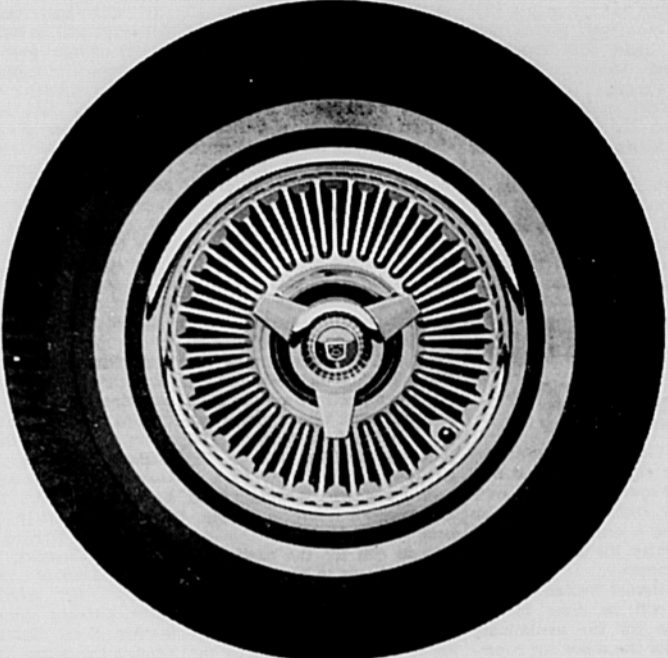

Masonic Lodge, Hella Temple Shrine and is a Scottish Rite 32nd degree Mason. He is a registered state professional engineer.

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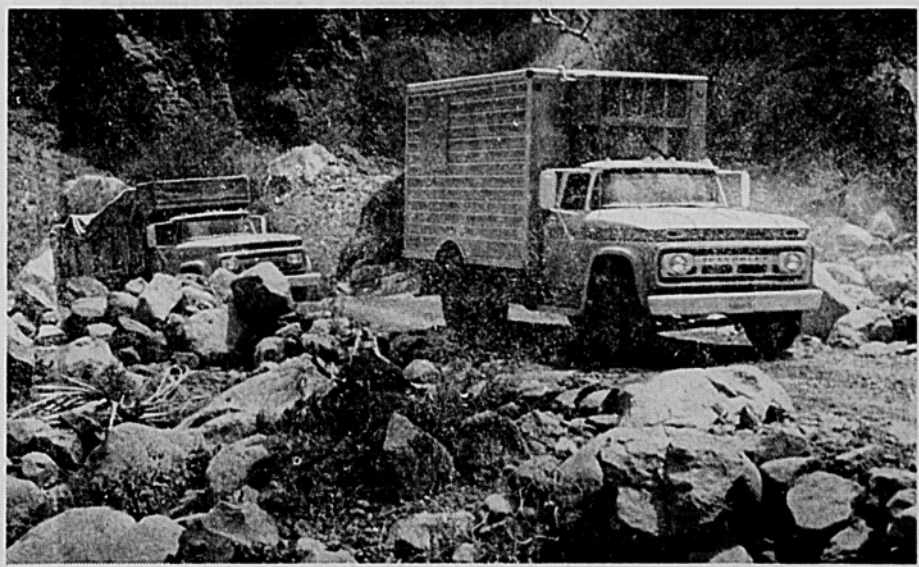

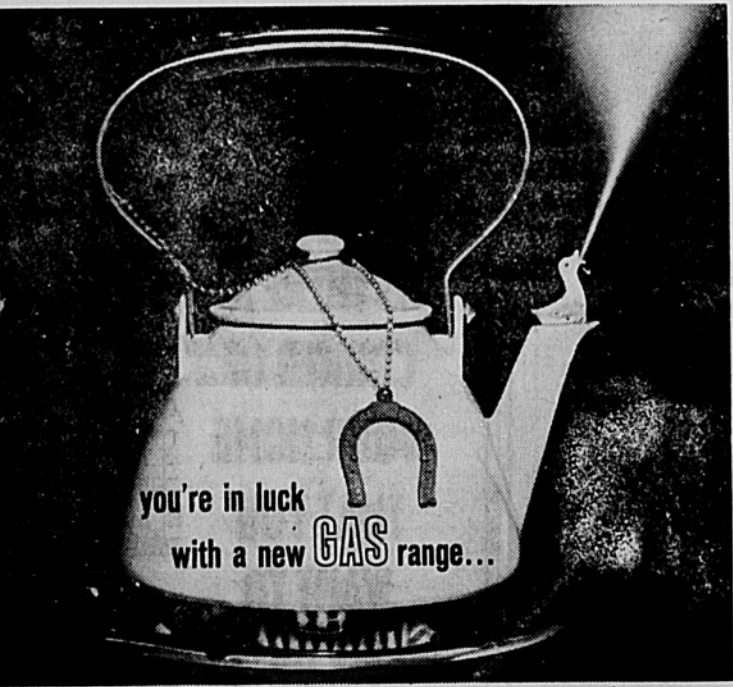

Bulldogs Down Buffaloes 40-14

Clyde unleashed a potent attack at Bulldog Stadium Friday night as they routed a game but undermanned Cross Plains Buffalo team 40-14 in a District 10-A contest.

For the Bulldogs, the win was their seventh of the season in nine starts and their third in district play. Cross Plains stands 1-8 for the season.

Wingback Rickey Dennis galloped 34 yards around right end for Clyde's first touchdown early in the first period and tailback Alton Brannon ran the extra points across.

Cross Plains came back with a touchdown midway in the same period on a 21-yard pass from quarterback Derrell Wyatt

to left end Scott Odom. Wyatt ran the extra points to tie the game 8-8.

Late in the same period, Ed Ramos scored from four yards out for Clyde to give the Bulldogs a 14-8 first quarter lead.

Clyde quarterback Buddy Howe passed to Dennis for six more points on a play that covered 63 yards in the second quarter. Brannon circled left late in the stanza for another Bulldog touchdown. Howe hit Dennis on a short pass for the extra points.

Brannon scored again for Clyde in the third on a seven yard jaunt. The try for the extra point failed and the Bulldogs were held until late in the game.

After Cross Plains halfback Jim Hargrove had scored in the waning minutes, the Buffaloes tried an on-sides kick that backfired. The ball was taken in the air by Clyde's center George Dy-

er who ran 50 yards for a last

minute Bulldog touchdown.

The Bulldog's now stand second in the district behind defending champion Albany.

**Check Up On Your
Social Security**
By Fay Ford

As the social security repre-
sentative who comes to Baird
every quarter, I want to give you
an important reminder.

All of us are interested in our
financial standing; therefore,
we are always checking on our
bank accounts, saving accounts,
and on our other assets.

The Social Security Adminis-
tration would like to remind you
of another account — one that
should be checked from time to
time. This, of course, is your so-

cial security account. This is
especially important if you have
more than one employer in the
course of a year.

If you are one of the 9 out of
10 working Americans with a so-
cial security card, the Social
Security Administration is keep-
ing a record of the earnings re-
ported to your account. Year af-
ter year for as long as you work
in employment covered by the
social security law, regular re-
ports of your earnings are sent
to the Social Security Adminis-
tration in Baltimore, Maryland,
to be added to your own person-
al social security record. It is
this personal work history that
will be used to figure the amount
of social security bene-

fits payable to you and your
family in the future.

Have you checked your social
security record in recent years?
Do you know whether all your
earnings have been correctly
credited to your social security
account? If your answer is "no"
to either of these questions, you
should take action now.

Your Abilene social security
office has a post card form with
which you can request a state-
ment of the earnings credited to
your social security account or
you can get one from me on my
next visit. You need only fill it
out, sign, stamp and mail it.
When you receive the statement,
check it carefully.

If your own records, such as
payroll slips, forms W-2, do not
agree with the amounts shown
on your social security earnings
statement, you should write or
visit your local social security
office immediately. The time in
which corrections can be made
is limited.

I will be at the County Court
House on Wednesday, November

to talk with you about your own
social security account and its
worth to you and your family.

1963 WHEAT PROGRAM

The voluntary diversion pro-
gram for the 1963 wheat crop
"gives wheat farmers an oppor-
tunity to make needed adjust-
ments in the wheat production
level and thus protect the gain
made this year under the 1962
wheat stabilization program,"
Secretary of Agriculture Orville
L. Freeman said in announcing
the special 1963 wheat program.

"The voluntary acreage reduc-
tion provisions — provided an
interim basis to help keep wheat
supplies down until the long-
range program included in the
legislation just passed can be
voted on by farmers for the 1964
crop," he declared.

"As a result of the 1962 pro-
gram, wheat production this
year is at the lowest level in 5
years. This will mean a sub-
stantial reduction in wheat car-
ryover stocks.

"The long-range wheat pro-
gram which is authorized for
1964 and subsequent crops is a
major step toward a permanent
solution of the long-time wheat
problem."

According to Tommie Harris,
Chairman, Agricultural Stabili-

zation program provides wheat-
diversion and additional price-
support payments which supple-
ment the marketing quotas and
price support previously in ef-
fect for the 1963 wheat crop.

The wheat-diversion payments
are similar to those in effect for
the 1962 wheat crop. They will
be made to wheat farmers who
reduce their wheat acreage by
at least 20 percent and put the
diverted acreage to an approved
conservation use. As in 1962,
farmers may receive half of
their acreage-diversion payment
at the time they sign up to partic-
ipate in the program.

A new feature for 1963 pro-
gram will be an additional price-
support payment of 18 cents per
bushel, times a normal yield es-
tablished for 1959-60, times the
1963 planted wheat acreage of
farmers participating in the
wheat-diversion program, pro-
vided they are also in compli-
ance with their wheat allotment.
This is a separate payment from
the regular price-support loans
and purchase agreements which
will be available to growers who
comply with their wheat acre-
age allotments. The regular price
support will be based on a na-
tional average of \$1.82 per bushel.

The Chairman cautions farm-
ers to be sure to divert the full
acreage for which they sign up
in the 1963 wheat stabilization
program. A change from the
1962 program provides that if a
farmer does not divert the full
signed-up acreage, he will not
be eligible for price support nor
will he receive acreage - diversion
or wheat price-support pay-
ments.

The sign-up period for the di-
version program for winter
wheat will continue through
December 14. Farmers are urged
to get in touch with the local
ASCS county office regarding
any questions they may have
about the program.

Ownership of Wounded Game
Suppose you are hunting and shoot a deer or a duck, which falls mortally wounded. Before you can get to it, another hunter beats you there and claims the fallen game as his own. What are your Rights?

Jim had been hunting all day without success, and had headed for home when he finally saw a deer. He took careful aim and hit the deer with his first shot. Although mortally wounded, the deer managed to run a short distance, with Jim in hot pursuit.

Roy was also deer hunting. He heard Jim's shot and saw a deer running toward him. However, before it reached the spot where he was standing, the deer fell to the ground.

Although it was obvious that the deer was about to die, Roy walked to within three feet of it, delivered the finishing shot, and quickly put his tag on it. When Jim ran up and claimed the deer, Roy said that such deer were wild animals, and belonged to no one until killed. Since he was the one that killed the deer, Roy claimed that it belonged to him.

Which hunter has legal title to the deer?

In this case the deer belongs to Jim. Jim was the first to wound it, and did so before Roy appeared on the scene. He had mortally wounded the deer, and had it in such a situation that

its escape was improbable, if not impossible. The prevailing rule is that the instant a wild animal is brought under the control of a person so that actual possession is practically inevitable, a vested property interest in it accrues which cannot be divested by another's intervening and killing it, or reaching it first.

Jim had delivered the shot which so crippled the animal as to cause him to cease trying to escape, thus permitting Roy to walk up to the animal and deliver the finishing shot. Jim had effectually brought the deer under his control before Roy took a hand in the matter. The deer legally belonged to Jim, and he can enforce his claim in court.

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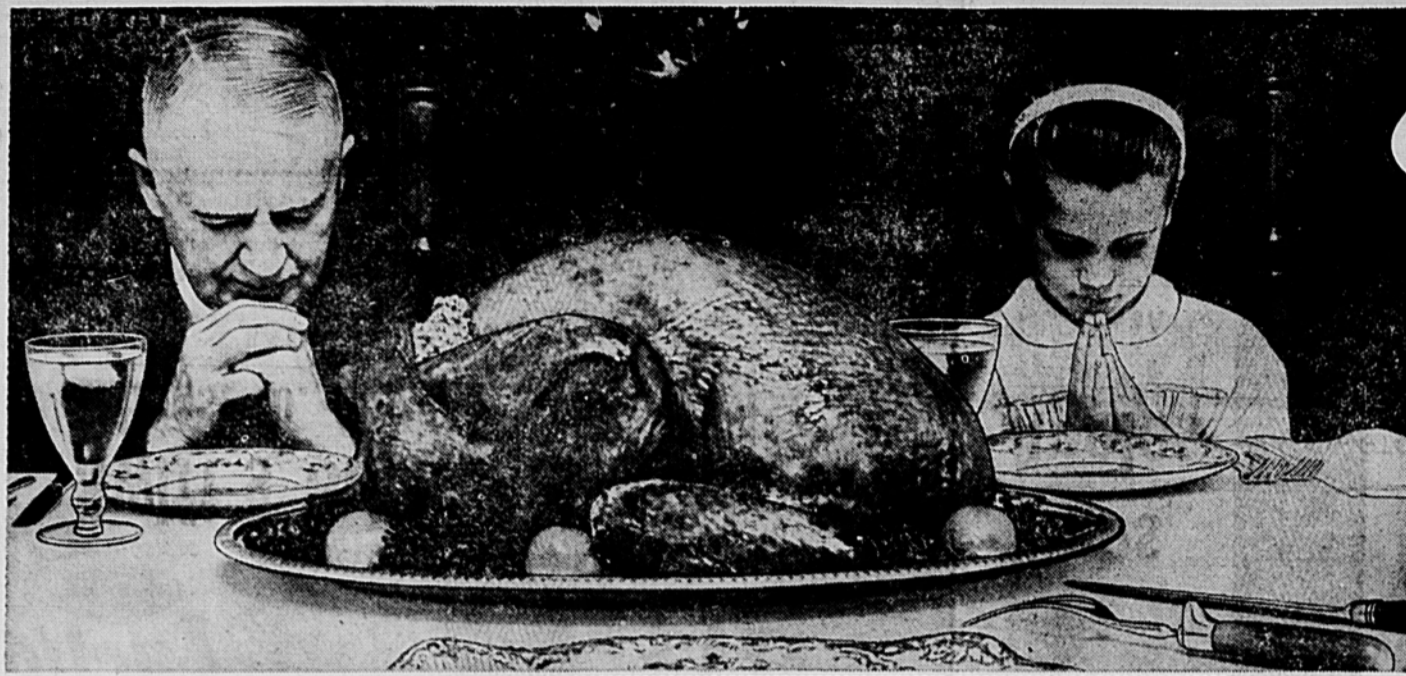
