While a worker is receiving disability insurance benefits, dependents benefits can be paid to certain members of his familynst as in the case of a retired worker. Payment can go to any of his children who are under 18, or who have been totally disabled since before they reached age 18. His wife, regardless of her age, can be paid benefits if she has in her car a child who is eligible for these dependents' benefits. If there is no child eligible for benefits, the worker's wife at 3:30 p. m. may qualify for payments when she reaches 62.


