Heads of the National Guard, and of the 49th Armored Division have been promising them plenty of action, training, hard work, etc., when they hit the new post.

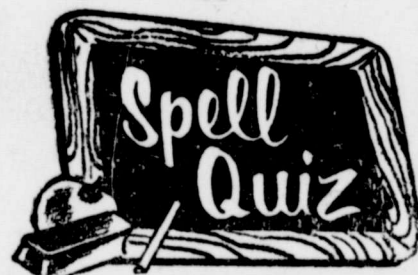
Cong. W. R. Poage Was Wednesday Lion Speaker: "Held Court" Courthouse

STATE TO TEST CORYELL HERDS

GATESVILLE—State veterinarians will start administering cat-tuberculosis tests the latter part of this month to recertify Coryell as a "modified accredited county," according to County Agent LeRoy Hoermann.

The last tests were made six years ago.

For the county to carry the modified accredited label, all dairy herds and all registered beef cattle herds must be tested along with five per cent of the range cattle in the county.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

The loss of the U. S. gold reserve has taken an increased stride as foreign nations present dollars for exchange in gold. Unless the Congress takes strong action on restoring American protective tariffs, there is every indication this trend will continue.

Half measures will not work. Early this fall there went into affect the reduction from \$500 to \$100 the amount of goods American tourists abroad can bring home duty free. While this was a step in the right direction, it also places further focus on the need for an upward revision of the tariff rates as long as European skilled labor is paid on wage scales running from 50 cents an hour on downward.



Actually, the bulk of American tourists, on limited budgets, have never bought too heavily abroad. The damage has been done by the minority of affluent means who have bought heavily in Europe.

It is doubtful this affluent minority will be impeded. After all the whole of Europe is dedicated to getting the American dollar and even Diner's Club, American Express and Carte Blanche credit cards are accepted freely for goods.

In addition, foreign governments give tourists special concessions in purchasing that their own citizens cannot get.

In many countries, the citizens of those nations must pay a stiff purchase tax on things they buy.

But even with these taxes included in the price, the price of small manufactured items, apparel, and other items using mostly raw materials produced in that country, and in which a lot of labor is involved, is 50 per cent or less than that of American goods.

But even despite this disparity, foreign governments make it even more attractive to the American with a great deal of money to spend. In France if payment is made in American currency, or American travellers checks, there is a minimum further discount of 20 per cent, and on certain items as much as 60 per cent. This discount is not given if paid in French currency.

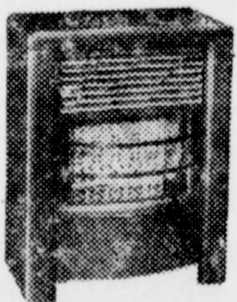
In Britain these discounts are given provided the buyer agrees to take delivery of the goods at the airport or port of embarkation, or has them mailed to his home address.

Thus, thanks to the starry-eyed "do gooders" at home who have sabotaged U. S. protective tariff laws, wealthy tourists abroad can bring home any quantity of goods, pay the prevailing low duties, and still deprive American business and labor of a substantial amount of business to say nothing of further depleting U. S. gold reserves, because as already stated, these discounts only apply when dollars are used for their purchase.

And Europeans cannot afford to buy U. S. goods, because not only do they reflect higher U. S. labor costs, but they also have lacked on foreign import duties, plus the purchase taxes.

It would seem there is a great deal of confusion as to who is kidding whom.

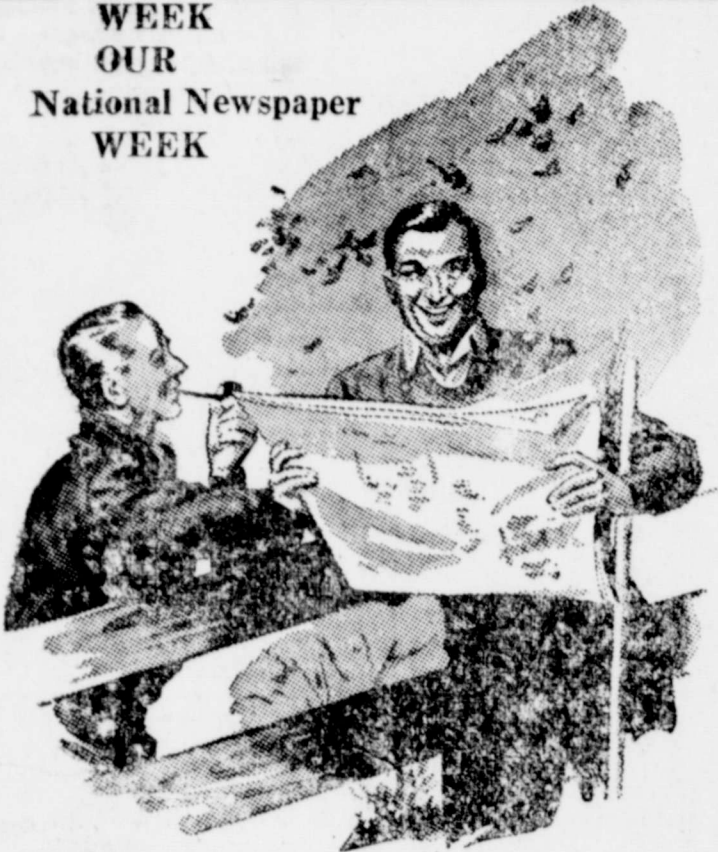

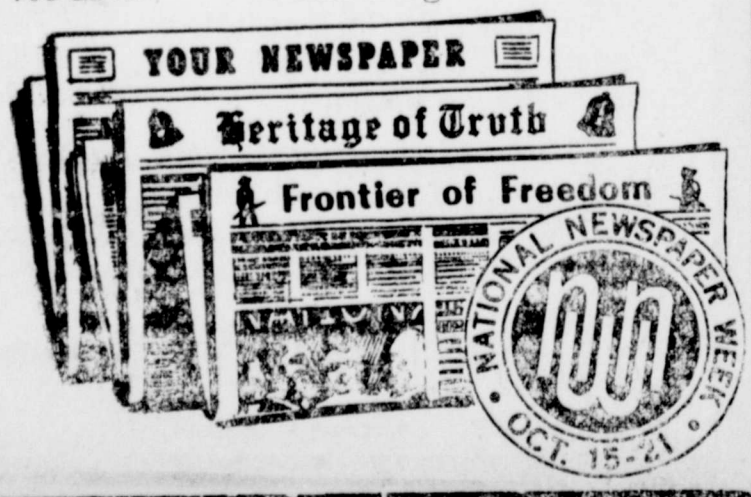

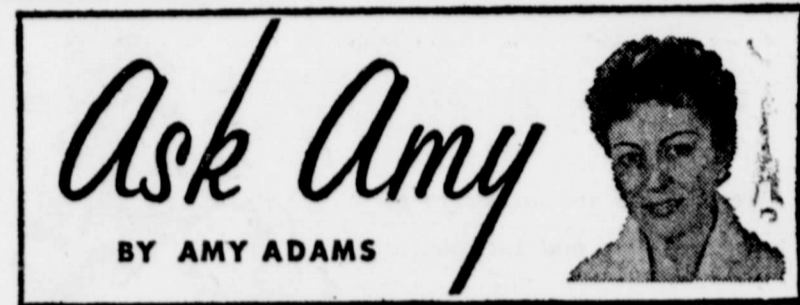

NEW FREEZING TECHNIQUE FOR GRAPE FRUIT IS DEVELOPED IN VALLEY

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., Oct. 5 (AP)—Development of a new freezing technique which will preserve individual sections of citrus fruit in frozen form has been announced by two local firms.

The announcement said the new method promises to stimulate increased use of citrus, particularly grapefruit, and could revolutionize marketing processes of the multi-million dollar crop.

Manny Sanchez, president of the Brownsville Shamp Exchange and Cold Storage Corp., and Larry Lightner, local citrus grower and shipper, said the process involves flash freezing of the tree-ripened citrus sections.

They said previous attempts to freeze citrus has resulted in ruptured cells, and when the product was defrosted it turned to mush.

They said the new process, which involves flash freezing of individual grapefruit, orange or tangerine sections results in excellent appearance and flavor.

The development and processing techniques were worked out by Lightner and the BSE & CS plant manager Jack Loff.

Loff said the defrosted sections look and taste as natural as if prepared from whole fresh fruit. He said sweetener is added when needed for flavor control.

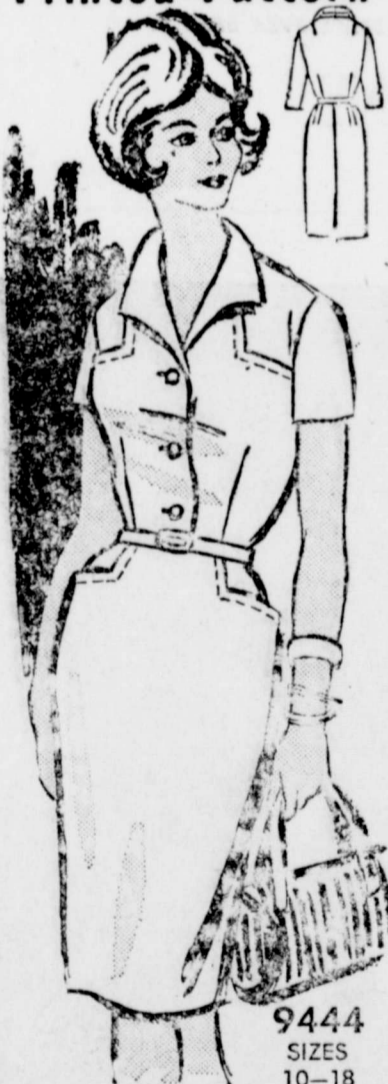

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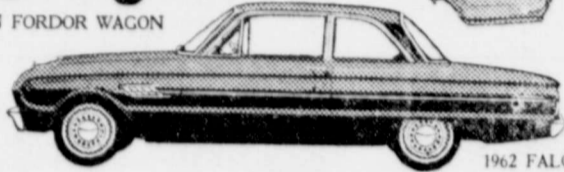
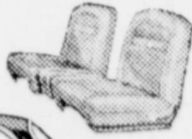
