Black Bottom Pie

- 1 baked 9-inch pastry shell 1 envelope unflavored gelatin
- 1/4 cup cold water
- 1 cup sugar
- 3 tablespoons corn starch
- 1/2 teaspoon salt 2 cups milk
- 4 egg yolks, slightly beaten
- 1/3 cup light corn syrup

1/4 cup light rum or orange

- 11/2 ounces unsweetened chocolate, melted
- 1 teaspoon vanilla 4 egg whites

juice

1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar

Sprinkle gelatin over cold water; let soften. Combine 1/2 cup sugar, corn startch and salt in double boiler top. Gradually add milk, stirring until smooth. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly, until thickened. Cover; cook 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Meanwhile, prepare pastry. Stir a little hot mixture over boiling water. Cook 2 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from boiling water. Measure ¾ cup mixture into large bowl. Blend in softened gelatin, stirring until gelatin is completely dissolved. Mix in rum. Stir corn syrup into remaining custard, then blend in chocolate and vanilla. Pour chocolate custard into pastry shell. Beat egg whites with cream of tartar until soft peaks form when beater is raised. Gradually add remaining ½ cup sugar, beating until stiff peaks form. Fold into rum custard. Pour on top of chocolate custard in pastry shell. Chill.

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
