 -69- Dear Friends: All of my life I have been taug ht that the Blackland belt of Central Texas was an especially rich and favored area. I still believe that it is, but I recogmize that in recent years we have suffered a serious decline in our agricultural productivity. We can offer many different explanations of this situation, but the fact emains that agriculture is absolutely basic to Central Texas. We have done very well in the development of industry. We have the Aco plant at Rock daje, the American Desk Com pany at Temple, the General Tire plant at Waco, and a whole lot of smaller plants. We have been most fortunate in securing government financed operations. post in Texas at Fort Hood. We post in Texas at Fort Hood. We have the training gound for the have the training gound for the National Guard of the Southwest at Noth Fot Hood. We have one at Noth Fot Hood. We have one of the very few remaining flying training schools at James Conley


 Air Foce Base. We have a tactı cal base at Gray Air Force Base and a special weapons depot a Killeen Base. We have the Air Force Solid Missiles Plant at McGregor operated by Rocketdyne quartes of 12 th Air Force quartes of 12 th Air Force atWaco. We have one of the five Wregional Veterans' headquarters at regional eterans headquarters at
Waco and more Veterans' Hispitals than any other Congressional district in Texas at Waco, Marlin
and Temple. We have the headquarters of the Soil Conservation Service at Temple and are moving the headquarters of Farmes Home Administration there. We have Lake Whitney in Bosque County, Lake Belton in Bell County, ar building Lake Waco in McLennan County and expect to start on the County and expect to start on the
Stillhouse Hollow Lake in Bell County soon. We have hundred of miles of federally financed highways and numeous flood pre vention projects. Our district is served by seven local Electric Cothe Brazos Electric Power Coop
erative and of the Brazos River Authority. We cannot blame any lack of progress on the failure of the Federal Govermment to recog. nize our district.
If business is not all that we would like, it must be due to our agricultural stagnation. While our cotton production per acre in Central Texas has remained nearly tral Texas has remaned nearly
stationary, much of West Texas has doubled its per acre yield While we have been returning $\$ 150$ per acre farm land to grass, East Texas has been transferring land worth not more than $\$ 30$ into equally good pastures.
I do not feel that our situation can be blamed on our farmers. They need help from both goverrment and local business. Our research agencies must develop new crops and new techniques for handling existing crops. Heretofore; there has been a disposition to as sume that the Blacklands were so rich that there was no need for such work. At last our agricultural people are beginning to recognize the problem. There will be an inm portant meeting at A \& M Col lege early in September. The new. Administrator of FHA, Mr. Cappleman, has assured me he is going to give sperial attention to the problem of the Blacklands. I m asking other agencies to conentrate on this "problem" area I elieve that if we all recognize he problem and work at it thet he problem and work at it that we can make Centrat Texas again

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100 Years of Reunion 1861-1961


THE CIVIL WAR
CENTENNIAL
Mary Hardin-Baylor College Just 100 years ago, on July 21 1861, the Northern and Southern armies met in the first full-scale battle of the Ctvil War. The meeting took place at a little-known spot in Virginia called Manassas, and in the South the battle took its name from that little town, In the North, however, the battle came to be called Bull Run a name derived from Bull Run Creek, the small stream which meanders through the batttlefield area.
Just 100 years later, on July 22, 1961, the non-profit First Nanasenactment of that first full-scale land battle before the first of a crowd of spectators numbering more than 70,000 .
The reenactment was the tirst ces planned during the centennial of the dozens of grand observanyears of the War and cost upward of $\$ 200,000$. It required the participation of more than two thousand uniformed men 24 horse drawn cannon, dozens of wagous and caissons, nd hundreds of other items of authentic paraphernalia used by both Union and Confederate soldiers.
The re-enactment began with $u$ niformed Confederate and Union regimental units, passing the
stands in a grand review. stands in a grand review.
Only the more importnat incidents of the battle were re-enacted and perhaps the most colorful of these was the "Bee Incident," during which Confederate General nickname of "Stonewall." The name was given him by General Barnard E. Bee and General Jackson has been called "Stonewall" ever since.
