

Program payments will be made to producers for conserving the diverted acres.

There is a 10 percent reduction below what the allotment would have been under previous legislative authoority.

Farmers should check with the ASC County Office about approved conservation practices to be carried out on diverted wheat acreage to comply for '62. Final signing date is Dec. 1, 1961.







My \$30 fallout shelter consists of a hole in a backyard hill, bags of dirt, and some railroad ties.

Anyone with a basement is lucky-he could build a shelter more easily, and perhaps more cheaply.






