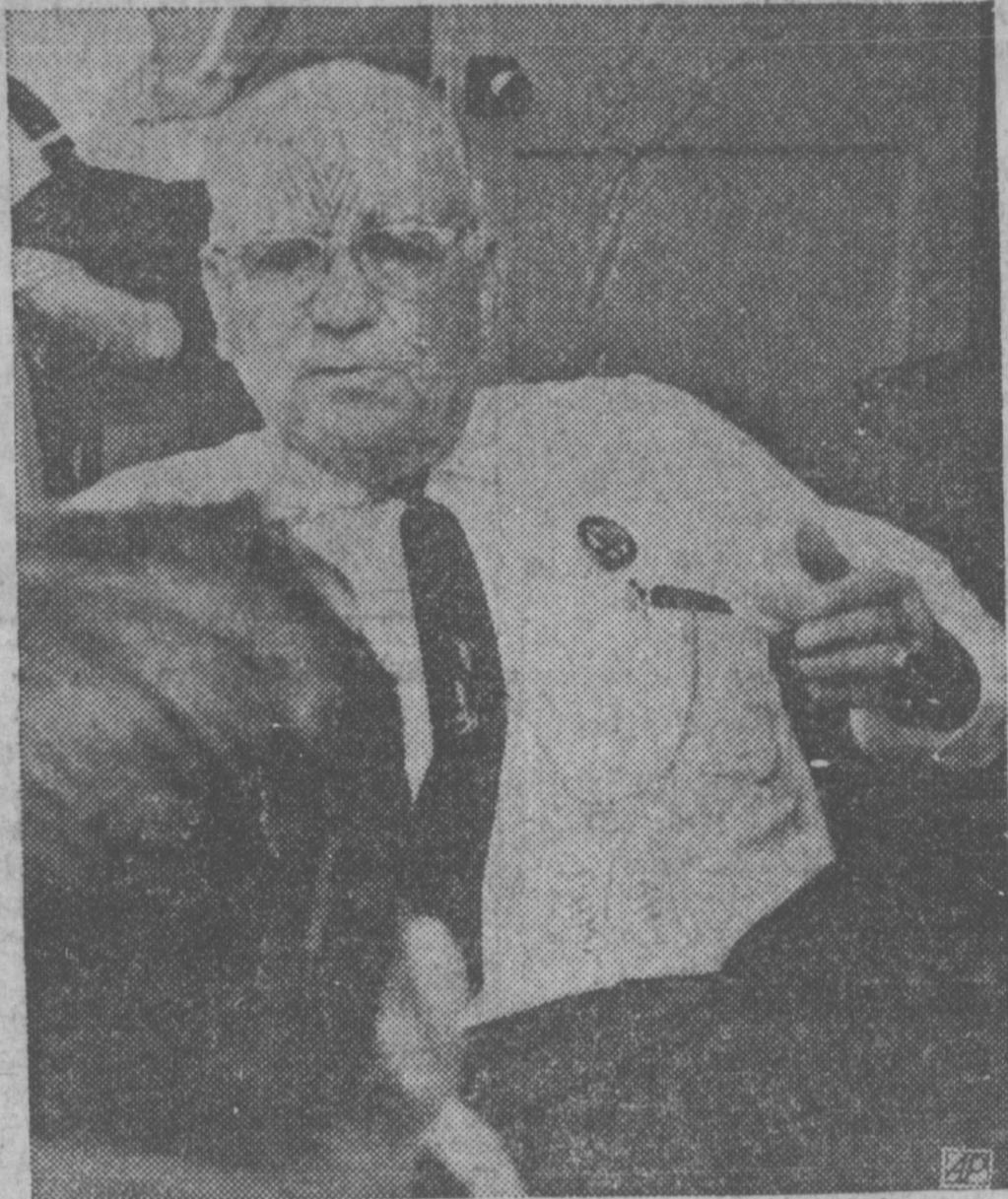
In the Grand Jury return they reported they "passed some cases for further investigation with the understanding they may be requested to be recalled in connection therewith.

49TH ARMORED PUTS GATESVILLE AWAY AFTER TWO WEEKS AT NFH

Texas' Lone Star Division, the 49th Armored, under the new command of Brig. Gen. Jas. D. Scott, were reviewed Saturday before Maj. Gen. Thomas Bishop, Governor John Connally's representative at the mid-training review. Also in the reviewing stand were H. K. Jackson Sr., and County Judge Norman Storm, of Gatesville.

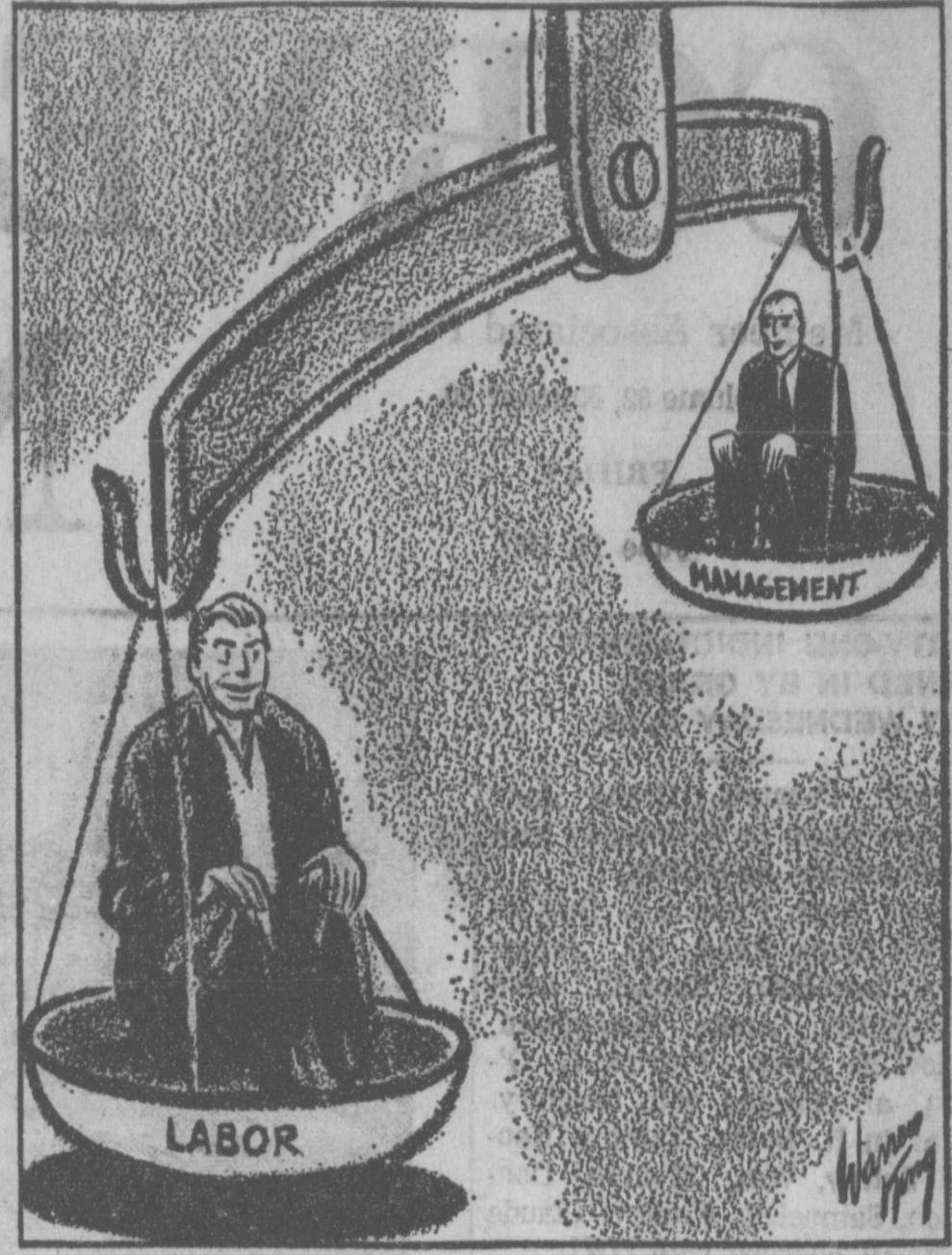

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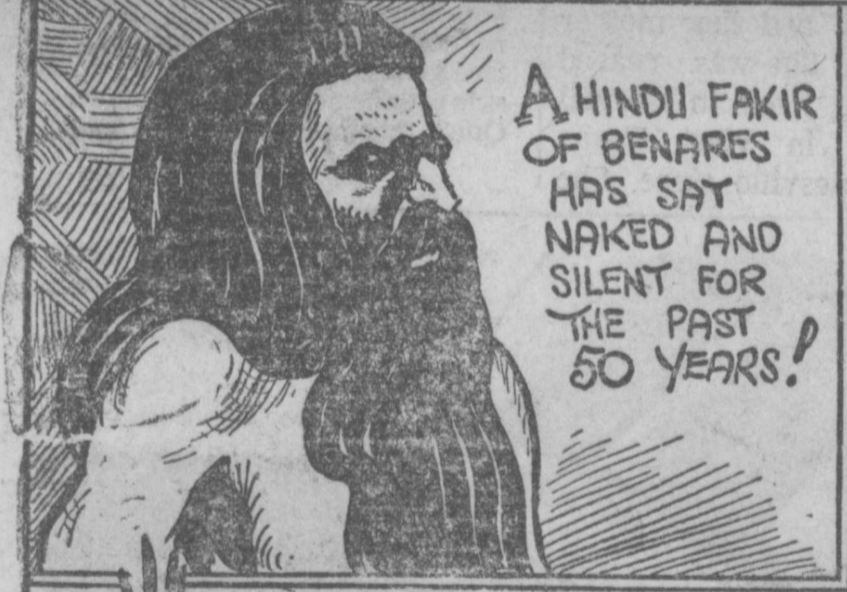

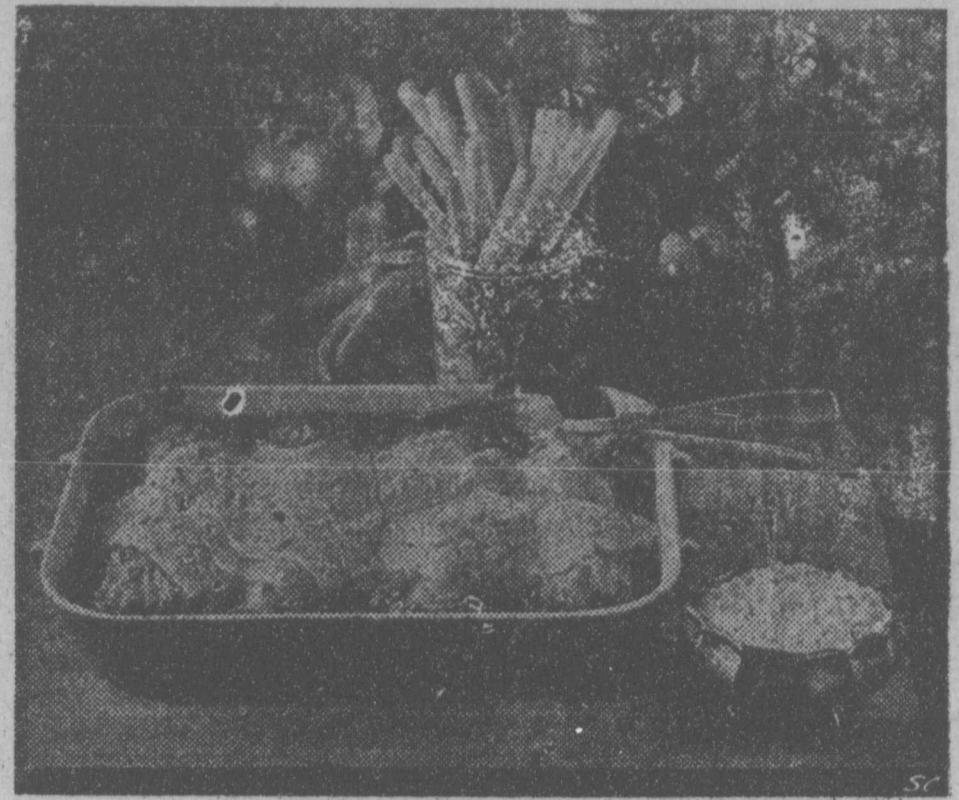

Wash and dry fillets. Cut each fillet in half lengthwise; cut each lengthwise slice in half crosswise. Roll up each piece; secure with wooden pick. In a small size mixing bowl, combine salt, pepper and egg thoroughly. Combine 3 tablespoons grated cheese and crumbs. Dip fish roll into egg mixture. Coat with crumbs. In a medium-size skillet, heat oil over medium heat. Add fish rolls. Cook until golden brown on one side (about 3-4 minutes). Carefully turn and brown the other side, about 3-4 minutes. Place rolls in a buttered 12-x 8-x 2-inch baking dish. Pour 3/4 cup of sauce over rolls; top with cheese slices. Cover with remaining sauce. Sprinkle with remaining 1 tablespoon grated cheese. Bake in a moderate (350°F.) oven, 30 minutes or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork.

Then scrambled eggs, done to the cap and gown crowd's tastes; thick slices of ham on the side. Tall cool glasses of milk. And dozens of tiny fruit Aloha Muffins. My recipe's below. Remember, too, extra film for the camera.

Tiny Aloha Muffins

- 2 cups Bisquick
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 3 tablespoons soft butter
- 1 egg
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1/2 cup flaked coconut or 1/2 cup well-drained crushed pineapple
- Confectioners' sugar icing
- Flaked coconut or coarsely chopped nuts

Heat oven to 400°. Grease tiny muffin cups. Mix Bisquick and sugar; cut in butter. Add egg and milk; beat vigorously half minute. Fold in coconut. Fill prepared muffin cups 3/4 full. Bake 12 to 15 minutes. While warm, frost with confectioners' sugar icing. Sprinkle each with coconut. Makes 3 to 4 dozen.

Serve at least two tiny muffins per plate. Tuck the other into

a straw basket, lined with a splashy floral napkin. Pass them again and again.

Here are a few variations for your scrambled eggs. Make your favorite recipe except — frizzle small thin pieces of cooked ham in the melted butter before adding eggs. Or make scrambled eggs with mushrooms by first cooking and stirring sliced fresh or canned mushrooms (1 to 2 tablespoons for each egg) in the melted butter. Garnish with parsley. A lot of parsley sprigs for each serving of eggs maybe.

If you want to go all out, furnish paper leis for every guest; decorate the table with baby orchids. Then as the sun breaks in the East, one more chorus of "Aloha." Just before they thank you for a lovely Aloha Mater party.

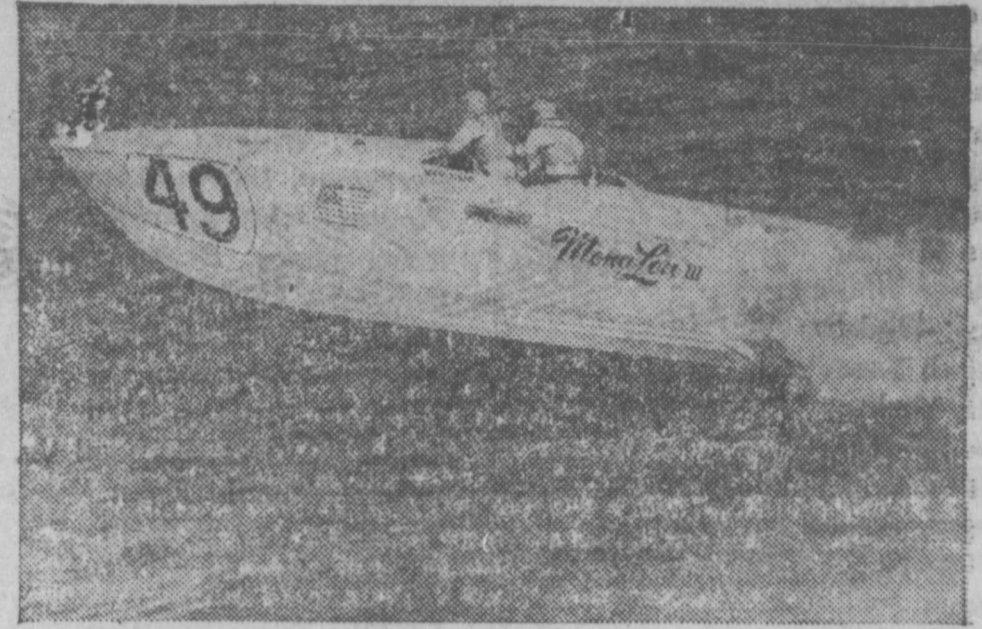

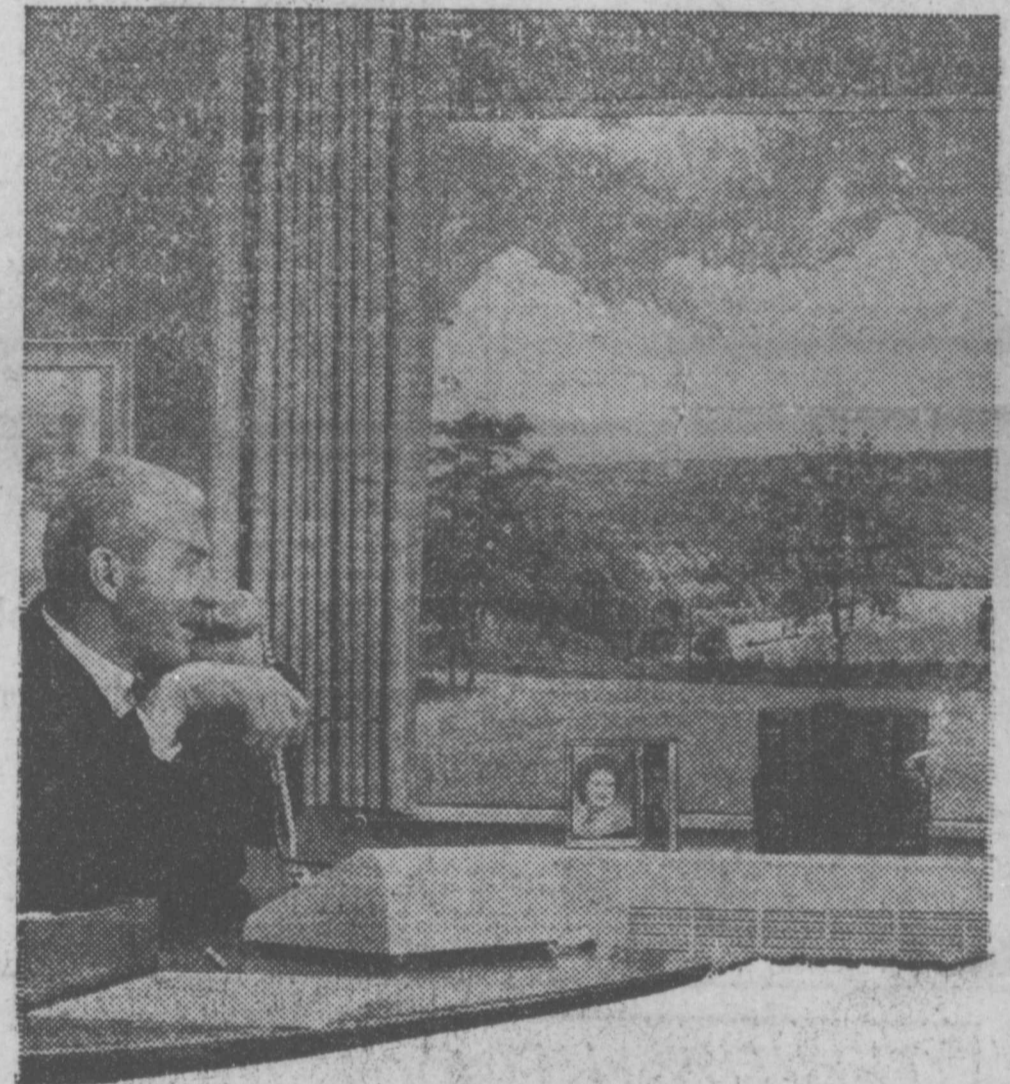
Wins Richest Boat Race
