





With complete disregard for world opinion the Russians have proceeded with their extensive program of testing atomic bombs in the most damaging manner. Most of the Russian tests have been in the air-where the greatest amount of fall out is generated They have exploded at least two super bombs which could not possibly serve any purpose except to "terrorize uniaformed people over the world. These 50 megaton bambs create lots of practicable inasmuch as a city fall out, but they are not very can be destroyed by a much maller banb.

Nor should we assume that they represent any serious advance of Russian power. Our scientists have long said that they could produce bombs of such size but we have felt that they would not actually be used. Instead, we prefer to use more smaller bombs. For instance, I am told that one B-52 can and actually does carry more destructive power in the form of a number of smaller bombs.

There are two possible explanations of the Russian action. First, it is generally supposed that they want to "scare" smaller nations. They probably succeeded in doing this. Second, I think the Russians are prone to produce super large machines of any kind, simply to show how large they can get. I have seen lots of Russian farm equipment which I felt was far too large and heavy to be practicable.


My fear is that the Russians will complete their series of test shots soon and will then announce to the world that they want to contribute to world peace and that they are, therefore, stopping all testing and challenge the U. S. to do likewise. We probably need to make some more tests, and surely we should not let the Russians coolinue to ture world tests on and off as they see fit

If we are suspend atomic tests, we must have a binding agreement with the USSR which provides for fill and effective inspection to see that there is no cheating. This the Russians have constantly refused. I think, however, that we should repeatedly remind the world that it is this Russian Phail of inspection which is holding up atomic disarmament or at least control. There may be timees when we will wat to anapunce that we are suspending tests, but we must is the sole judge unless Russia will bind herself through an refertive mutual inspection pact. We mist not let Russia dictate when we will test and symboo we will stop, and we cannot accept Russian promises to stor without the ability to see that they are keeping their word.
