WON'T BE LONG AND YOU CAN GET UP IN "THE WILD BLUE YONDER"

If the cable gets here from Rome, New York, and is installed at the City-County Airport on FM 116, you can get up in "the wild blue wonder" it is said. It just likes about 20 percent of being completed, at a cost by Odell Greer Construction Co., Harker Heights for about \$49,489.84, which does not include the land. The cable will be used for low density lighting.

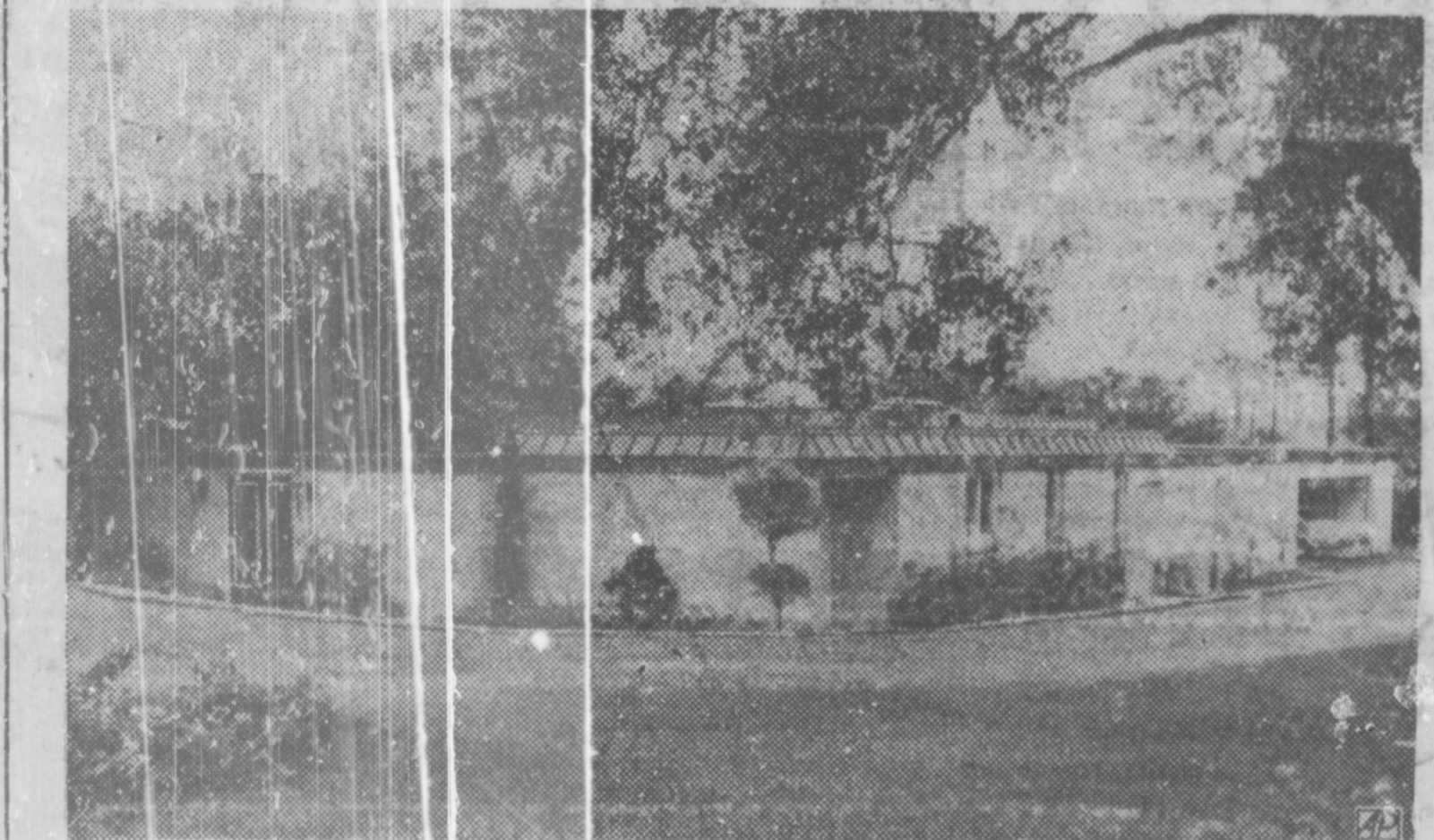
A city-county airport board will be formed—5 of them—to administer the facility. It will have a 34,000 foot runway 50 feet wide and a 30-foot wide paved taxiway turnaround at each end, and a 100 x 200 ft. paved parking apron near the center of the airport.

Eber Vise is resident inspector of the project which is being built jointly by the Federal Aviation Agency, Texas Aeronautics Commission and with city and county funds.

White Hall Road another construction possibility is the 5-mile White Hall road, to be designated as a FM and runs from near MV School to the old White Hall School. Designation of the road and construction will probably be within the next two years.

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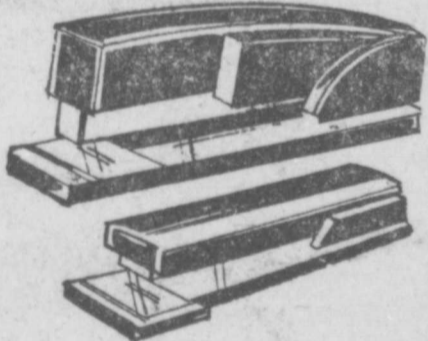
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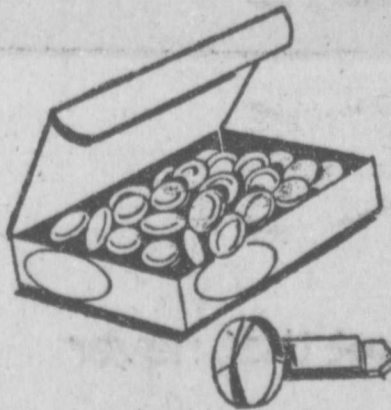

Spoon 2 tablespoons batter into hot skillet. Tilt to form a round pancake. Bake until bubbles appear and begin to break. Loosen edges and turn to brown other side. Makes about 20.

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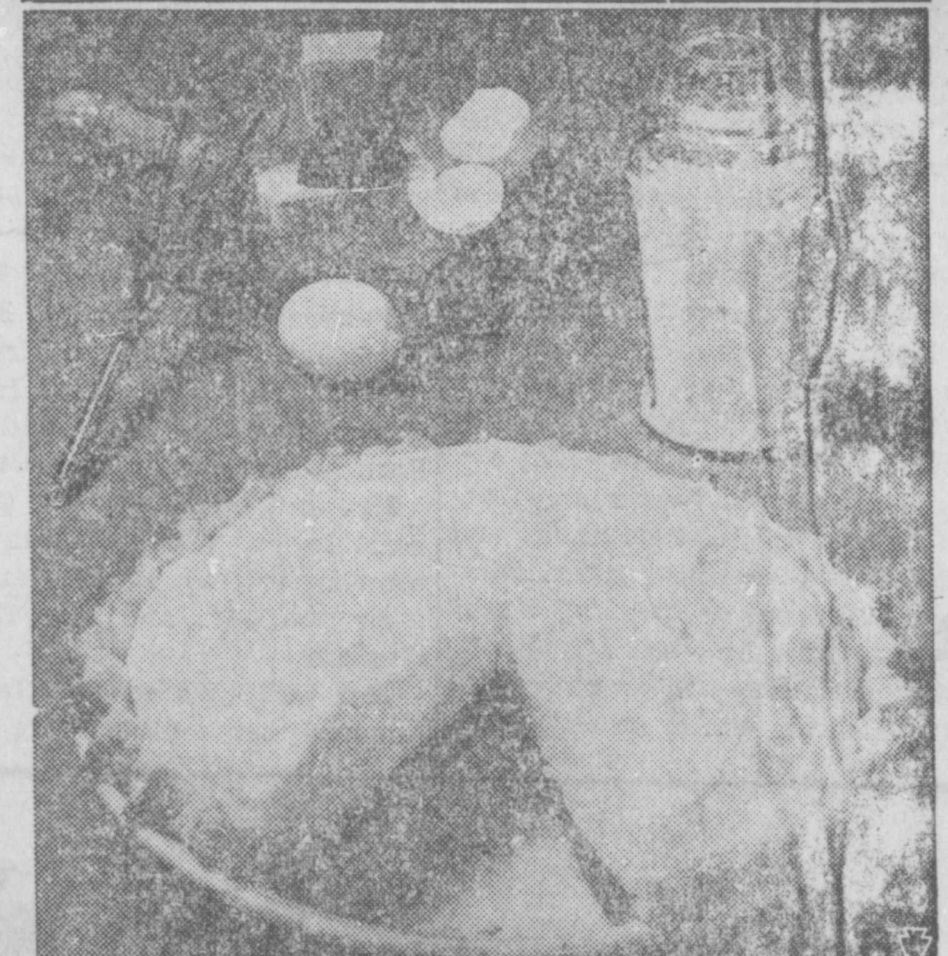

Sprinkle gelatin over cold water; let soften. Combine 1/2 cup sugar, corn starch and salt in double boiler top. Gradually add milk, stirring until smooth. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly, until thickened. Cover; cook 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Meanwhile, prepare pastry. Stir a little hot mixture over boiling water. Cook 2 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from boiling water. Measure 3/4 cup mixture into large bowl. Blend in softened gelatin, stirring until gelatin is completely dissolved. Mix in rum. Period of Adjustment

The action of the stock market so far this year has been—in a word—breathtaking. The upside strength has been unusual... the breadth remarkable... and the volume—almost without precedent. While there may be justification for this "spectacular performance"—particularly the easing of interest rates, and the greater availability of credit—the market may be vulnerable to at least a moderate adjustment.



In view of the extent of this recovery—plus the unusually short period of time during which it has been accomplished—it would seem wise to expect (at least) such a period of consolidation.

Historically the market has never gone straight up or straight down without this kind of corrective pause or breather and it seems to me to be imprudent now to expect a change in this historic pattern. Thus, I feel that while there is still a great deal of strength in our economy all the problems have not been solved.

A friend of mine—a leading Wall Street observer—recently sounded a note of caution when he questioned the wide disparity in price/earnings ratios, which shows many glamour and growth stocks selling at 30 to 40 times earnings while stocks in the Dow Jones Average are

selling at about 14.5 times estimated 1967 earnings.

Companies selling at such high multiples have demonstrated unusual earnings growth and such issues may be suitable for investors who recognize the risks and are financially able and willing to assume them.

However, major chemical companies, such as, Allied and duPont, as well as major oil companies like Standard Oil of New Jersey appear to me to offer real investment value. And—because of substantially lower price/earnings ratios—such issues represent considerably less downside risk.

These companies have enormous resources, good management and are investing millions of dollars each year in research and development. Thus it is not likely that these companies are going to be "left behind."

In the current atmosphere where the outlook is obscure because of questions involving the outcome of Vietnam... possible increases in income taxes—and additional Federal legislation which may exert pressure on profit margins the prudent investor should adopt a cautious attitude and approach to the whole investment picture.

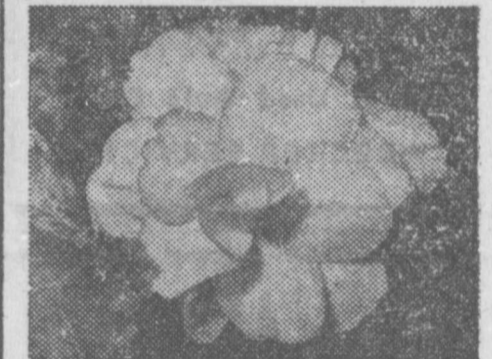

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A Word from Austin

RULE CHANGE?— In the Senate last week, a bill was introduced that will hopefully change the present rule concerning eligibility requirements for participating in Texas Interscholastic League contests. Under this bill, neither a person nor his school forfeits eligibility to participate

in Interscholastic League events if the person changes schools because he is the child of a member of the U. S. Armed Forces, a member of the Texas Legislature, of a clergyman, or if he is transferred from one school district to another by court order.

I know of many instances where a fine young athlete is denied opportunity to participate in sporting events merely because their families had moved from one school to another. If passed, this bill will somewhat alleviate this situation. These youngsters need more than ever before -- to have the outlet of their energies on the athletic field.

METROPOLITAN PACKAGE — A group of bills, called the Governor's "Metropolitan Package", was heard by the Counties, Cities, and Towns Committee last Tuesday night. The hearing lasted about three and a half hours and the bills were finally referred to a subcommittee, consisting of Sen. Joe Christie, Sen. Ralph Hall, and myself, for further study and debate. These bills primarily call for the voluntary association of local governments, metropolitan planning and co-operation, and creating assistance agencies. There will be some amendments to these bills and I hope they can

offers or assistance by the State to county or local governments, but no effort of the State to control or dictate to the local government.

CRIMINAL CODE — The people of Texas are entitled to the toughest Criminal Code that the United States Supreme Court will allow. A new criminal code was brought before the Senate last Monday, but the members voted against considering the Code at that time so that more study could be devoted to the Code and amendments could be added. I intend to work closely with representatives of police and sheriff associations in an attempt to cure the defects now present in the Code. One of the main amendments that will be offered will be to allow oral confessions in State Courts. With spiraling rise in the crime rate, we need to put the law breaker on notice that his criminal acts will result in swift and sure punishment.

ECONOMY RUN SHOWS 1967 CARS GET BETTER MILEAGE

DETROIT — Three Plymouths, a Chrysler, a Mercury, a Chevrolet and a Buick won class honors in the recent 1967 Mobil Economy Run from Los Angeles to Detroit.

Termed one of the most grueling in the 31-year history of the event this year's run covered 2,886.5 miles in six days.

The 41-car fleet encountered gasoline-devouring freeway driving, ice-laced mountain passes, snow, wind, rain and a time consuming fire in Chicago. Despite these hazards, the cars averaged 19.9884 miles per gallon, reversing a six-year downward trend in the event which has become the fuel economy yardstick for America's newest passenger cars.

Winning the six cylinder compact car class was a Plymouth Valiant which averaged 24.57 mpg, the highest of any car in this year's competition. A second Plymouth, a Barracuda,

inder compact car class.

In the intermediate size six cylinder class the winner was a Mercury Capri, and a Plymouth Belvedere II was the winner in the eight cylinder intermediate size class. It was piloted by a first-time Economy Run driver.

The tightest contest of the eventsaw a Chevrolet Impala SS nose out a Ford Custom 500 on the very last leg. The margin here was so close that United States Auto Club officials, who supervise the run, double checked all their computations.

Women drivers scored better mileage than their male counterparts for the second straight year averaging 20.60 miles to the gallon vs 19.81.

While virtually all class winners returned better mileage than last year, the greatest improvement was shown in the low price six cylinder compact car class. Here, four cars in a field of eight bettered last year's

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
