

HOSPITAL WILL GET NEW AIR CONDITIONING

A new year-round air conditioning system, with individual temperature controls in each room. was ordered for Coryell Memorial Hospitol Tuesday night of last week) by its board of directors.

The board voted to accept a bid of \$24,000 by Lone Star Gas Company on the new 35-ton system. It will be paid for with hespital profits and no county tax money will be involved.

The deal hinges on State Health Department approval of the new system, but Lone Star officials said it is sure to meet all requirements.

John Gilmer, hospital administrator, said deterioration of the hospital's heating system caused the purchase of the new equipment. Steam heat has been used at the hospital and the steam pipes hove gotten into bad shape, Gilmer said.

The hospital's present cooling and systems are two different systems. The new system will provide year-round temperature control in one operation and will mean a saving of more than \$700 yearly in operating costs, the hospital board was told.







Investors interested in the state of the national economy follow closely at this time the news of the President's proposed budget for the coming fiscal year. The considerable

confusion about the national budget, comes, I believe, be-cause there are actually three different kinds: the adminis-



budget is the most familiar one which traditionally the Presi-dent sends to Congress for ap-proval. It itemizes funds to be spent by the government for many federal programs to-gether with an estimate of funds to be received — in the form of taxes—to pay for these expenditures.

The administrative budget however, doesn't include an accounting of the receipts and expenditures for an increasingly large area of government fi-nance, i.e. the several trust funds administered by the government for such programs as Social Security, Unemploy-ment, etc. And today these areas involve nearly 25% of all

federal spending! The cash budget itemizes the exchange of funds between government and the public and includes the trust funds. How-ever, this budget reflects the distortions of financing the national debt in a tight money market.

The national income accounts budget is, I believe, a more accurate and equitable guide; to the national economy. And re-cently-in a break with tradi-tion-President emphasized this budget in his presentation to Congress.

The national income accounts budget is part of the bookkeeping system by means of which the federal government monitors the progress of the na-tion's Gross National Product.

This budget itemizes the gov-ernment's purchases of goods and services . . . and relates them to total economic output. Moreover, it charts the redis-tribution of income in our na-tion. It illustrates—through an accounting of the various trust funds _ the transfer of money funds – the transfer of money received from taxpayers to those receiving pensions and welfare assistance.

Because this budget is more inclusive - obviously, its totals are higher than those in the administrative budget. For exam-ple, spending in the national income accounts budget totaled \$169.2 billion vs. \$135 billion in the administrative budget.

In emphasizing the national income accounts budget, I feel, President Johnson has led the way toward a greater recognition of-and acceptance of-this more realistic guide to the nation's economic progress.



OWNERS HAVE LEGAL RESPONSIBILITIES

The boat owner has legal responsibilities just as the automobile owner has, reports the Evinrude News Service.

To insure peace of mind (and pocketbook) follow these suggestions: (1) Know state and local regulations for registration and licensing of a boat, motor and trailer; (2) Know and follow the rules of the road as laid down by the U.S. Coast Guard, state and local officials; (3) Maintain your rig in good operating condition with proper equipment aboard at all times.

Registration and licensing or numbering laws vary from state to state... It's best to talk to your marine dealer, or contact state boating law administrators. In most cases, any boat with an engine in excess of 10^s horsepower must be registered and numbers affixed to the boat. Trailerlaws also vary, so check this out, too. A trailer for a 14-foot family runabout will generally need a license and must be equipped with stop and directional lights. If you're towing; a heavy rig, you may need a trailer with brakes.

Several informative guidebooks will give you the rules of the road, but supplement this with knowledge of local regulations. Ignorance of the law is no excuse.

Maintain your boat, motor and trailer in good condition. If an a. cident occurs and it's traced to faultyequipment, you are liable.

You may also be held liable if your fail to carry required equipment aboard your boat. An absolute must is a life preserver or buoyant seat cushion for each person aboard. Depending upon the size and type of boat you own, there will be additional equipment. Check with your
