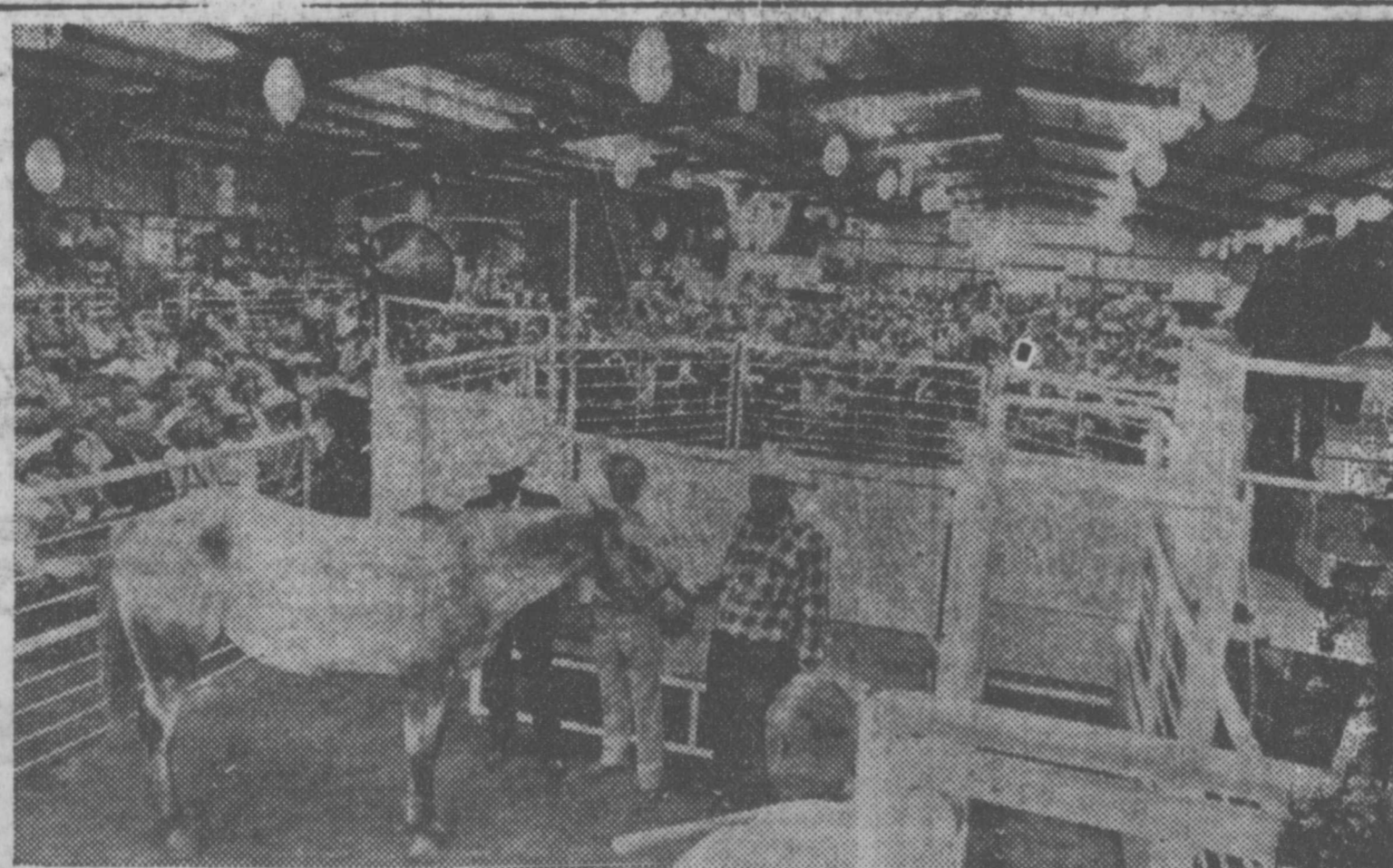

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

One of the strange phenomena of our times is the way in which anyone who bucks a going trend is portrayed.

Take for example, the impression that has been created in certain areas concerning Rep. Otto Passman of Louisiana stemming out of his long standing fight to prevent the waste of taxpayers money on foreign give aways.

He has been often made to appear to be a somewhat bucolic, irascible whimsical character who somehow has a personal grudge against what is called foreign aid. When during the recent approval of a few more billions to give away he was outmaneuvered, certain writers seemingly expressed feeling that was the greatest strategic victory since the Normandy landing.

Yet Rep. Passman has developed and released some astounding figures. From December 31, 1952, through 1963, U. S. gold holdings dropped from over \$23 billion to slightly more than \$15 1/2 billion, a drop of \$7,656,000,000.

In the same period the other countries, excluding the Russo-China bloc, almost doubled gold holdings, going from \$13 billion to over \$24 1/3 billion.

In same period, free world foreign nations increased holdings of U.S. dollars from \$10 1/2 billion to almost \$26 billion.

On December 31, 1963, he points out, the U. S. national

debt totaled \$309 billion, while the combined national debts of all the rest of the free world nations totaled \$232 billion.

This coupled with his figures that show every year since 1950, with the exception of 1957, there has been a deficit in the U. S. balance of payments position which totaled at the end of 1963 almost \$27 billion, causes wonder why such conditions continue.

Of course, the foreign aid give away boys seem somewhat confused as to the objectives of the program. While on one hand they are giving away birth control equipment all over the world, they also hand out to Nationalist China over \$13 worth of "Royal Bee" capsules, advertised as a sex rejuvenator, Rep. Clarence Brown of Ohio reports. This would seem to be working toward opposite directions.

Rep. Brown is also curious about the \$998 worth of bubble gum given to Turkey. He cannot quite ascertain how bubble gum can be used to stop communist aggression.

And of course, perhaps a classic is the shipment made by the foreign aid experts with U. S. tax dollars of Metrecal. Presumably the slogan here is "help starving people get even thinner on Metrecal".

So, it gives pause to wonder over the reports that indicated that in out maneuvering Rep. Passman to get still more money voted for foreign give aways, some sort of a victory was achieved. This seems a little what akin to people shouting loudly and madly when burglars manage to evade the police.

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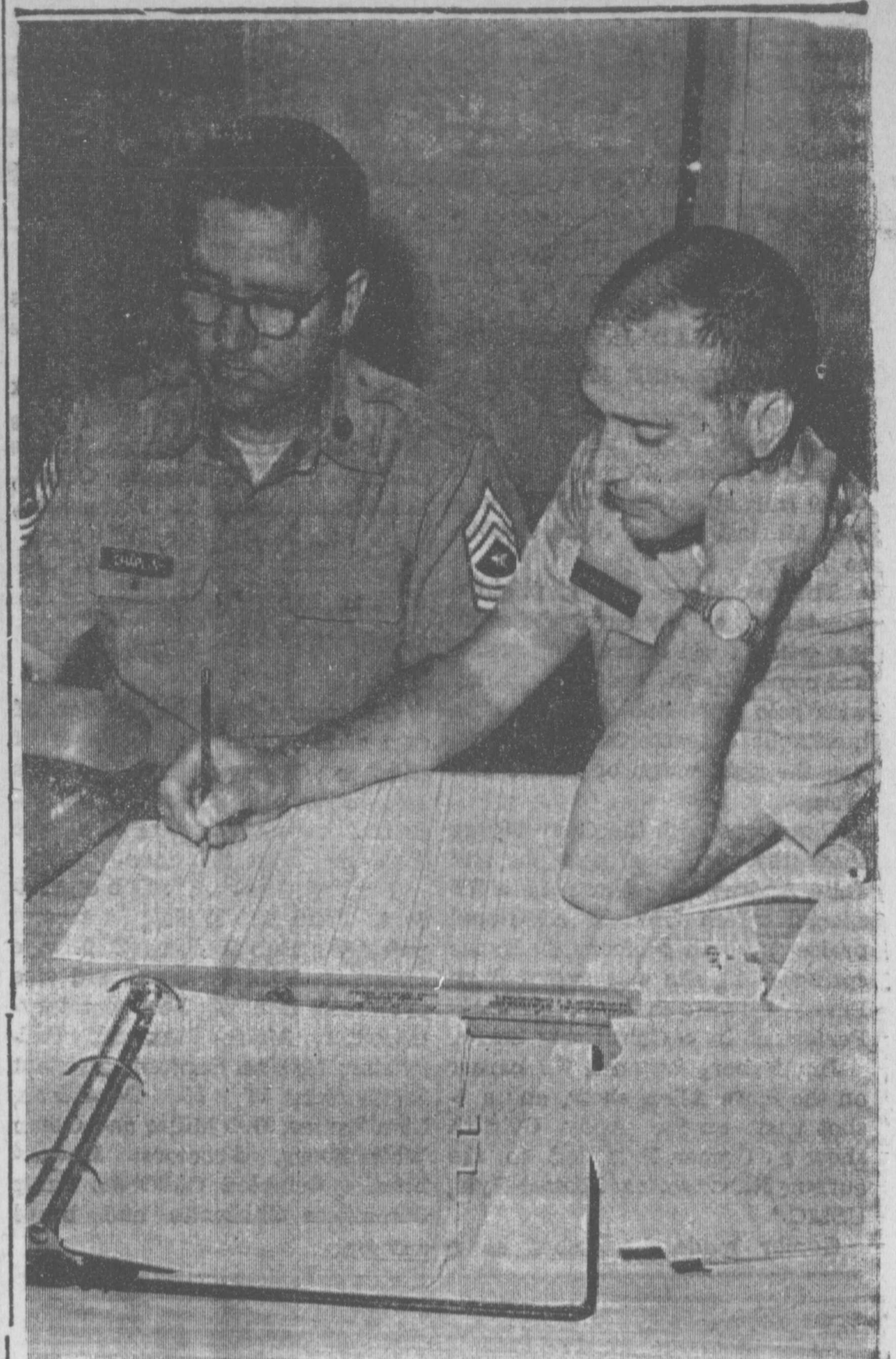

It has been believed that a man could win a lady's love by burying a lock of her hair under his doorstep; that she could be kept from straying by slipping another lock of hair under the doorstep once she was wed. Tradition minded husbands still carry their brides across the threshold of their first home, and romantic American brides do well to ignore the fact that this custom comes from Asia, where a man kidnapped the lady of his choice and literally carried her into his house as property.

As paganism gave way to Christianity, and boulders to carefully designed doors, man changed his protective doorway symbols. The Colonial six-panel door reminds us that the early Christians considered the cross to be the most effective protection against evil. By positioning two small panels over two larger ones, the center stile and rails of the door formed a vertical cross which was supposed

to keep bad spirits from entering the house. As a further safeguard, the doors were often hung with hinges shaped like 'H' and 'L' which they meant to stand for Holy Lord. These they sometimes emphasized with red paint to scare away witches.

Today doors are about as varied as wheels. They show we no longer trust in symbols to keep us safe—that we recognize no intruder but a physical one. Beyond that a modern door is a door now, sometimes its design is faithfully classic, sometimes it is highly ornamental and sometimes its only ornament is a handle. The material of which it is made can be wood, steel, or glass, or a composition. The homeowner himself by his choice, may make of the door itself his own private symbol for safety, or welcome, or even silent challenge—but it is many refinements removed from the flat statement of the boulder at the cave.

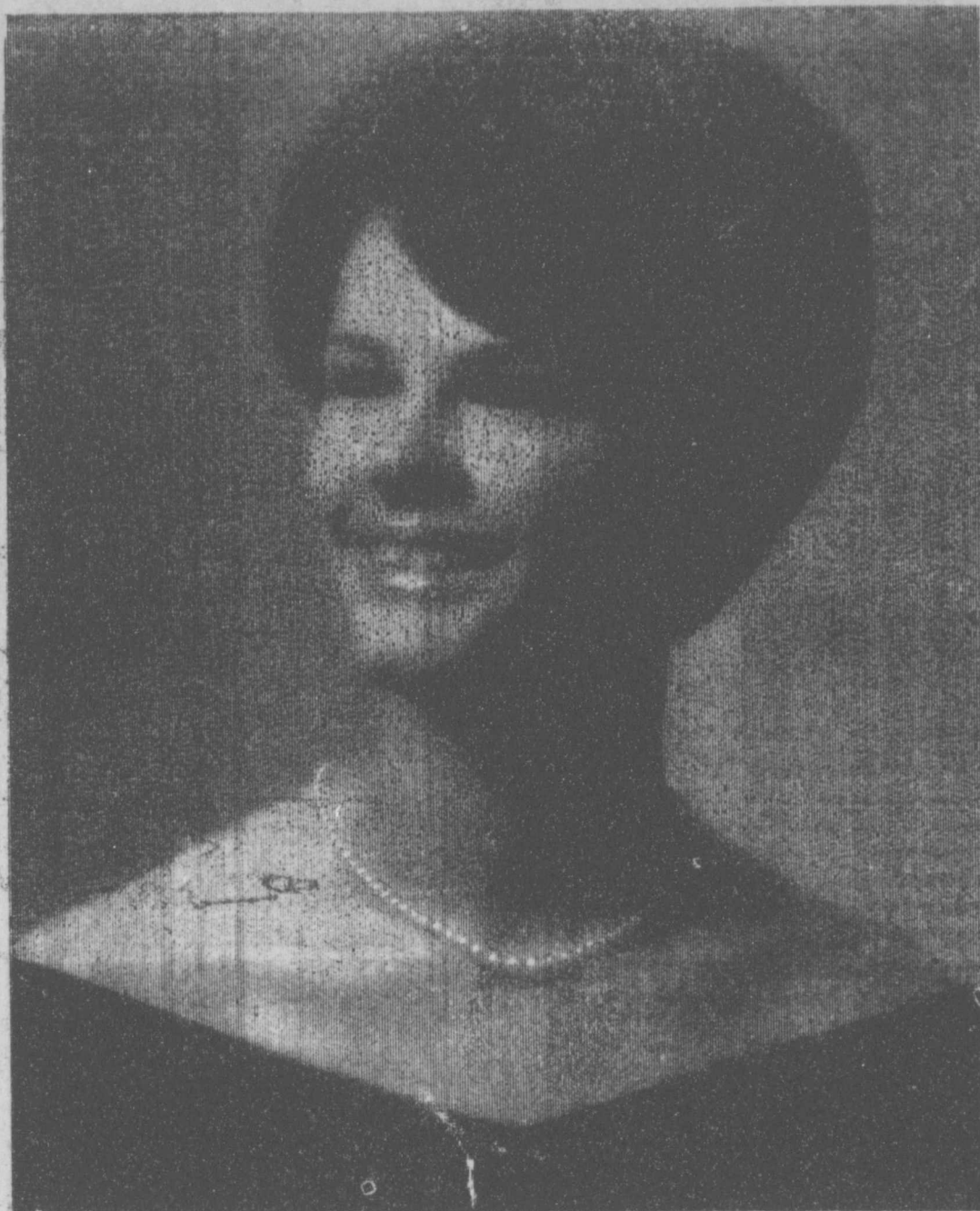

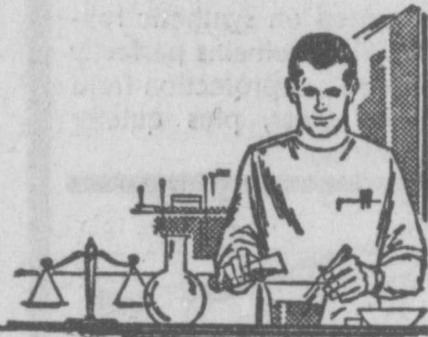

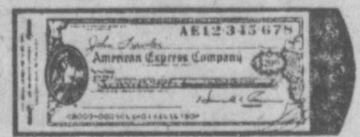

● The southwest corner of the basement of a frame house is safer than in a brick or stone house. If there is no basement, lie down on the first floor under a table or bed (preferably in the southwest corner).

● Urban schools: Stay inside, away from windows; remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums.

● Rural schools of frame construction: Teachers should remove children to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

### Lemons Healthful, Helpful

The common lemon can be a big help for the harried homemaker. Lemons, while most frequently used in the form of juice, can also enhance the flavor of pies, meats and beverages. Lemon juice helps prevent the browning of cut fruits as peaches, apples and pears. Potatoes stay white if they are cooked in water to which a little lemon juice is added. Don't add too much lemon juice though, it will harden the potatoes. It is best to add the juice halfway through the cooking period.

If you use lemon juice to flavor vegetables, add it just before serving. Green vegetables cooked with acids turn an unattractive olive green and require longer cooking to become tender. To prevent curdling, always add lemon juice to milk, not milk to lemon juice. In puddings and pie fillings, add lemon juice to the mixture after it has been cooked to prevent thinning of the filling. Lemons, a member of the citrus family, are an excellent source of Vitamin C.
