attorney Truman Roberts Tuesday reported on a conference he had Friday with Gov. Price Daniel regarding Gatesville State School for Boys, and said the school should be run by Supt. O. F. Perry and not by the Texas Youth Council at Austin which now controls the school.

He said it was agreed that Perry can do the job if left alone by the Executive Secretary of the Texas Youth Council, Dr. James A. Turman.

Governor Daniel announced Tuesday an additional highway patrolman will be assigned to Gatesville, and the temporary one assigned then, was State Highway Patrolman W. F. (Bill) Quinn August 21, Patrolman J. K. Hamilton will join the current patrolmen Bill Lamb and C. B. James in this area as permanent patrolmen, and they all have been instructed to keep close watch on events at the school.

Roberts and Daniel came up with these suggestions and Roberts said Tuesday the Governor would back up each one of them. They are.

1. The superintendent of the school be given full authority under policies of the TYC, including any disciplinary problems and decisions regarding the attendants and inmates be made by him.

2. The TYC adopt and enforce a policy of giving guards authority not only to protect themselves but inmates and property and to see that their orders are carried out by the use of such force as is necessary.

3. There should be established armed patrol units for work with the school. Such units to be independent of the TYC. Maj. Elliott, Regional Commander, Texas Highway Patrol, assigned Bill Quinn making thos a 3-man station, and will be in touch by telephone and radio.

The above recommendations can be put in force by orders of the Texas Youth Council. The 3 suggestions below take legislative action.

4. There should be separate custodial and parole agency in regard to juveniles. The Gatesville parole system should be set up like the State Parole Board which controls the paroling of the state prisoners.

5. There should be a discretionary law, letting grand juries determine in cases of persons committed under 17, as to whether they would be tried as adults or juveniles.

6. A state reformatory should be administered by the Department of Corrections which governs the Huntsville prison.

District Attorney Roberts, reading from criminal records in the court house— grand jury reports showed that from January 1958 to the present, grand juries have made these same recommendations, continually, to no avail. He said it was his privilege to investigate anything at any time that happened at the school, and that while he was away on vacation, Sheriff Winfred Cummings had kept him completely informed as to the situation.

CHANGES IN SOCIAL SECURITY

Durelle L. Allen, TSSDO

In my last article of the 1961 amendments to the social security law, I described the increase in the social security benefits payable to aged widows and widowers and to certain aged dependent parents. In this article, I would like to tell you about another group whose social security benefits are raised. They are the 2,175,000

persons who now receive social security benefits at or near \$33 a month. The change raises the minimum level to \$40 a month. Under the new law, the lowest benefit payable to a worker who retired at age 65 or later will be \$40, beginning with the checks mailed early in September. Dependents of these retired workers will also receive increases in their benefits if the increase will not raise the total family payment above \$60. Where there is only one person getting benefits based on the social security account of a worker who died, the survivor will have his or her monthly payment increased to \$40. There will also be a small increase in the payments to survivor-families who have been getting

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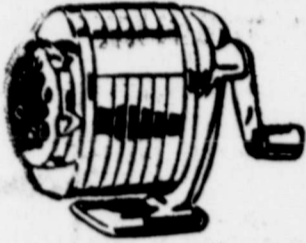

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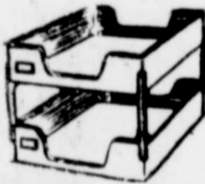

As I am going to Texas tonight to speak to the Texas Independent Meat Packers Association tomorrow, I have asked Mr. Mills of my staff to write this week's letter.

It is here that the President speaks to the joint sessions of Congress, and here were heard the Presidential messages which took the country into war. Woodrow Wilson's announcement that "The world must be made safe for democracy" and Franklin Roosevelt's proclamation of Pearl Harbor as a "day of infamy" have become a part of the air of the House."

Even the decor of the House conveys the feeling of this law-making body for the history of free government under law. Arranged around the House galleries are 23 plaques or medallions wrought in marble which portray

the great law-givers of the world's history. The portraits range from Hammurabi and Moses to Blackstone and Thomas Jefferson. Significant of our determination to preserve our freedom, the full length portraits of Washington and Lafayette hang on either side of the Speaker's podium with the flag hanging immediately behind the Speaker's chair. The great Roman scholar, Tacitus, said centuries ago that "Supremacy of the people tends to liberty," and in the House of Representatives, the people are supreme.

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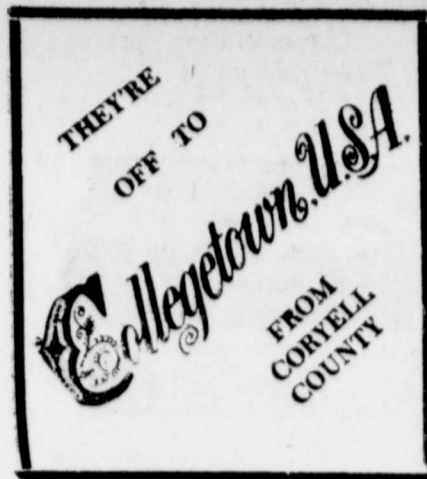

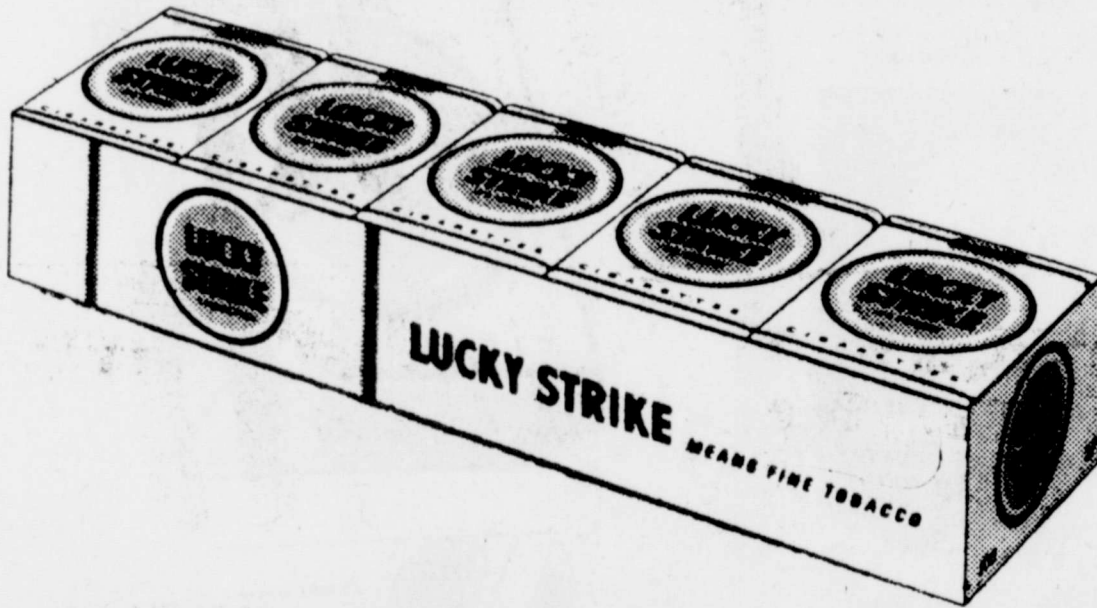
