Senators Wayne Morse of Oregon, Jacob Javits of New York, and Frank Lausche of Ohio are among those seeking proposals for the revision and strengthening of labor laws to deal with national emergencies.

Senator Morse introduced a bill to compel the striking union to return to work for a period of six months while the par-ties continue to negotiate.

The legislation sponsored by Sen Javits gives the President "one last-resort weapon" that can be utilized if all else fails. If fact-finding negotiations with recommendations plus a cooling-off period should fall, the President would then be empowered to go to court to request a special receiver to op-erate the struck property.
