APPROPRIATIONS BILL -



You Can Help Too Join Up . . . Join In Last week the Senate Finance presented it to the rest of the Subcommittee completed its work on the appropriations bill and committee members. The five member subcommittee, on which I served, recommended a biennial appropriations bill totaling \$4.7 billions from all funds to finance the operations of State government for the 1968-69 biennium. There are some groups who feel that this appropriation is 'inadequate', but I do not agree— it is an increase over last session's bill which was 3.6 billion dollars. This represents about 30 percent increase over the present biennium.

THE SUBCOMMITTEE considered the issue of state employee's salaries as one of its top priority decisions and recommended a compensation plan that would provide increases of 18 to 30 percent for classified employees. About 200 hours of work and study were devoted to determing

the various funds of the appropriations and I think that we presented a very good bill. The full Finance Committee approved NEWS the bill and cleared it for action on the Senate floor.

MILK BILL - The Senate Public Health Committee approved the bill known as "The Texas Dairy Industry Stabilization Act" and sent it to the Senate floor for action. If passed, this Act will create the Texas Dairy Commission which will control the price of milk products and frozen dairy products. The 'stabilization plan' would be an insurance for the dairy farmer, the processor, and the retailer in the store. I did not vote for this bill in the committee because it is now a price fixing measure from start to finish and it will result in the consumer paying higher prices for milk.

TEXAS BEAUTY - MISS JUDI LACKEY, from Itasca, visited the Senate last Thursday before going to Long Beach, California, where she will represent Texas at the World's Oldest and largest Beauty Pageant, The International Beauty Congress. 

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

What To Do In a Tornado

• People in open country can view the approach of a tornado and move at right angles to its path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.

• In towns or cities, seek shelter inside, preferably in a substantial building. Stay away from windows.

• The southwest corner of the basement of a frame house is safer than in a brick or stone house. If there is no basement, lie down on the first floor under a table or bed (preferably in the southwest corner).

• Urban schools: Stay inside, away from windows; remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums.

 Rural schools of frame construction: Teachers should remove children to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.
