





Dear Friends:

All of my life I have been taught that the Blackland belt of Central Texas was an especially rich and favored area. I still believe that it is, but I recognize that in

recent years we have suffered a

serious decline in our agricultural productivity.

We can offer many different explanations of this situation, but the fact emains that agriculture is absolutely basic to Central Texas. We have done very well in the development of industry. We have the Alco plant at Rockdale, the American Desk Company at Temple, the General fire plant at Waco, and a whole government financed operations.

We have the largest military post in Texas at Fort Hood. We have the training gound for the the problem and work at it that National Guard of the Southwest we can make Central Texas again at Noth Fot Hood. We have one of the very few remaining flying training schools at James Conley Air Foce Base. We have a tactical base at Gray Air Force Base and a special weapons depot at Killeen Base. We have the Air Force Solid Missiles Plant at Mc-Gregor operated by Rocketdyne. We have the operational head quartes of 12th Air Force at Waco. We have one of the five regional Veterans' headquarters at Waco and more Veterans' Hispitals than any other Congressional district in Texas at Waco, Marlin and Temple. We have the headquarters of the Soil Conservation Service at Temple and are moving the headquarters of Farmes Home Administration there. We have Lake Whitney in Bosque County, Lake Belton in Bell County, are building Lake Waco in McLennan County and expect to start on the Stillhouse Hollow Lake in Bell County soon. We have hundreds of miles of federally financed highways and numeous flood prevention projects. Our district is served by seven local Electric Coops and has the headquarters of the Brazos Electric Power Coop-

erative and of the Brazos River Authority. We cannot blame any lack of progress on the failure of the Federal Government to recognize our district.

If business is not all that we would like, it must be due to our agricultural stagnation. While our cotton production per acre in Central Texas has remained nearly stationary, much of West Texas has doubled its per acre yield. While we have been returning \$150 per acre farm land to grass, East Texas has been transferring land worth not more than \$30 into equally good pastures.

I do not feel that our situation can be blamed on our farmers. They need help from both government and local business. Our research agencies must develop new crops and new techniques for handling existing crops. Heretofore, there has been a disposition to assume that the Blacklands were so rich that there was no need for such work. At last our agricultural people are beginning to recognize the problem. There will be an important meeting at A & M College early in September. The new. Administrator of FHA, Mr. Cappleman, has assured me he is golot of smaller plants. We have ing to give special attention to been most fortunate in securing the problem of the Blacklands. I am asking other agencies to concentrate on this "problem" area. I believe that if we all recognize the most productive part of Texas. Newsom's niece.

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
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
