### TWO HIGHWAY PROJECTS ARE APPROVED FOR CORYELL COUNTY IN 1967

Two highway projects are in the cards for 1967 for Coryell County according to announcement from the Texas State Highway Department, District Engineer Elton B. Evans, who said the work will be under the supervision of Paul T. Hensler, Senior Resident Engineer, Gatesville. There are 228 projects in 166 counties, costing \$24.6 million and the mileage includes 623 miles.

Coryell County's is 7.2 miles and are grading and structures from end of FM 215 north of Gatesville north to White Hall, a distance of 5.6 miles. The other is additional financing for grading, structures and surfacing of FM 3046 from FM 116, 1.0 miles south of US 190, Southwest to Lampasas County Line, a distance of approximately 1.6 miles.

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

The American agriculturist's back is being nailed to his own barn door through a rapid-fire of escalating operating costs and a record drop in farm prices and profits.

The plight of the dairy farmer is especially significant. Since 1965 dairy imports have increased 300 per cent, and as a result of soaring prices and stagnant profits, farmers have reduced the number of dairy cattle to the lowest national level since 1893.

Desperate farmers, under advice from the National Farmers Organization have been attempting to boost milk prices by dumping, creating artificial shortages.

After bonfires threatened to become wildfire, Sec. of Agriculture, Orville Freeman began "studying" the problem, and recently recommended no restrictions on dairy imports.

Disheartening facts behind the farmer's depression are that although his income rose last year, he continues to net only a per capita average of \$1731 annually, 60 per cent below earnings of non-farmers.

Although retail food prices last year climbed 35 per cent above the 1947-49 average, farmer's prices for food were two per cent below the money received in 1947-49. Today, the farmer gets only 5½ per cent

of the U.S. consumer's total after-tax income for his products—a full one-half less the share he received in 1947.

For every dollar spent for food today, the farmer's share is only 40 cents—a dime less than he received 20 years previously!

Senator George McGovern, (S.D.) has proposed a new food-labeling system whereby food packages would state the percentage of the price going to the farmer.

Increased world demand plus the war has accelerated needs for food and fibre while government programs generally decrease domestic agricultural productivity.

Senator Peter Dominick, Colorado, offers his suggestions: "Instead of relying on government wage and price controls, and other forms of government manipulation in the market place, I think we as Americans should insist that industry such as livestock be unharnessed, allowed to produce as efficiently as they can."

"Instead of relying on government spending to 'push our economy forward,' rely on our viable private enterprise to accomplish that goal. But the time is growing close when the choice will be made for us by the tremendous pressures we are facing, unless decisive action is taken now."

The administration will have to move faster to solve these problems than the present trot, or Giles' barn door won't be secured until his cattle have fled that-a-way.

Arthur P. Brashear Sr., 76, founder of American Desk Manufacturing Co., Temple died at 10:35 a. m. June 3 in a Temple

Son of a Baptist minister: the Rev. and Mrs. C. G. Brashear, he was born in Coryell County Dec. 24, 1890 moving to Temple in 1921, and established the Texas School Supply Co. and American Desk Manufacturing Co., in 1927, and the Ralph Wilson Plastics, Inc. and was a director of the First National Bank, First Federal Savings & Loan Ass'n and Tex-O-Cal Hardwoods, Inc. and established more than 30 different corporations, all successful.

A WW I vet., he was made a Mason in Coryell County, was a member of Variety Clubs of America and was active in the theatre business.

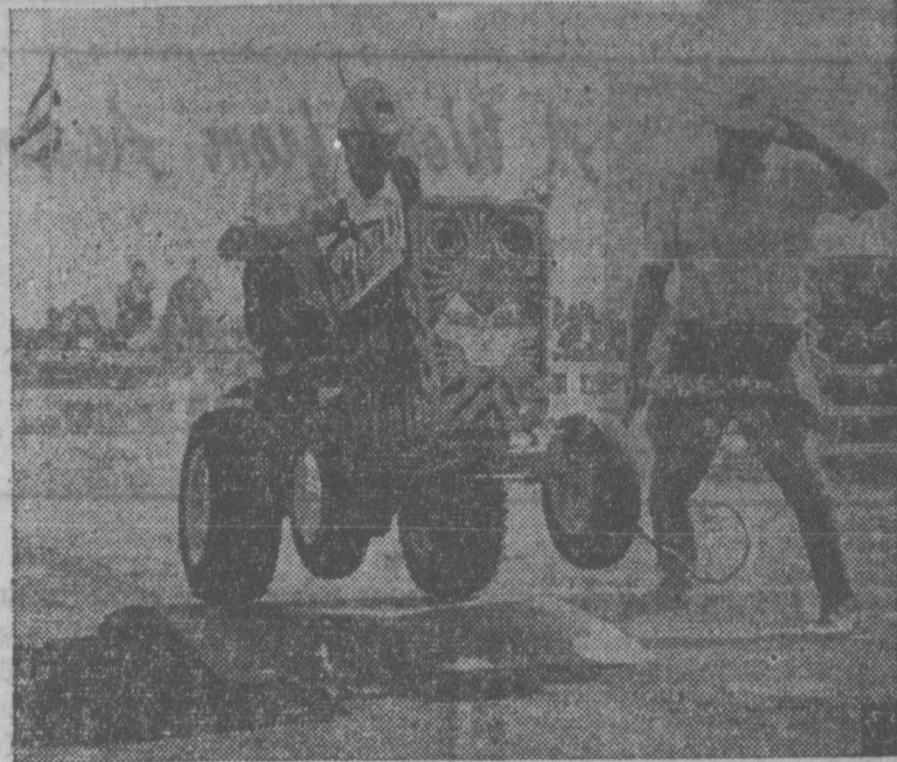

John Carroll Nabors of Gatesville, who graduated with honors June 3 from the University of Texas Law School is recipient of the \$100 David Harris Memorial Prize.

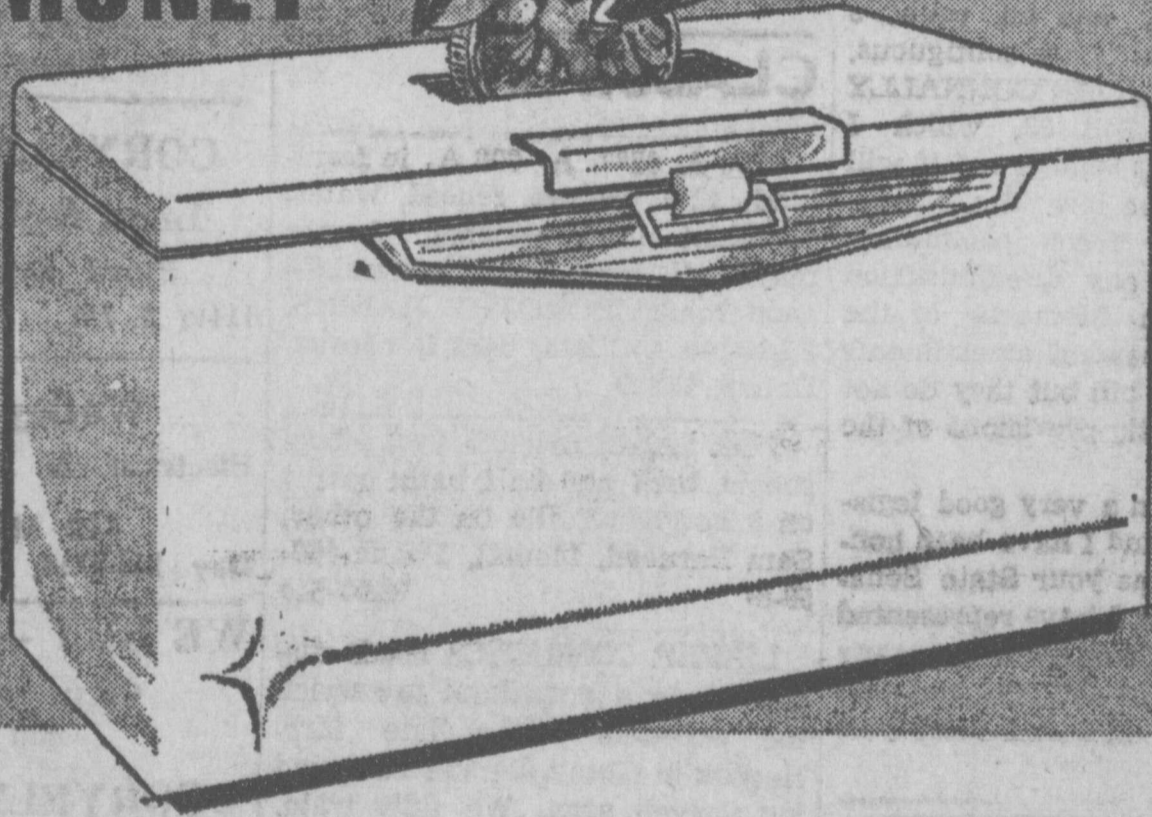
It is given annually to the graduating law student who had the highest scholastic average and earned at least half of their expenses while attending Law School.

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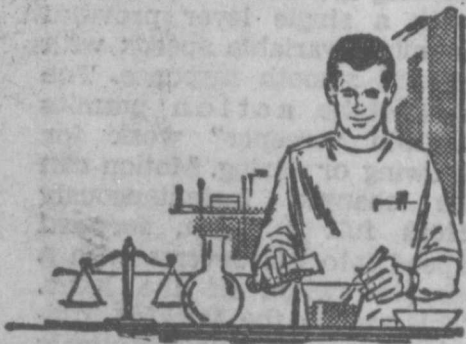
A Word from Austin

The 60th LEGISLATIVE SES-

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SION has finally come to an end, with no special session in sight for the future except for the already called session next year. I feel that this has been a very successful and productive session with many goals having been accomplished before the closing days. Perhaps the two most important issues that had to be agreed upon before we could adjourn were the appropriations bill and congressional redistricting. I served on both of the committees that studied and discussed these problems and two measures and presented our opinions to the Legislature.

**APPROPRIATION BILL**—The Conference Committee made up of five members from the House and Senate worked out a compromise on the new and final appropriation bill which has been approved by both Houses. The Committee recommended a \$2.4 billion general appropriation bill for the operation of the state government for the next fiscal year. This is \$5 million over what the last legislature appropriated for the current year. Some of the most important provisions of the bill are as follows:

State employees receive a basic pay increase of 14.1 per cent with other raises ranging up to about 30 percent.

Junior Colleges received \$23.6

million as opposed to \$13.6 million currently. There will be 38 state-supported Jr. Colleges compared to 34 this year.

For education, total funds increased 28 percent and General Revenue Appropriations are increased 47 per cent. General revenue funds for education amount to \$1,131.

Travel allowance for state employees was increased.

**REDISTRICTING**—The Senate passed a congressional redistricting bill in order to meet the demands of the federal court for a more equitable apportionment of districts for the state's 23 congressmen. Sen. Ralph Hall and I have been working on this problem for about three months. After a short debate, we pushed it through for final passage in the Senate and the House approved it with few changes. This is a better bill than we had two years ago and I feel that the court will approve the districts. It leaves all 23 incumbent congressmen in a district by themselves, it falls within the court's rule of not more than 10 percent tolerance in population between districts, and all counties within the districts are contiguous.

**GOVERNOR JOHN CONNALLY** signed Senate Bill 33, which I sponsored in the Senate, and it will now become the law. The bill removes entirely from community property laws any discrimination against women. Members of the House added several amendments to the original bill but they do not change the basic provisions of the bill.

This has been a very good legislative session and I have been honored to serve as your State Senator. I hope that I have represented my district faithfully on the many important issues and decisions that I have had to deal with these past 140 days.

The program will feature new developments in forage crops and the latest information on Coastal Bermudagrass, say Extension pasture specialists.

**ONCE IS ENOUGH**—Lightning may or may not strike twice in the same place but folks with experience say once is enough. Lightning caused fires each year destroy farm buildings, rural homes and stored feed valued at hundreds of thousands of dollars. It also kills more than 400 people and injures another 1,000. Many of these losses could be prevented, says W. S. Al-tension agricultural engineer, through the use of a properly installed lightning protection system.

**WEATHER TO BLAME**—Discolored leaf conditions in young cotton in widespread sections of Texas are the result of unusually cool nights combined with higher daytime temperatures that have persisted over the past several weeks, says Fred C. Elliott, Texas A&M University Extension cotton specialist. Cotton leaves first show a silvery on the top side, then bronzing and finally a reddish color. Roots appear normal unless seedling disease is present. Two good weeks of growing weather should correct the situation, he believes.

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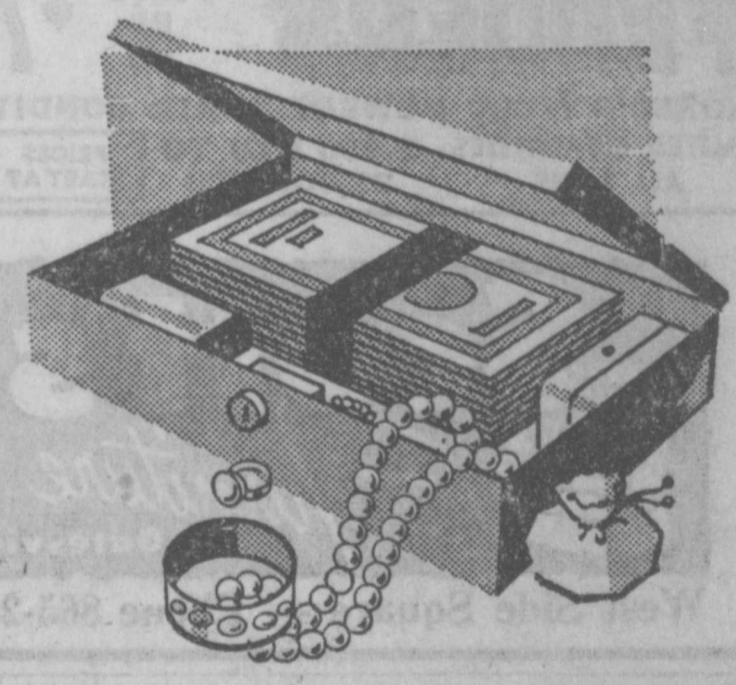
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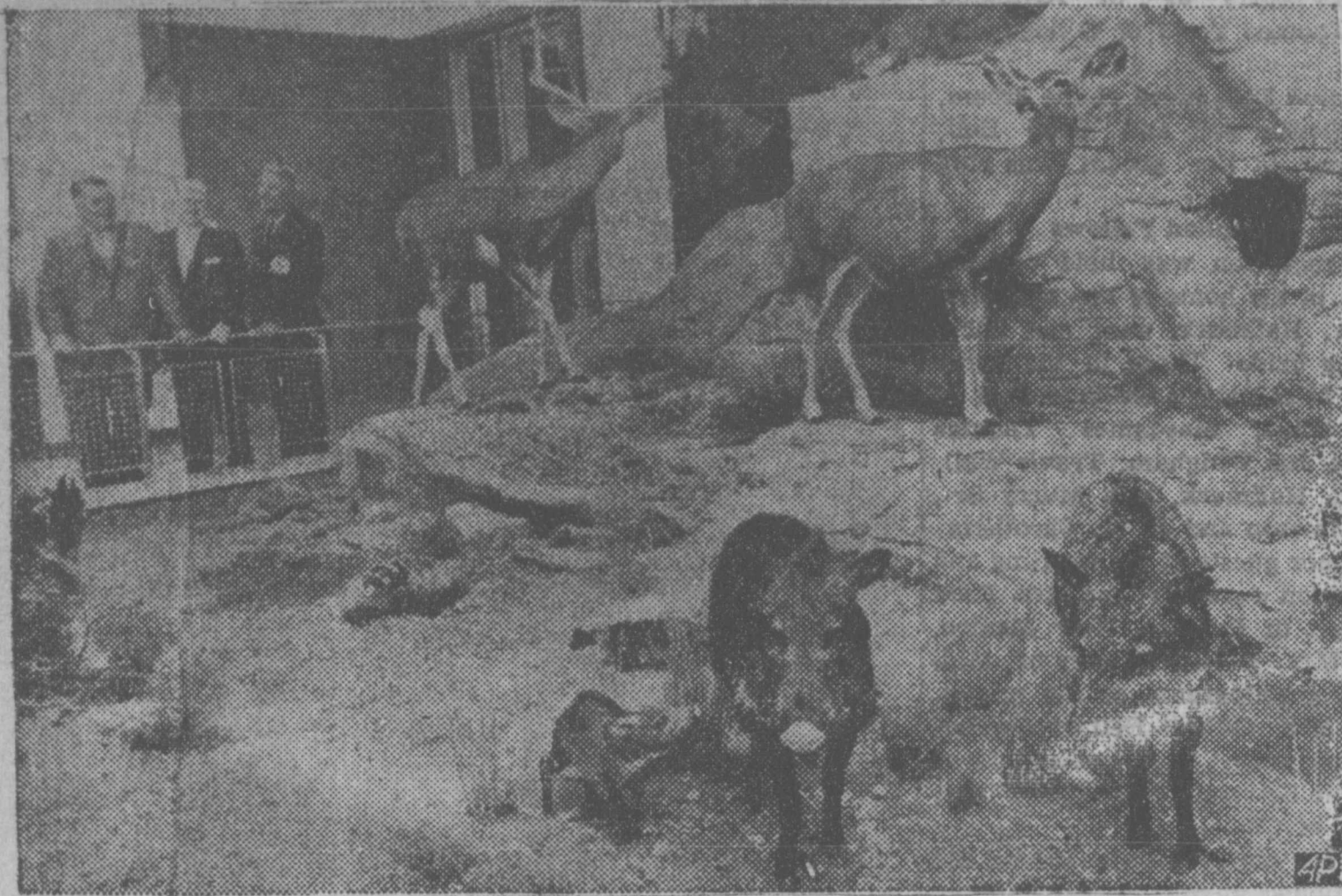
