# **New Petition**

A new petition calling for the all alcoholic beverage premises consumption was being circulated in Baird this week following action by the Callahan County Commissioners Court Monday in rejecting a pe-tition because of a lack of sufficient qualified signers.

A check of the petition by Mrs. Charles Robinson, Callahan County clerk, revealed that seven individuals who signed the petition had requested that their names be removed from the petition, and that there were eight other names on the sheets which she could not legally qualify.

The questioned names were ones signed by the husband for the wife or by the wife for the husband. The law requires, according to officials, that the petitions be signed personally by the individuals. With the striking off of the 15 names, there remained only 144 approved signatures, six less than the requir-

#### **Livestock Survey** Begins Nov. 20

Rural mail carriers from the Baird and Clyde Post Offices will leave some livestock survey cards along their routes begin ning November 16. "Information reported on these cards is used to set yearly inventory of live-stock and pountry on Texas farms," Postmasters Dan South and Roy Gilbreath explained.

Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes.

"This means that not every box will get a card," Mr. South and Gilbreath said. "For this reason it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are Terrel Williams, Clark Tabor, L. C. Gillit, Preston Pool, and Mrs. Winnie Burks.

Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for the Texas and National pig crop re-port and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service releases, newspapers, farm magazines, radio and television.

# Clyde Bids Due November 20

Clyde City Council members Thursday night designated Nov 20 as bid opening date for estimates by engineering firms on conducting a preliminary survey to determine the area's sewage disposal needs. Mayor Harold Holden said the

bidding will be done in two parts, one for the preliminary survey and the other for supervising the installation of sewage lines which contractors might lay at a future date here.
Councilmen decided on the bid

date for engineering work after discussing various aspects of the proposed sewer project in a meeting in City Hall. The council was told at a spe-

cial session Monday night that it would cost about \$138,000 to construct a new sewer plant to replace the present one, which has been in use since 1927.

Such a plant would be large emough to serve a city of 4,000 persons, reported G. W. Parkhill of the Lubbock engineering firm of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper Suggesting a \$150,000 bond is-

sue to finance the sewerage treatment plant was C. M. Smith of Abilene, representing the First Southwest Co. He said the issue could be paid for by increasing the tax rate 40 cents per \$100 valuation. (The present rate is 60 cents per \$100 valuation based on total city property valuation of \$2,128,438 in the town of 1,250 population.)

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





It's the Law in TEXAS

> Suppose you are hunting and a deer or a duck, which falls mortally wounded. you can get to it, another hunter beats you there and claims the fallen game as his own.

Jim had been hunting all day for home when he finally saw a deer. He took careful aim and hit the deer with his first shot. Although mortally wounded, the deer managed to run a short distance, with Jim in hot pursuit.

Roy was also deer hunting. He heard Jim's shot and saw a deer running toward him. However, befere it reached the spot where he was standing, the deer fell to the ground.

Although it was obvious that the deer was about to die, Roy nam, Elder J. E. Robertson of walked to within three feet of it. Cross Plains, Mrs. Ola Boles of delivered the finishing shot, and quickly put his tag on it. When Jim ran up and claimed the deer. Roy said that such deer were wild animals, and belonged to no one until killed. Since he was the one that killed the deer, Roy claimed that it belonged to

Which hunter has legal title to the deer?

In this case the deer belongs to Jim. Jim was the first to wound it, and did so before Roy appeared on the scene. He had mortally wounded the deer, and had it in such a situation that

its escape was improbable, if not impossible. The prevailing rule is that the instant a wild animal is brought under the control of a person so that actual possession is practically inevitable, a vested property interest in it accures which cannot be divested by another's intervening and

killing it, or reaching it first. Jim had delivered the shot which so crippled the animal as to cause him to cease trying to escape, thus permitting Roy to walk up to the animal and deliver the finishing shot. Jim had effectually brought the deer unwithout success, and had headed der his control before Roy took a hand in the matter. The deer legally belonged to Jim, and he can enforce his claim in court.

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
