






Easter eggs old hat? Not when they're a no-cook fondant made the Borden Kitchen way with sweetened condensed milk. Magic Easter Egg Fondant: (Makes 2 lbs.—enough for 2-dozen medium-size eggs)

medium-size eggs) In a medium-size mixing bowl cream together 1/2-cup butter, 1 teaspoon vanilla extract, and 1 teaspoon salt. Blend in 2/3-cup sweetened condensed milk until smooth. (For best results use only Eagle Brand Sweetened Condensed Milk.) Gradually add 6-cups (about 1-1/2-lbs.) sifted Confectioners' sugar. Blend welk after each addition until the mixture becomes very stiff; turns onto a clean board. Carefully knead in all remaining sugar... The mixture should be *smooth*, not sticky. Cut mixture into the desired number of pieces, separating according to number of flavor variations desired (see below). With palms of hands, shape each piece into an egg; place on a waxed-paper-lined cookie sheet. Refrigerate for several hours or overnight. Dip eggs in Dipping Chocolate.

FLAVOR VARIATIONS: Coconut, Immediately after all of the sugar has been kneaded into the Basic Fondant mixture, gradually knead in 3/4-cup flaked coconut. Almond, In the above-Magic Easter Egg Fondant recipe, Substitute 1 teaspoon almond. extract for vanilla extract OR cream in 1 (8-oz.) can almona paste. Follow directions as indicated in basic recipe.

DIPPING CHOCOLATE: Put 8 squares (1/2-lb.) semi-sweet chocolate and 1/3-1/2 slab household paraffin wax in top of double boiler. Place over hot water. Heat over medium-heat. (Never melt paraffin over direct heat.) Stir with wire whisk until chocolate is melted and well blended. Remove from heat. Insert double-pronged kitchen fork into bottom of chilled fondant egg (or place egg on a flat wire skimmer). Dip into chocolate; let excess chocolate drip for a moment. Carefully place dipped egg on waxed-paper-lined cookie sheet. Stir chocolate thoroughly with wire whisk before dipping each egg. If chocolate begins to cool and thicken, place over low heat and gently reheat. Let coating dry. Decorate with butter cream frosting.



Shrimp Graced With Gruyere



Party day, busy day, any day—thank heaven for the no-fuss dinner. The Borden Kitchen had just such a hurried homemaker in mind when they created shrimp-egg ramekins smoothly sauced with Gruyere cheese. Complement with a crisp green salad, refrigerated biscuits temptingly browned, and—dinner's ready

onion until transparent. Stir in flour; cook until mixture bubbles. Remove from heat; gradually blend in milk. Place over medium heat. Cook; stir constantly until sauce is thickened. Stir in mustard, parsley flakes, salt, pepper, Worcestershire sauce and Tabasco. Remove from heat. Shred four portions of cheese. Stir into sauce. Return to heat; stir until cheese melts. Shred the remaining cheese and combine with crumbs, pecans and butter. Reserve for topping. Butter 4 individual ramekins. Divide cheese sauce in half; spoon into 4 ramekins. Cut eggs longthwise into quarters. Arrange over cheese sauce. Add shrimp. Top each ramekin with remaining cheese sauce. Sprinkle each with cheese-crumb mixture. With the proper instruction and guidance, they're an asset to the entire boating world, reports the Evinrade News Service.

There are several plus factors in favor of teaching your youngsters the do's and don'ts of outboard boating. You can't beat this sport for wholesome recreation. It's hard to find time to get into trouble when you're a lishing buff or water ski enthusiast.

Early beat instruction also lays the foundation for years of safe boat-ing fun. Once learned, the basics of boating will stay with your youngsters for years to come, 046

Boating is also a healthy outlet for youth's abounding energy. A day in the warm sun, filled with fun on the water, is enough to tire even the heartiest youngster,

Proper boat handling also teaches a youngster to respect rules and regulations. When instructing him, explain the reason behind local rules. When he's on the water himself, this training will help develop his sense of responsibility and self-reliance.

When a youngster enjoys boating fun, he should share in routine maintenance of the equipment. This will instill respect for property that will carry through to many other situations.



Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect dur-!

PHOTO TIPS FOR BOATING FAMILIES

Judging from the number of cameras you see aboard boats, you would think they were required by the U. S. Coast Guard.


Obviously this isn't true, but it points out the tremendous popularity of boating photography. Few sports offer the same exciting, picture-taking opportunities.

On-the-water photography does present a few special problems for the amateur shutter bug. To improve your snapshots, follow this advice from the Evinrude News Service. Use a light meter and special lens filters and pay careful attention to setting

the correct shutter speed. Water reflects and intensifies sun-light. This is why so many snapshots are over-exposed and lack sharpness and detail. Don't try to guess the correct setting. Even the pros admit that a light meter is essential. Take your reading at the point of interest you plan to shoot. If this isn't possible, find a subject in similar light conditions. Meters aren't foolproof, but over the course of a season, you will get better, sharper photos. Inexpensive lens filters are helpful

in marine photography. Most are available at eamera stores for under \$4.00. As the name implies, they filter out some of the harsh glare of reflected sunlight. The yellow (K-2) adds contrast and sharpness; a red (A) filter adds dramatic over-tones: and an ultra-violet (UV) filter lessens the bluish tint in a picture. These filters are especially helpful to people who own the new automatic cameras.

The correct shutter speed is also important in marine photography. Remember, you're shooting action in almost every case. The minimum speed should be 1/250th of a second. If your camera isn't that fast, you should follow (pan) the subject boat or water skier. As you follow along, snap the photo. This will "freeze" the subject and blur the hackground.
