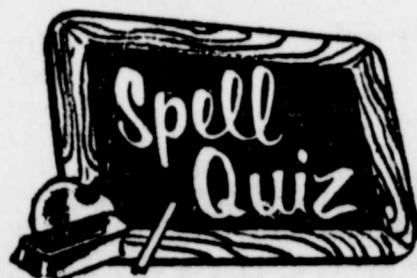

Communist Rights vs. American Rights

In the Worker of June 25, 1961 the U.S. communist conspirators published an "open letter to the American people" which they planned to distribute to hundreds of thousands of Americans. They claim that the constitutional rights of all Americans depend upon the rights of communists to continue their activities unhampered. If the communists are allowed to continue their activities without interference the American people will eventually have no rights whatsoever, because they will be in communist slavery.

In pursuing this line of deception in their open letter the communists said: "It is not for ourselves alone that we speak... In nation after nation the destruction of democratic rights of all began with the attack 'only' on the Communists. Inevitably the assault spread and sought to destroy all... That is why we say to all our fellow Americans, the bell tolls not for the Communists alone but for the hard-won rights of all Americans..." Here is a typical example of the communist conspiracy's use of the Big Lie. That lie is their claim that in nation after nation the destruction of the rights of all began with action against the communists. The exact opposite is true. In nation after nation the communist conspirators have taken over by internal subversion because the leaders and people of these nations flatly refused to recognize the true nature and objectives of the communist conspiracy.

Opposition to the communist plot for enslavement of the people does not destroy the rights of any nation's people. It never has and never will. In some countries the communists and other totalitarian socialist movements have opposed each other for control of the country, but a victory by the communists instead of the other tyranny would not have meant freedom for the people. Do not be deceived by this Red lie.

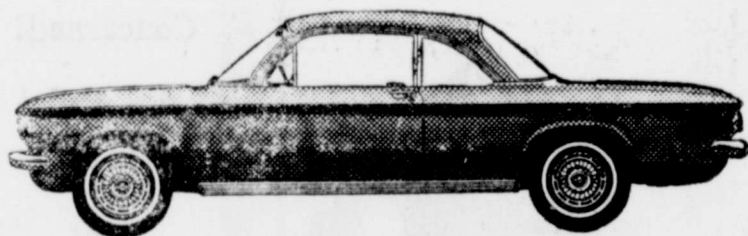
