hat the measure did not go neary as far as was first proposed in the amount of federal aid and that it contained a renewal of the aid to impacted areas and the College Loan and Scholarship pro grams, both of which are popular and both of which I have suppored. It did not, however, firmly establish the principle of general Federal Aid to local schools. I do not believe that we should turn our schools over to the Federal Government. I realized that this bill was onlv an effort to get a "foot-in-the-door" and that it would be followed by a more farreaching bill. I voted against Federal Aid.
I am sure that a bill providing or payment by the Federal Go:ernment for the extra costs incur-
red by local districts where Federal installations have placed an extra burden on the schools will be brought up next week. I expet to support such a measure.
