CLIFFORD N. WORTHY GETS STATE HEALTH DEPARTMENT CITATION

Clifford N. Worthy of Turnersville, who is plant operations specialist for the Turnersville Water Supply Corporation has received a citation from the State Health Department for work proficiency.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water and Sewerage Works Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management. A plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of work experience; attended regional and statewide short schools, and passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

SEVEN DIE IN TRUCK-CAR CRASH AT STAR TUESDAY

A car-truck accident in Star Tuesday afternoon about 5:30 claimed the lives of 7 people and left others in critical condition.

The dead are: Hobart Anderson of Hickory, N. C., relief truck driver; Earl Thomas Waller, his wife, Pauline Kyle Waller, Linda 5, Eugene 11, Frank 3, Michael 1 1/2 of Athens, Alabama.

Survivors are Paul Leon Justin of Connelys Springs, N. C., driver of the truck; Ray Waller 7, Eddie Waller 8, who are in Goldthwaite Hospital, and Brenda 9 and Robert Wade Waller 4, who are in Scott and White Hospital in Temple.

The Waller car was traveling west on Highway 84 and attempted to make a left hand turn into a station when struck by the truck hauling for 3M Corporation, which was traveling east. The truck pulled off on the shoulder of the road in an effort to avoid the accident and overturned, then caught fire. The Evant fire truck was called and the fire was soon extinguished. The relief driver who was killed was pinned under the truck and it was some time before his body could be removed.

The injured and dead were conveyed by ambulances from Roy Wilkins Funeral Home, Goldthwaite and Evant Funeral Home, Evant.

WASHINGTON AND

"SMALL BUSINESS"

In the continuous 1966 field survey by the National Federation of Independent Business, a special question block was inserted in the May study asking what effect the increase in minimum wages would have on independent business operations. Out of 7,246 independent proprietors answering, 41 per cent said it would increase prices and 23.4 per cent stated it would reduce employment.

Now, Congress has raised the legal minimum hourly wage to \$1.40 to go into effect February, 1967, increasing to \$1.60 in 1968. An unanticipated by-product of this well-intentioned legislation is the fact that with each minimum wage increase there has been a proportionate increase in unemployment among the unskilled and minority groups.

Lawrence Fertig, Financial and Business columnist stated the cold statistics in the San Francisco Chronicle: "When employers are compelled by law to pay a higher wage for the least skilled, they tend to economize on labor and to hire the more skilled workers. Raising the minimum wage penalizes the workers we most want to help—Negroes, teenagers and the generally unskilled."

Almost 6 million workers will be eligible for a wage increase under the new law. The millions now earning medium and higher wages will also demand an increased wage, and the inevitable consequence of this will be a corresponding escalation of all national wage rates.

Prices will again be pushed upward and the inflationary balloon will soar higher. But when the actual buying power of today's increased paycheck is carefully scrutinized, it is found that there has been a decrease in potency.

Here is the official word from the Bureau of Labor statistics: "Net spendable earnings represent the factory worker's average weekly pay after deduction of Social Security and Federal income taxes. In June, net spendable earnings of a worker with 3 dependents totaled \$99.22, up \$2.23 over a year earlier, and those of a single worker totaled \$91.35, up \$2.06 over a year earlier. The increases reflected a rise in hourly earnings and a slightly longer work week. They would have been perceptibly larger had not the January hike in Social Security taxes reduced after-tax earnings."

"Real Spendable Earnings represent the buying power of the worker's net spendable earnings after readjustment for changes in the Consumer Price Index. In June, real earnings of the family of 4 were \$87.88, down 21c from a year earlier, and those of a single worker were \$80.91, down 19c."

Caught in this cyclone are the people least able to protect themselves—the aged, retired, others on fixed incomes.

And aside from rising prices of food, medicine and other necessities, greater payroll withholding, excise taxes, and sky-high loan rates further dilute paychecks, buying power, and general economic well-being. Minimum wage laws deprive many of the right to work for what their individual abilities would otherwise allow them to earn.

THE FIVE DOLLAR HORSE PURCHASE THAT TURNED INTO A MILLION

A down-at-the-heels man once approached a St. Louis horse trader named Dan Honig with an offer to sell his horse, sight unseen, for five dollars. Expecting only a plug, Honig bought the horse out of charity. In just a few years that horse made him a million dollars and he retired with his fortune! Here's how.

When Honig and his son got the horse, they found a spirited well-formed animal instead of the spavined creature they had been expecting. Honig was convinced that there was something wrong with the horse, but the son insisted that they give it the best of care and attention for a few days and see what developed.

Honig and his son became curious about just what the horse could do. They entered him in a Fair Grounds race. They decided on the name *All-Black*. His chances of winning that first race were quoted at one hundred to one. 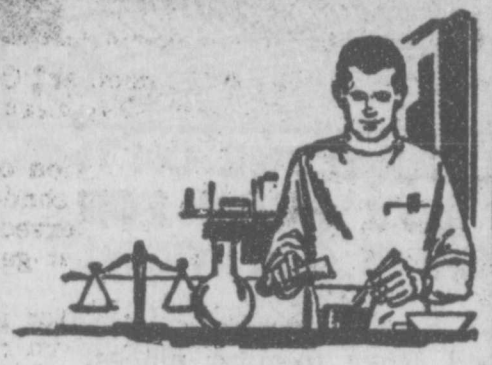

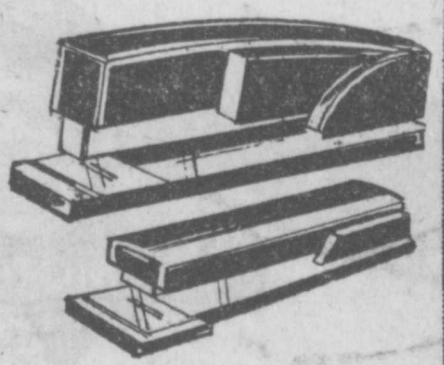

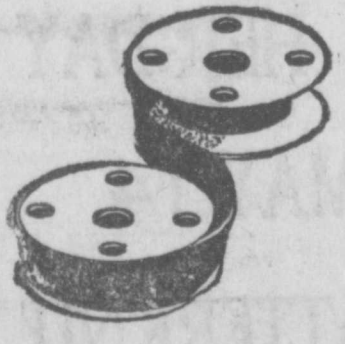

Stir in flour and cook until browned. Break up tomatoes by stirring with fork and add to green pepper mixture; blend thoroughly. Add sour cream and seasonings. Return meat balls to sauce and heat. Serve over bed of hot rice. Makes 6 servings.

Rice bags tied with blue ribbons, were distributed to guests.

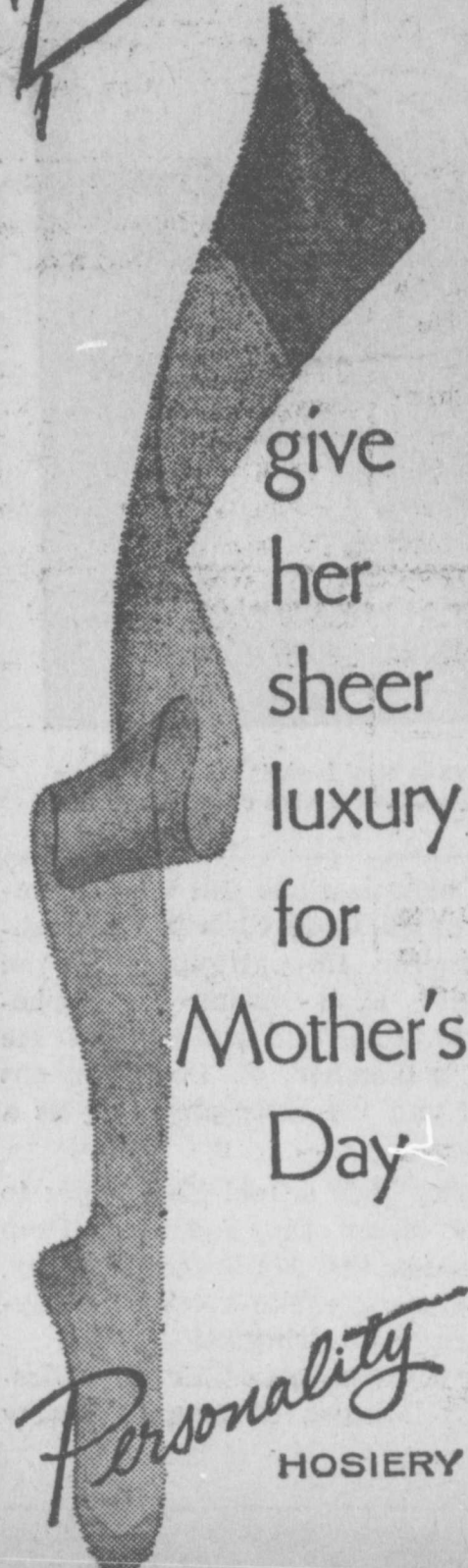

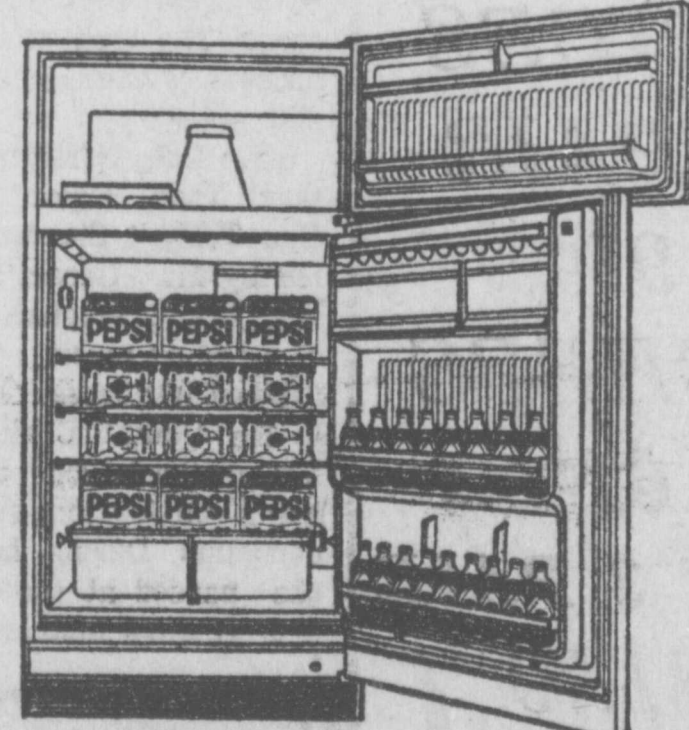

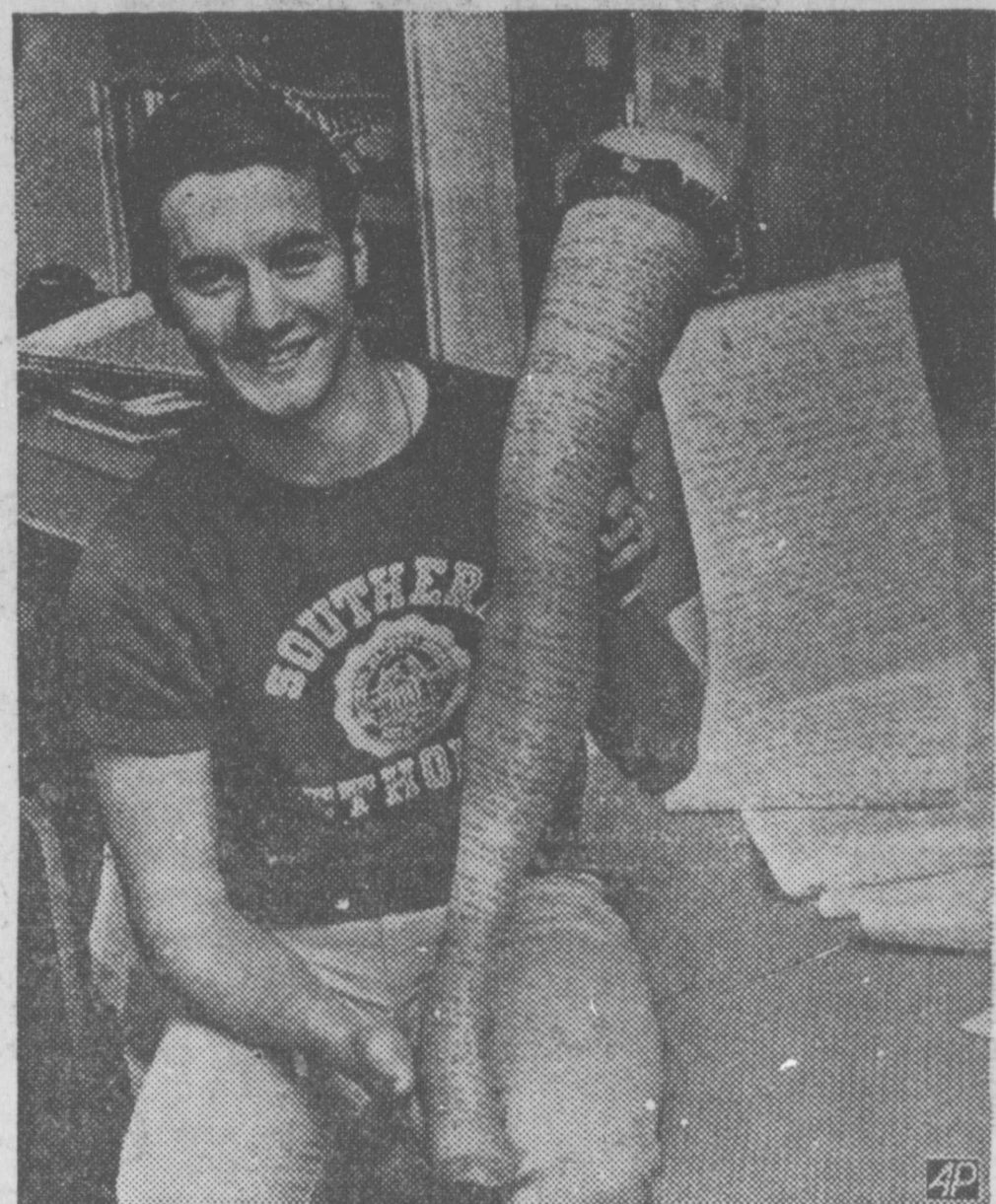
