HERE'S STATISTICS ON COUNTY "TAX TAKE" AND VALUATIONS

Tax Assessor Creston Brazzil advises the total county valuation is \$12,901,899 up from \$12,714,015 in 1960. The county tax rate is 98c per 1100 and the state is 42c.

This means a tax take of some \$126,438.61. Coryell County's part if 100 percent is collected. The average is about 95 percent collected. You're pretty good taxpayers, folks.

There are 12,895 cows on the tax roll (none from Ft. Hood) and they're valued at \$386,850.

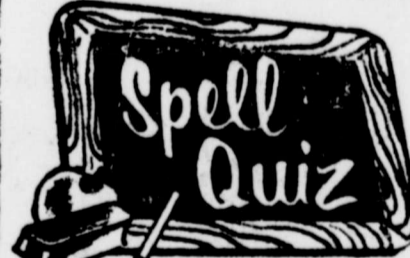

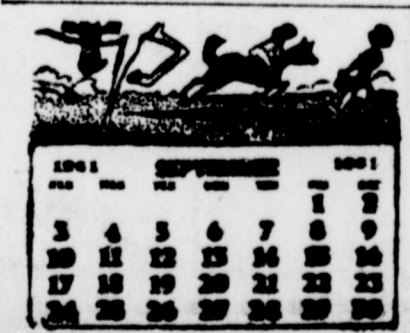
Mr. McGehee is a native of Lampasas and has a wife and a daughter in college. He also has a store in Carrolton.

MOURNING DOVES: Daily bag limit—15. Possession limit—not to exceed 30.

WHITE-WINGED DOVES: Daily bag limit—10. Possession limit—10.

NOTE: When both mourning doves and white-winged doves are possessed—Possession limit—30, in the aggregate, and not more than 10 may be white-winged doves.



SPECIAL NOTE: Unlawful to take white-winged doves or sharpshooters South of U.S. Highway 85, formerly State Highway 4, in southern tip of Texas, marked on map as "Game Sanctuary," and the Big Bend National Park in Brewster County.

SHOTGUNS: Must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity, may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.

SHOOTING HOURS: Mourning doves, 12 noon to sunset—except in areas having white-wing season, where the shooting hours will be from 2 p.m. to sunset on September 8, 9 and 10 (consecutive days) only. White-winged doves, in season, 2 p.m. to sunset.

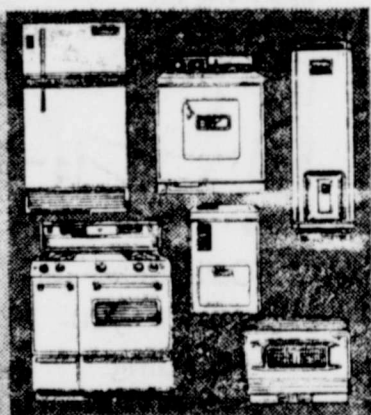
