APPROPRIATIONS BLLL - Last week the Senate Finance presented it to the rest of the Subcommittee completed its work on the appropriations bill and committee members. MILK BILL - The Senate Public Health Committee approved the bill known as "The Texas Dairy Industry Stabilization Act" and sent it to the Senate floor for action. If passed, this Act will create the Texas Dairy Commission which will control the price of milk products and frozen dairy products. The 'stabilization plan' would be an insurance for the dairy farmer, the processor, and the retailer in the store. I did not vote for this bill in the committee because it is now a price fixing measure from start to finish and it will result in the consumer paying higher prices for milk.
