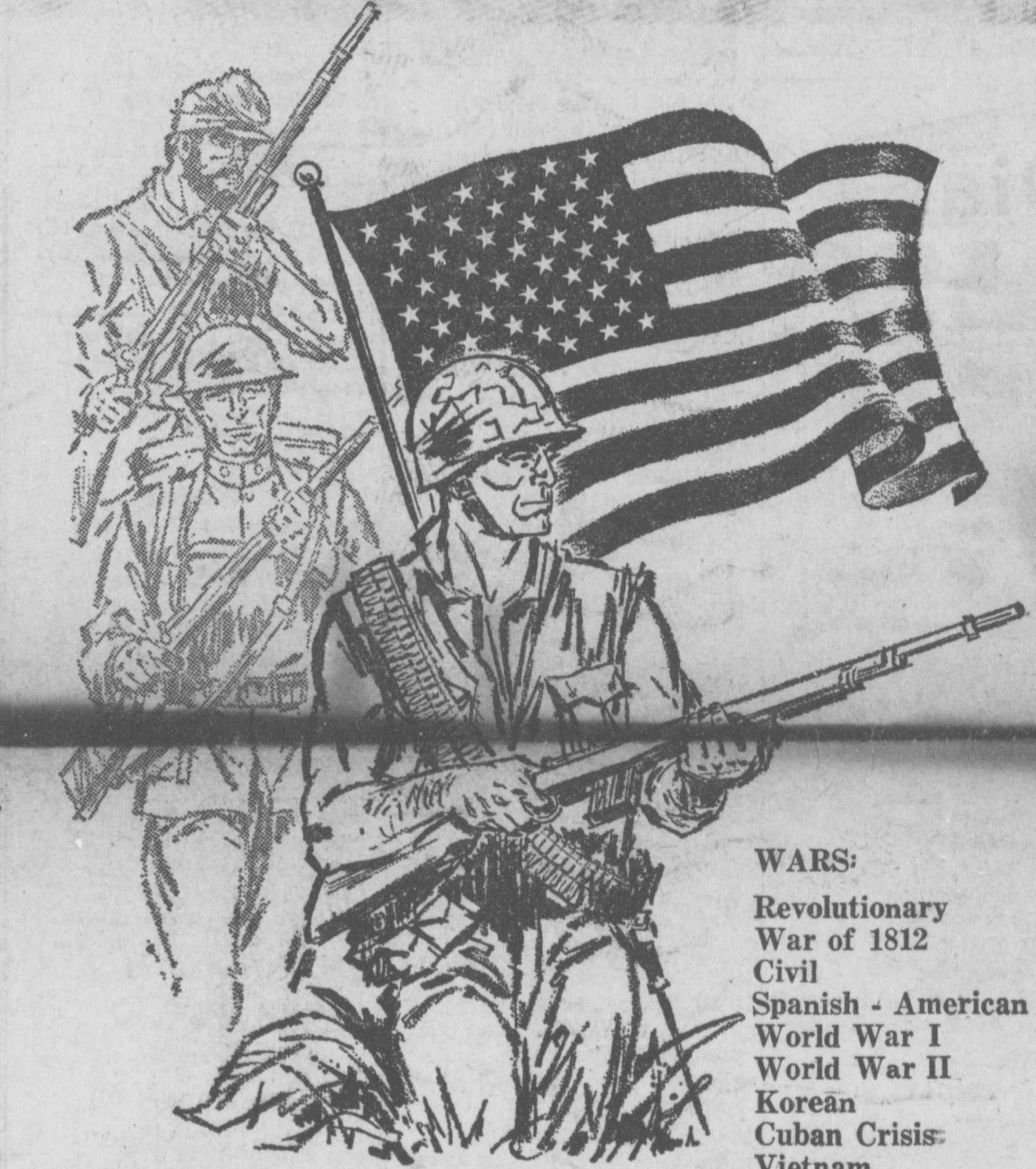
CHURCH SERVICE CENTER IS OPENED IN BURT BUILDING HERE: OPEN 9-12 5 DAYS

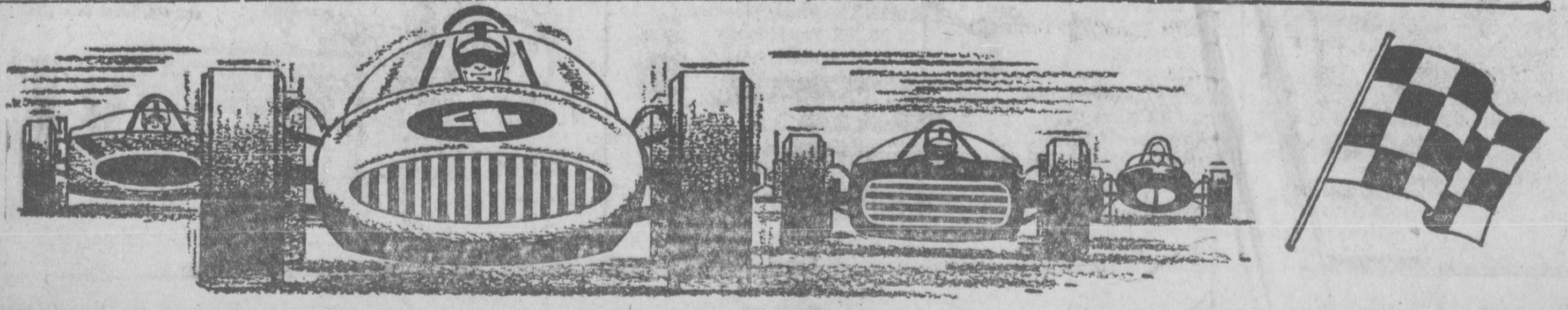

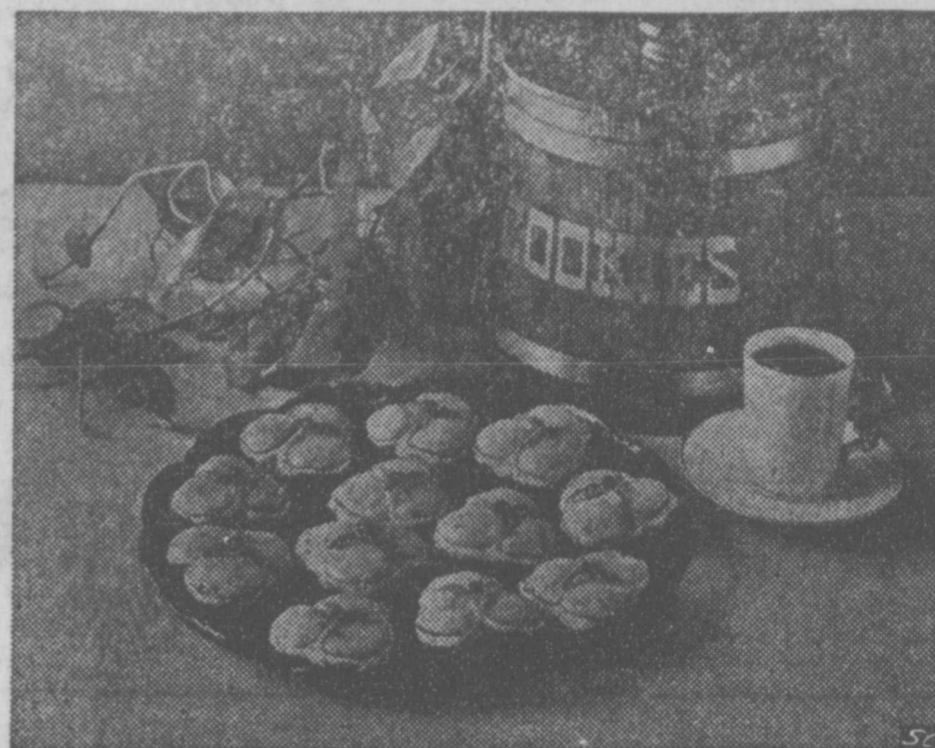

Pick A Clover-leaf Cookie



Clover-leaf dainties iced in emerald are great cookies which can bring good luck to all and compliments to the cook. They're made in short order of Danish flavor margarine and are rich with the aroma of mince meat. Just blend ingredients, chill, roll, then shape into clover leaves. Or be creative as the Borden Kitchen suggests, and form to fit any special happening. It doesn't call for all the fabled luck of a cloverleaf to be successful.

Clover-leaf Cookies

(Makes 3 dozen two-inch diameter cookies)

| 2-1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour | 1-1/2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar |
| 1 teaspoon baking soda | 1 (9-oz.) pkg. None Such condensed mince meat |
| 1 teaspoon cream of tartar | 1 egg |
| 1 cup (2 sticks) Danish-flavor margarine | 1 teaspoon vanilla extract |

Sift together flour, baking soda and cream of tartar. In a large size bowl, cream margarine and sugar together until light. Break mince meat into small pieces. Place mince meat and egg in electric blender; blend until mince meat is pulpy. Stir into creamed mixture. Add vanilla and sifted dry ingredients; blend well. Refrigerate dough about 30 minutes, then roll into 3/4-inch diameter balls. Arrange 3 balls with sides touching clover-leaf fashion on a well-greased baking sheet. Bake in a moderate (375°F.) oven, about 10 minutes, or until lightly browned. Cool slightly before removing cookies from baking sheet. For GREEN ICING blend 1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract and 1 tablespoon water until of spreading consistency. Tint with a few drops green food coloring. If desired, decorate with slivers of red cherries.

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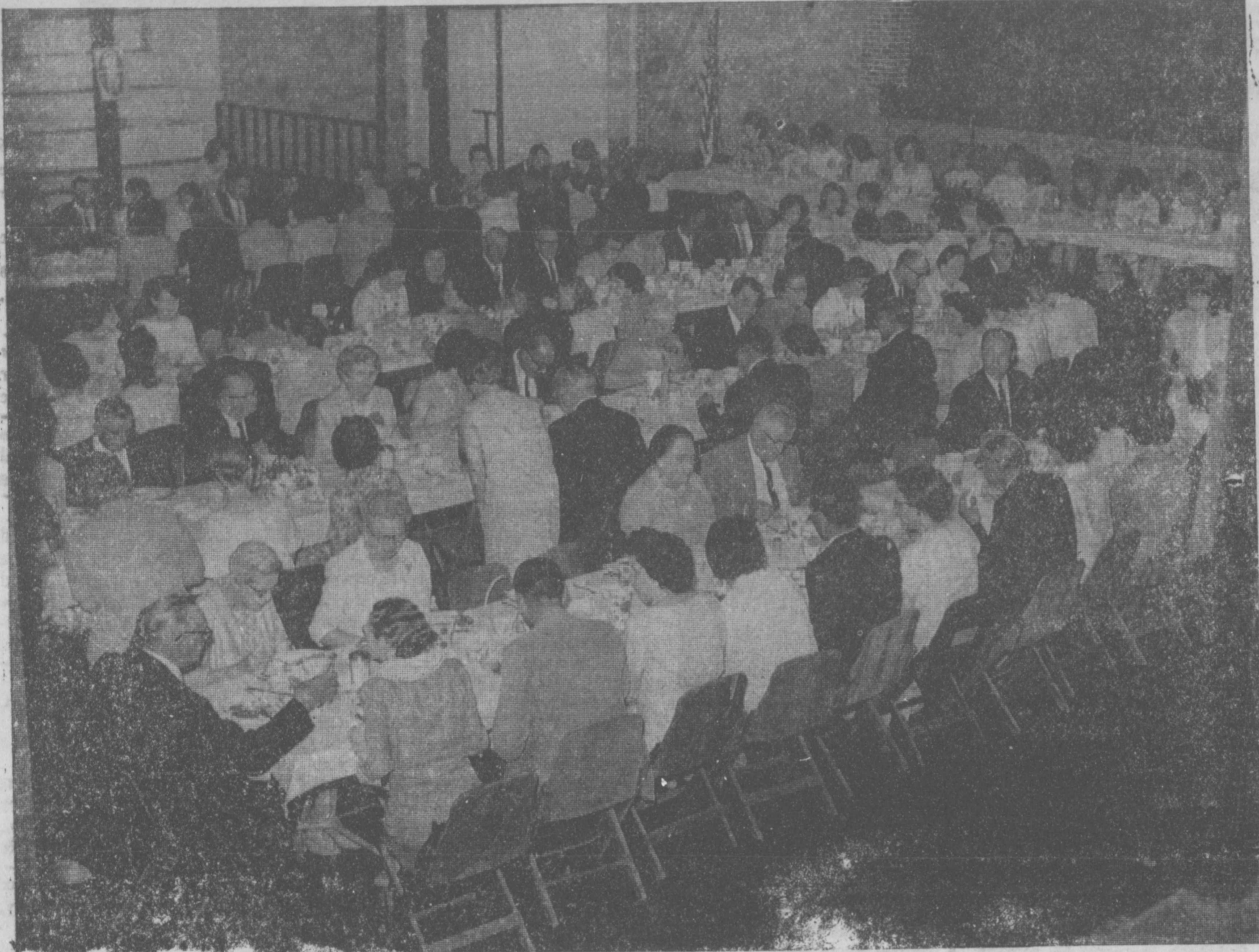

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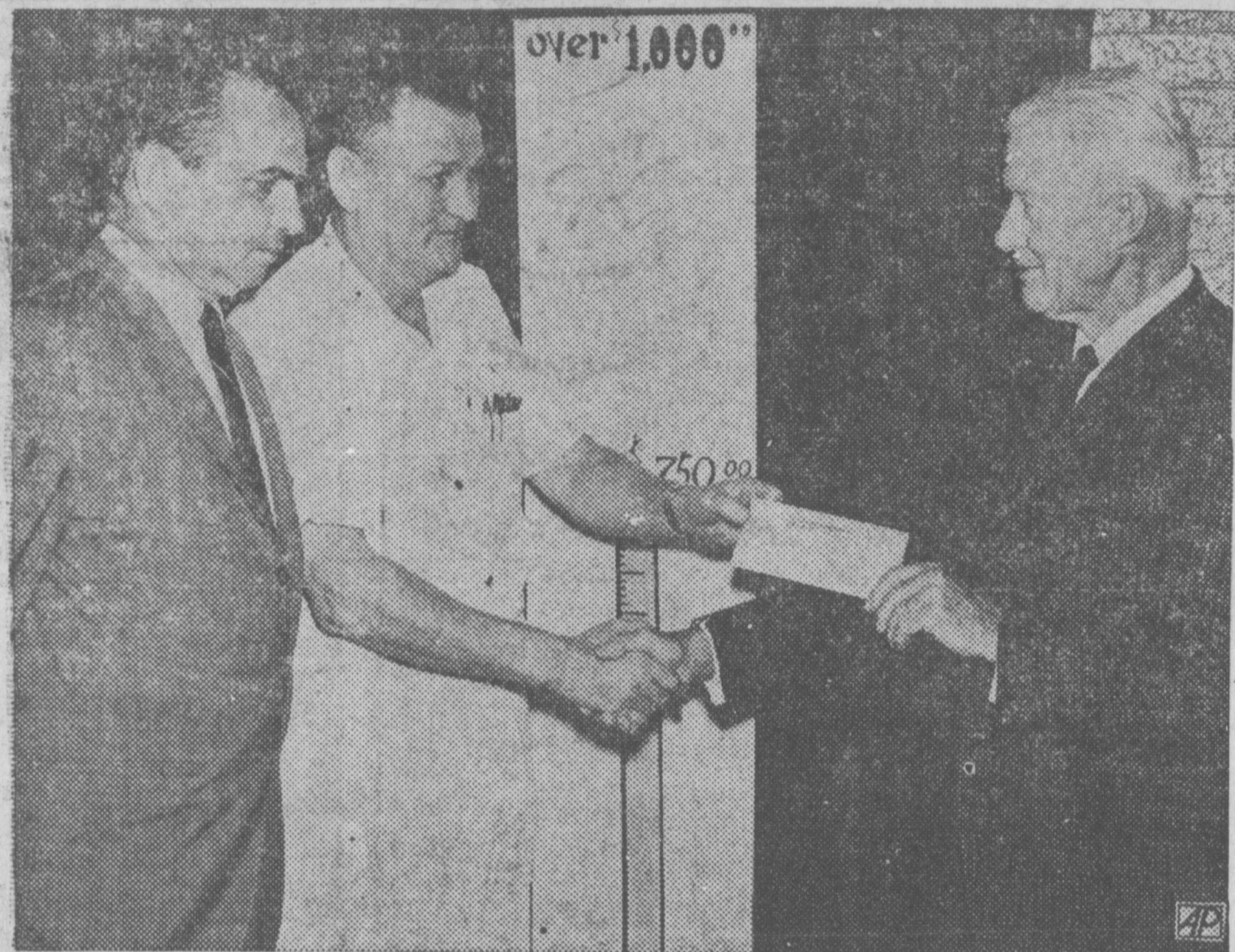

Basic Tomato-Cottage Cheese Sauce
(Makes 6 cups)

In a medium-size saucepan blend well tomatoes, tomato paste, water, and seasonings. Place saucepan over medium-low heat; cover and simmer 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Blend in 1 cup cottage cheese; spoon mixture into egg whites. Arrange filled egg halves in an ungreased 10- x 6- x 1-1/2-inch baking dish. Pour 1 cup Basic Cheese Sauce around and over eggs. If desired, garnish tops of eggs with anchovy fillets. Cover dish with aluminum foil. Bake in a moderate (350°F.) oven 10-15 minutes, or until sauce is hot and bubbly. Serve immediately.

Rhubarb's Here

by Betty Crocker

Springtime's rhubarb signals a season of tart and tangy desserts. All sweetly inexpensive. Whether you grow your own or pick from the crop at the supermarket, here are some rhubarb rules. One pound makes two cups. For a mild flavor, choose "early pink" — it takes less sugar. If the stalks are tender, why peel? Just "saute" it in the skin. Or tuck it into a pie shell — alone or in pretty combination with pineapple, blueberries or pears (fresh, canned or frozen). And for the season's sassiest shortcake, co-star tangy rhubarb with sweet fresh strawberries. My recipe below makes a crusty, sugar-topped shortcake. It's springtime simple.

SWEET 'N TART SHORTCAKE

- 2 cups Bisquick
- ¾ cup light cream
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- Light cream
- Sugar
- Slivered almonds
- 2 cups halved strawberries
- 1½ cups sweetened cooked rhubarb
- ¼ cup sugar
- Whipped cream

Heat oven to 450°. Mix Bisquick, cream and 2 tablespoons sugar with fork. Beat vigorously 20 strokes. Knead 8 to 10 times on lightly floured cloth-covered board. Roll dough ¼ inch thick; cut with floured 3-inch cutter. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Brush tops with cream; sprinkle with sugar and almonds. Bake

about 10 minutes. Cool. Stir strawberries, rhubarb and ¼ cup sugar together. Split shortcakes and fill with strawberry mixture. Top with whipped cream. 6 servings.

Here's a basic Rhubarb Sauce. Good warm or cold. Delightful as breakfast fruit or as a dessert with cookies.

RHUBARB SAUCE

Heat ¾ to 1 cup sugar and ½ cup water to boiling, stirring occasionally. Add 4 cups rhubarb, cut into 1-inch pieces. Simmer about 10 minutes, or until rhubarb is tender and slightly transparent. If desired, stir in few drops red food coloring. 5 servings.

Sometime try this sauce over squares of fresh white cake; top with whipped cream. A tart, refreshing, springtime dessert!

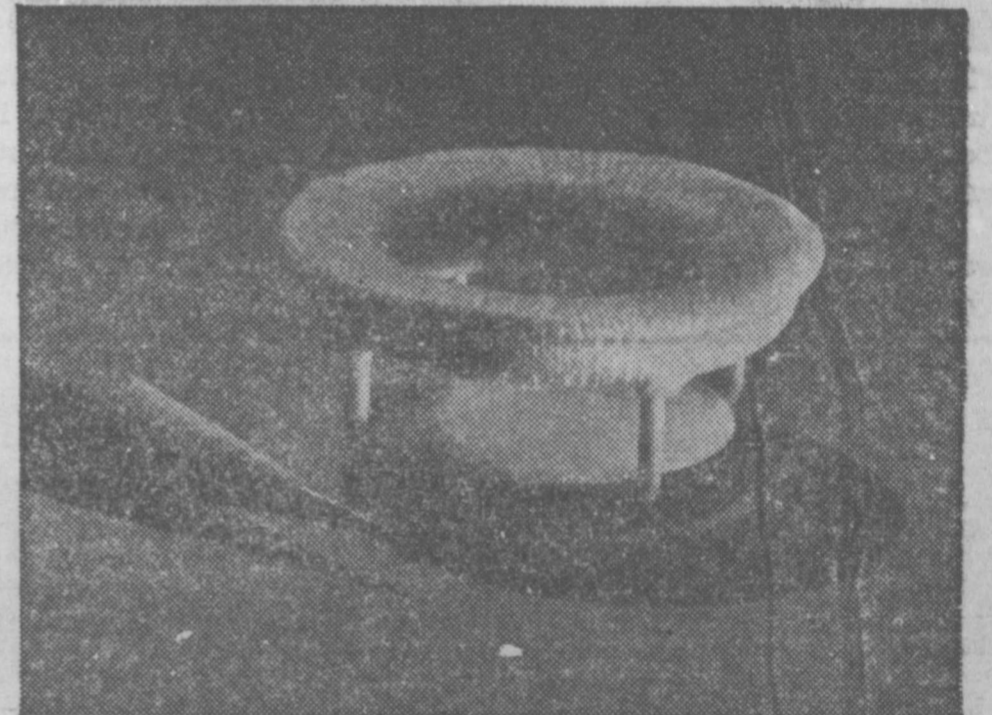

Butch Price, Clay McClellan and Phil Bone represent Gatesville Jaycees at the state tournament in Harlingen in July.

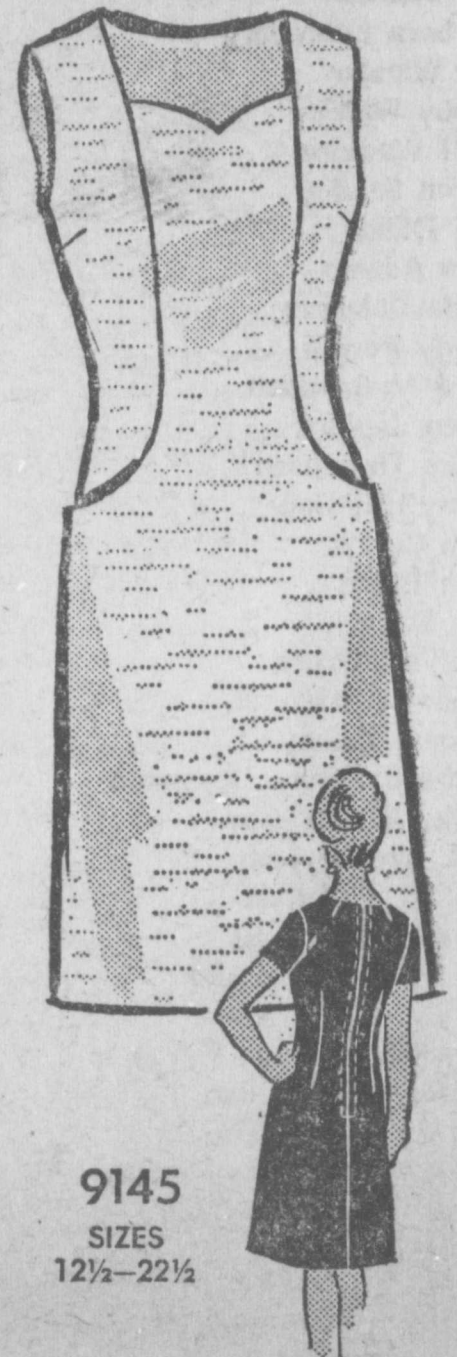

The event was staged by Gatesville Jaycees and 15 teen-age golfers competed and were served lunch by the Jaycees.

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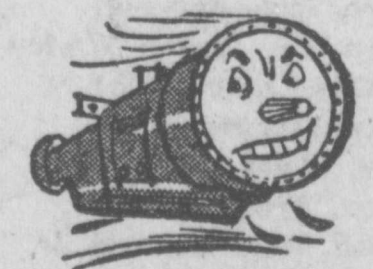
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
