Juvenile Crime Meeting Slated In Gatesville

Some of the state's top authorities in the field of juvenile behavior will speak at Friday's Central Texas Conference on Crime and Delinquency to be held by the Texas State Juvenile Officers Association at the State Schools for Boys.

More than 300 law enforcement officers and workers concerned with the juvenile problem are expected to attend the day long session. Registration will begin at 8:30 a. m., with the program starting at 9:30 a. m.

"The Juvenile and the Court" will be discussed by Judge Eva Barnes of Ft. Worth's Court of Domestic Relations. "The Juvenile and Law Enforcement" will be the topic of W. Joe Perry, chief of the Juvenile Section of the Austin Police Department.

Louis Tomaino, director of the Institute of Law and Behavioral Science at the University of Texas will discuss "Juvenile Behavior."

Clinton Kersey, director of parole for the Texas Youth Council will review legislative progress in the 60th session of the Texas Legislature.

Mack O. Morris, assistant superintendent of the Mountain View School for Boys, is president of the Texas State Juvenile Officers Association and will deliver the opening remarks at the conference.

Co-sponsoring the regional conference with TSJOA are the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce, Coryell County Sheriff's Department and the Coryell County Bar Association.

TEXAS FARM NET INCOME UP IN '66: PAYMENTS TO TEXAS FARMERS SOAR

Average Texas farm increased its net income by 32 percent to \$6,120 in 1966, according to a report by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Both the percent of increase and average net income surpassed the national average which rose 19 percent to \$5,024.

Government payments in Texas were higher than in any other state—soaring from \$198.8 million to \$451.9 million in 1966.

Production expenses were higher in 1966, resulting from increases for purchased livestock and feed.

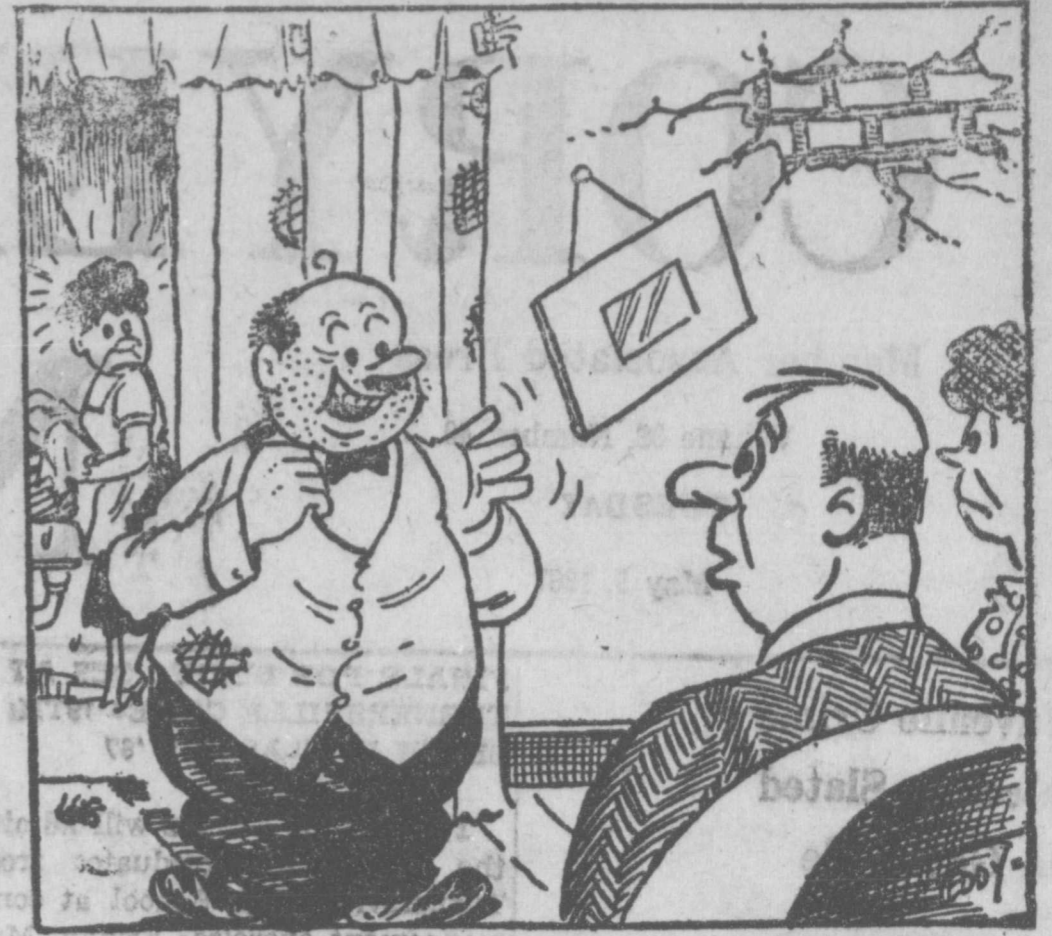

TREMENDOUS TRIFLES

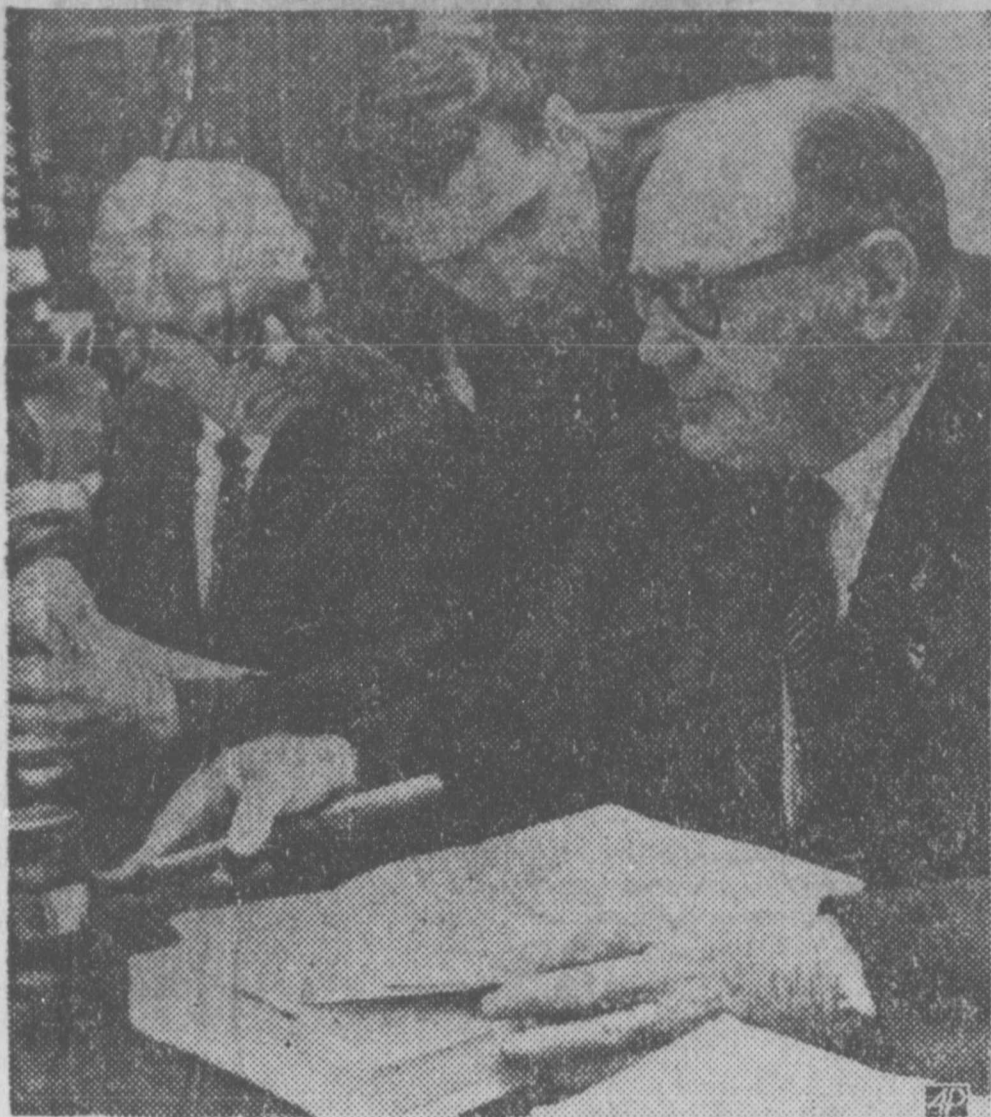

A Word from Austin

ASTRONAUT JAMES LOVELL visited the State Capitol on May 3 and spoke to a joint session of the Legislature about the space program. Capt. Lovell, who has spent more hours in space than any other man, presented the State of Texas with a Flag of the Lone Star State which made the historic Gemini 7 flight with Lovell and Astronaut Frank Borman. I was very pleased to have had an opportunity to meet and visit with Capt. Lovell and to see the film that he took while in orbit.

THE SENATE COMMITTEE on Legislative, Judicial, and Congressional Redistricting have been having organizational meetings this past week. As chairman of this committee, I feel a great responsibility to take careful concern in this area. I hope, and feel confident, that we in the Legislature can redistrict with as little disturbance to the present districts as possible. I will have a final report on the Redistricting Committee's action in a few weeks.

NO BLACKOUT? — A bill which would prohibit television blackouts of professional football games in certain circumstances was approved for floor action by the Senate State Affairs Committee last Monday. If passed, no

television station may "blackout" a professional football game telecast in any area if all admission tickets to the game were sold out not less than five days before the scheduled date of the game. I expect the Senate to act upon this bill in a very short time.

OPEN MEETINGS — A long sought bill prohibiting most governmental bodies from holding secret meetings was passed by the Senate last Thursday. I co-signed this open session bill and I think the public is entitled to know the manner in which their business is being conducted at all times. The measure prohibits any governmental body from closing regular, special or called special meetings to the public, with a few exceptions. The exceptions include deliberations pertaining to hiring or firing of an employee or a complaint against a public employee unless he wants a public hearing, discussions of security matters, or discussions of real estate.

VIOLATIONS would carry a fine of \$25 to \$200 on the first offense and \$100 to \$500 on subsequent offenses. Any member of a board who agreed to a closed meeting would violate the law. I believe

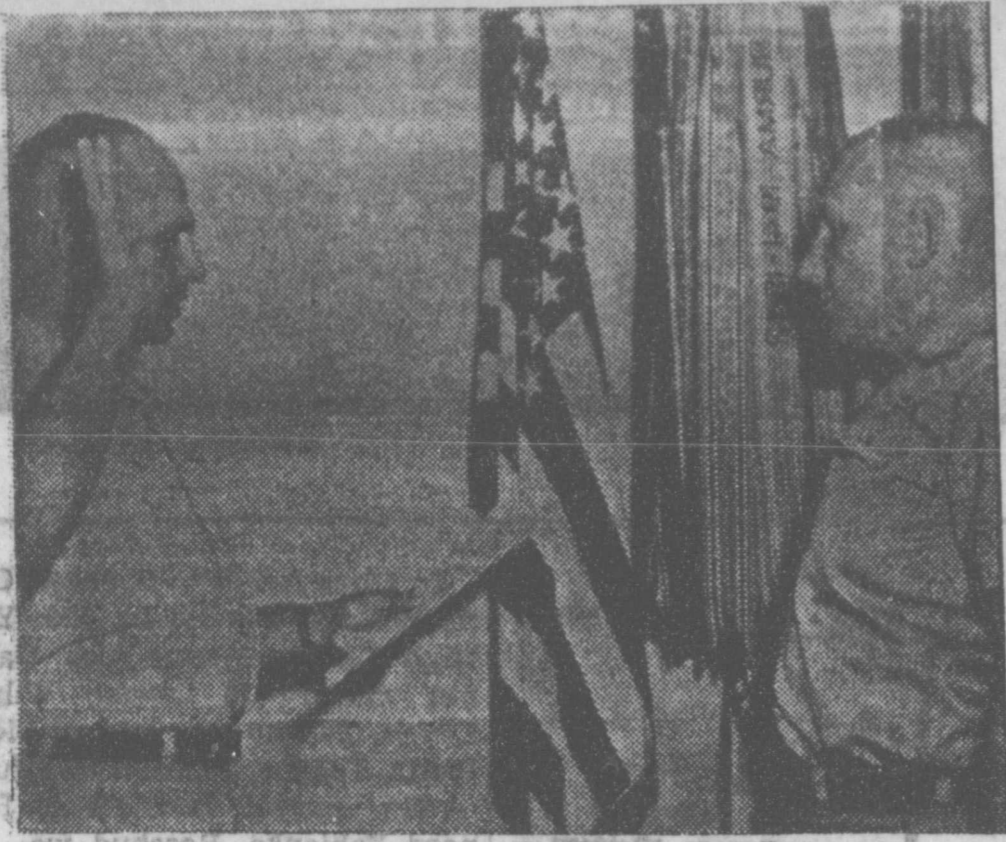

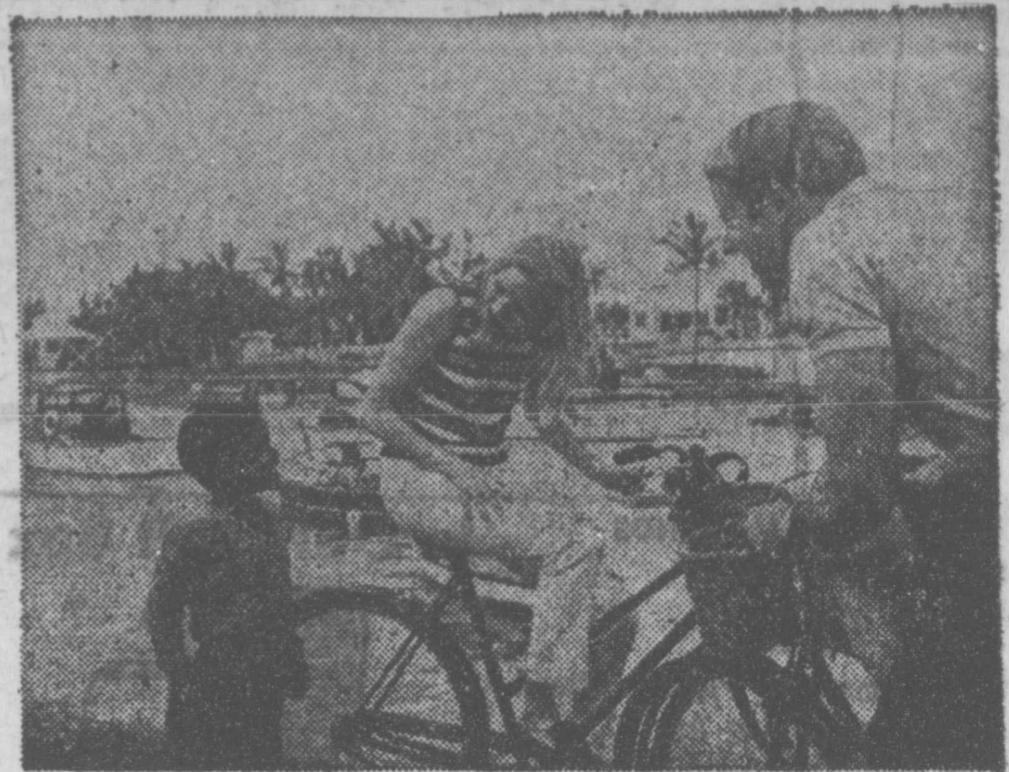

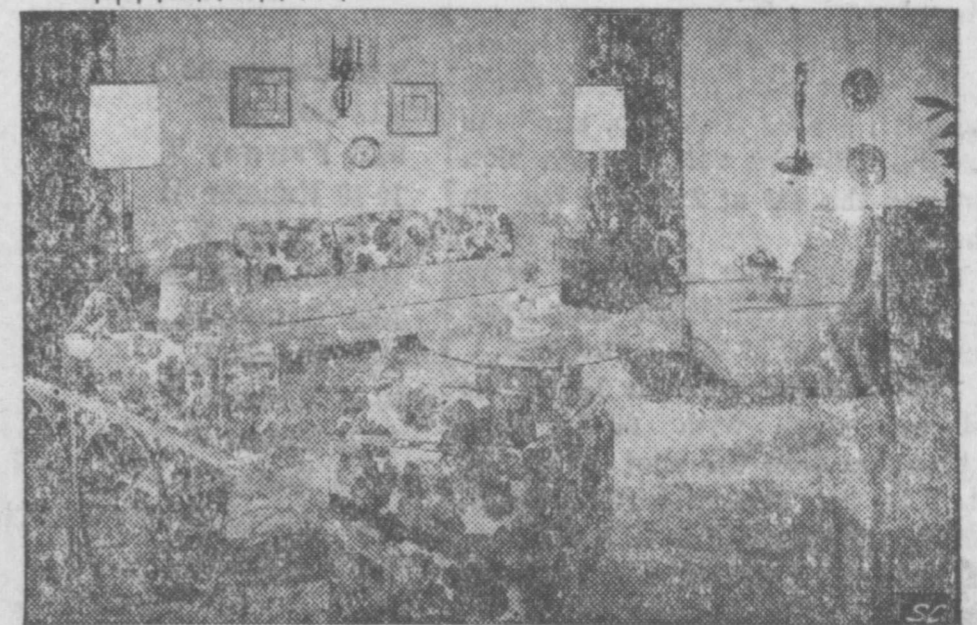
