

CHANGES IN SOCIAL SECURITY

Durelle L. Allen, TSSDO

The new amendment to the social security law, signed by President Kennedy June 30, give men early benefit rights similar to those women have had since 19-

The change applies to men between 62 and 65 years of age, and is designed especially to help those who are unable to find employment because of their age or poor health.

A man now 62 to 65 years of age can begin receiving benefits. But if he retires before he reaches age 65, the monthly amount of benefits paid to him is reduced. He will continue to be paid the reduced amount even after he reaches age 65.

Dependent widowers and the dependent fathers of workers who have died also can get benefits at age 62. Their benefits, like those of widows and dependent mothers, are not reduced.

For men who retire early, the amount by which their benefits will be reduced depends on the number of months for which they will receive benefits while still under age 65. A worker who retires and claims his benefits as soon as he reaches age 62 will qualify for 80 per cent of the amount that he would receive at age 65 based on his average earnings up until his retirement. If he waits until he is 63, he will get 86 2-3 per cent of his full benefit; and if he waits until age 64, the amount will be 93 1-3 | per cent.

The reductions are figured so that a person may expect to receive, on the average, about the same amount over his lifetime if he takes reduced benefits beginning before he is 65 or waits until age 65.

Members of the immediate family of a retired worker can get dependents' benefits if the worker retires at age 62 Eligible dependents include a wife age 62 or older, or a wife at any age if she has in her carechildren who are eligible for benefits. The child of a retired worker is eligible if he is under age 18, or he has been totally disabled since childhood.

The Committee on Finance of the Senate, in recommending this change in the law, said "The provision of benefits at age 62 for men will help to alleviate the hardships faced by that group of men who because of ill health,

To draw up a list of essentials needed in a fallout shelter, imagine you are actually living in it for 48 hours, or two weeks.

Do you have plenty of canned foods-and no can opener? Put one aside now. A jar of instant coffee, but no cup or glass?

Hot coffee, or warmed milk for a baby, could be morale boosters. If power is knocked out, have you thought to provide a supply of canned heat which burns without smoke or a camp stove if your shelter has enough room for it?

I have a friend who built a \$25,000 shelter, perhaps the best ever built. He has stocked ia well, and gone on to add a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica as a choice of reading matter. The Bible, a dictionary, Shakespeare, current novels, your selection of books taking relativel little space can help adults pass the boring time, even if the shelter only permits reading by daylight. For insurance, however, take sleeping pills too. Ask your doctor what

But let's look at true essentials for survival in your shelter.

Radio and Meter Top List

I'd list highest the transistor radio, radiation meter, flashlights and candles. AND plenty of spare batteries; checked at intervals for age and condition. Check whether YOUR shelter needs an aerial for your radio. This could be especially important in rural or farm areas and in underground shelters.

Add a shovel, even an axe and pick, in case your shelter collapses and you must dig your way out. And a broom to sweep out fallout dust, and a first aid kit.

Let me emphasize again that the main thing in protecting yourself is an understanding of what you might face, what these weapons might do, and then having the equipment to deal with situations.

You need water. Your shelter should have a minimum of five gallons of bottled water per person using the shelter. Plan a 14-day supply, go easy n the water at the outset.

Some bottled water could be left just outside the entrance of a cramped shelter, but within easy reach. Cover it with paper or plastic film, which would hold off any fallout dust setling down-then flip off the paper or film and bring the water inside. X-rays from the fallout will not harm the water one iota, nor make IT radioactive and the same thing holds for food too. You must not eat the dust itself but the radiation doesn't hurt the food. Wash the food or open acan and it willbe safe.

If you run out of water, tap water still is safe IF your supply comes from deep wells. But if your town or city depends on Dear Friends: open reservoirs, the water could be contaminated by dust.


