

**DPS SEEKING GATESVILLE FUGITIVE: HANDCUFFED BUT STOL OFFICERS CAR**

The Department of Public Safety broadcast a 2-state alarm Friday for Billy G. Ezzell, 15, an escapee from SSB who stole a station wagon and car Thursday.

Sent here from Houston, he escaped 10 days ago and was caught in El Paso. A probation officer there left with him and a girl in the station wagon going to Gainesville to deliver her, and left the boy in the car handcuffed. Ezzell got into the front seat, started the wagon and it was found wrecked in northeast Cook County.

Later a 61 car was stolen at Sandusky and DPS presume Ezzell stole it.

Robert Lonnie Bailey, 15, arrived at SSB 12 hours after he was charged with stabbing an 84 year old woman to death with grass clippers.

Mrs. Martha Hathcock, mother-in-law of Big Spring Mayor Dr. Lee Rogers was the victim. Besides the stabbing, there was evidence of attempted rape.

The boy had recently been arrested on a house burglary charge and under questioning admitted 17 house burglaries at Big Spring.

The blood-covered grass clippers were found a block from the woman's home, and two granddaughters of the victim found her body bloodsoaked in her 6 room home. A note printed on paper used by school students found under her leg threatened the woman's life in obscene language. On the other side, was a Spanish lesson.

## H. A. KASTING

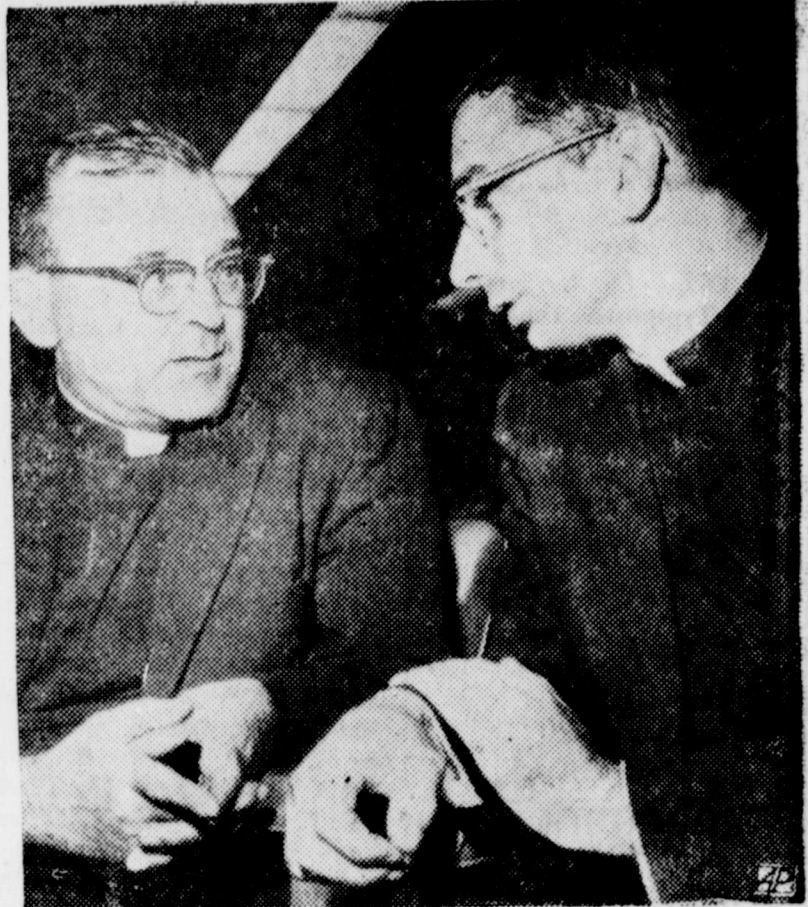
H. A. Kasting, 72, Crawford died in a Waco hospital at 3 p. m. Sept. 21 after a short illness.

## \$25,000 FOR FM ROADS IS TO BE SPENT IN THIS DISTRICT

Some \$618,000 or 24.8 miles of highway will be involved in the FM program for this district, according to District Engineer Thomas C. Collier of Waco.

Coryell County's part will be from the end of FM 2671 at McLennan County Line, south to FM 102 and St. Hwy. 236, a distance of about 1.9 miles. \$25,000 will be the cost of this.

Work will be under the supervision of Paul T. Hensler, Senior Resident Engineer, Gatesville.

This is a part of the \$15 million FM Road Construction Program for 133 counties, and some 600 miles of new FM roads will be built. This is for 1 year instead of the usual 4.

There are now 34,000 miles of FMs and much of the money appropriated goes to maintenance of these.

## Good Values In Railroad Stocks

As the Dow-Jones Industrial Averages moved into new high ground the Rail Averages sagged badly and are currently some 3% off their 1961 highs and almost 20% off their 1959 highs. There is good reason for this weakness as 1961 rail earnings will not only be below their 1960 levels but will be the lowest in several years. One fact that should not be overlooked, however, is that revenues for the second half should be substantially higher than the first half of 1961 or the second half of 1960. Furthermore, if the economy continues to improve, as is anticipated, the first half of 1962 should produce higher railroad earnings.

In June we have already seen some recovery in this trend as Class I railroads reported their highest monthly earnings of the year ahead of June 1960. These were higher even in the face of reduced revenues reflecting the benefits derived from closer control of costs. Increased defense spending and a generally upward trend in the economy indicate an improvement in revenues and the prospect of a consequent further betterment.

As the stock market continues to rise generally it becomes increasingly difficult to uncover good investment values. We have now reached the point where rail equities are one of the few groups left that are depressed and could offer potentially good investment value.

Depending on the degree of risk

one is willing to assume there are several good opportunities available. 1—Railroad stocks offering high yields where dividend appears to be in some jeopardy but could be maintained in the face of an improving earnings picture: *Chesapeake & Ohio; Chicago, Rock Island and Gulf, Mobile & Ohio.* 2—Stocks of railroads offering good investment values: *Atchafalaya, Topeka & Santa Fe; Northern Pacific; Southern Pacific and Union Pacific.* 3—Railroad issues likely to benefit from possible mergers: *Great Northern Railway; Atlantic Coast Line and Baltimore & Ohio Railroad.* 4—Depressed railroad issues that should benefit from an upturn in the economy: *Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul; Denver & Rio Grande; Illinois Central; Pennsylvania Railroad and Western Maryland.*

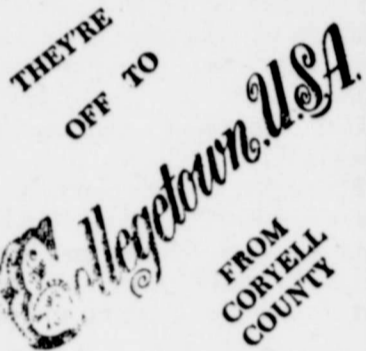

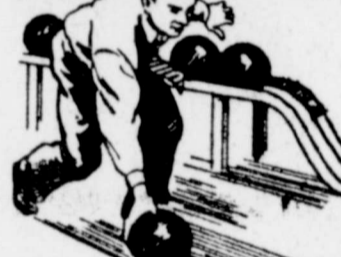

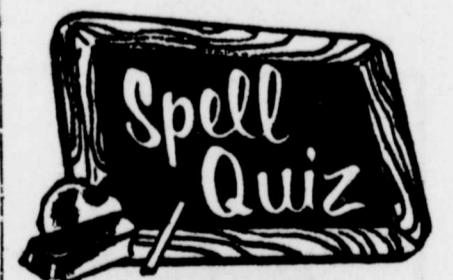
