



# After the Prom by Betty Crocker

If you're planning an after-the-prom breakfast for the graduates, why not do it Aloha style? All the way. Decorate with flowers, ferns, tropical fruits — a little Hawaiian music in the background. — and a few Island-inspired foods for the menu. How's this for a spectacular starter? Sliced halakahiki (fresh pineapple) and bananas, berries and melon balls in a hollowed watermelon boat. Let it double as your centerpiece, too. Then scrambled eggs, done to the cap and gown crowd's tastes; thick slices of ham on the side. Tall cool glasses of milk. And dozens of tiny fruit Aloha Muffins. My recipe's below. Tiny Aloha Muffins 2 cups Bisquick 1/4 cup sugar 3 tablespoons soft butter 1 egg 3/4 cup milk

1/2 cup flaked coconut or 1/2 cup well-drained crushed pineapple Confectioners' sugar icing Flaked coconut or coarsely chopped nuts

Heat oven to 400°. Grease tiny muffin cups. Mix Bisquick and sugar; cut in butter. Add egg and milk; beat vigorously half minute. Fold in coconut. Fill prepared muffin cups 3/3 full. Bake 12 to 15 minutes. While warm, frost with confectioners' sugar icing. Sprinkle each with ooconut. Makes 3 to 4 dozen.

> Serve at least two tiny muffins per plate. Tuck the other; into

a straw basket, lined with a splashy floral napkin. Pass them again and again.

> Here are a few variations for your scrambled eggs. Make your favorite recipe except frizzle small thin pieces of cooked ham in the melted butter before adding eggs. Or make scrambled eggs with mushrooms by first cooking and stirring sliced fresh or canned mushrooms (1 to 2 tablespoons for each egg) in the melted butter. Garnish with parsley. A lei op parsley sprigs for each serving of eggs maybe.





Angling for compliments? No cook needs to when she presents this robust entrée, Fillets Fromaggio Marinara, created by the Borden Kitchen. Just cloak fresh haddock in bread crumbs and grated Parmesan and Romano Cheese, cover with marinara sauce, and crest with pizza cheese slices. Serve piping hot

#### Fillets Fromaggio Marinara (Makes 6 servings) 2 lbs. fresh haddock fillets 2 to 3 tablespoons vegetable 1/2 teaspoon salt oil or olive oil

L	Dash pepper egg, beaten cup grated Parmesan and	cups (10-1/2 oz. can) marinara sauce slices (one 6-oz. pkg.)
	Romano cheese cup dry bread crumbs, plain or seasoned	Borden's pizza cheese slices

Wash and dry fillets. Cut each fillet in half lengthwise; cut each lengthwise slice in half crosswise. Roll up each piece; secure with wooden pick. In a small size mixing bowl, combine salt, pepper and egg thoroughly. Combine 3 tablespoons grated cheese and crumbs. Dip fish roll into egg mixture. Coat with crumbs. In a medium-size skillet, heat oil over medium heat. Add fish rolls. Cook until golden brown on one side (about 3-4 minutes). Care-fully turn and brown the other side, about 3-4 minutes. Place rolls in a buttared 12-x 8-x 2 inch baking dish. Pour 2/4 cup of rolls in a buttered 12- x 8- x 2-inch baking dish. Pour 3/4 cup of sauce over rolls; top with cheese slices. Cover with remaining sauce. Sprinkle with remaining 1 tablespoon grated cheese. Bake in a moderate (350°F.) oven, 30 minutes or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork.




