## COVE COUNCIL VOTES

### CHANGE IN WATER METER LOCATION

**COPPERAS COVE** — Copperas Cove City Council voted Tuesday to repeal a vote taken at the last council meeting on the location of the water meter for Central Texas College.

The council also agreed to deed 1.7 acres of land to the State Highway Department.

The council earlier had voted to locate the water meter for the college on the water main adjacent to the city's meter. The college asked that the meter be located on the campus and agreed to maintain the line if this was done.

The land deeded to the Highway Department was part of the city dump and will be used for right-of-way for construction on FR 116.

The council received a bid from Cove Construction of restrooms in the city park. The council postponed action on the bids until the next council meeting.

The council also heard a proposal from city firemen asking the council's consideration in purchasing two way radios for the three fire trucks and a base radio station for the fire station.

The firemen also told the city they needed a training area, more grass fire fighting trucks and replacement firemen for two firemen who are leaving soon.

The council instructed the city manager to give conditional acceptance to water lines and a storage tank for the Long Mountain Estates owned by Marvin Mickan. The council received a draft of a proposed ordinance making it illegal to leave junk cars, discarded household appliances, worn out machinery and other items of this nature on city residential lots.

Under provisions of the proposed ordinance penalties could result in fines not to exceed \$100. The new ordinance, if passed, also would require junk yards to erect fences to contain and hide the junk along any city thoroughfare.

## REDISTRICTING POSTPONED BL CORYELL COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Coryell County Commissioners Court postponed Monday a decision on redistricting Coryell County until further study has been made.

The proposed redistricting was asked for by 300 voters in Copperas Cove through a signed petition sent to the commissioners last month. About 12 businessmen from Copperas Cove attended the commissioners meeting Monday.

County Judge Norman Storm said that redistricting "would be most difficult using population alone. If it (the court) is divided we would like to consider other factors."

At present each commissioner has 175 miles of county roads to maintain, and approximately 60 per cent of the county's revenue goes into road and bridge fund. Each commissioner receives equal percentage of this 60 per cent.

L. L. Ledger of Copperas Cove suggested that the commissioners appoint a superintendent of roads to oversee the maintenance of county roads. This would take care of maintenance, enabling the commissioners to be elected on some other basis, such as population, he said.

Judge Storm said that he would like to see the federal decision on "one man-one vote" at the local level, now in the courts, before setting down guidelines for Coryell County.

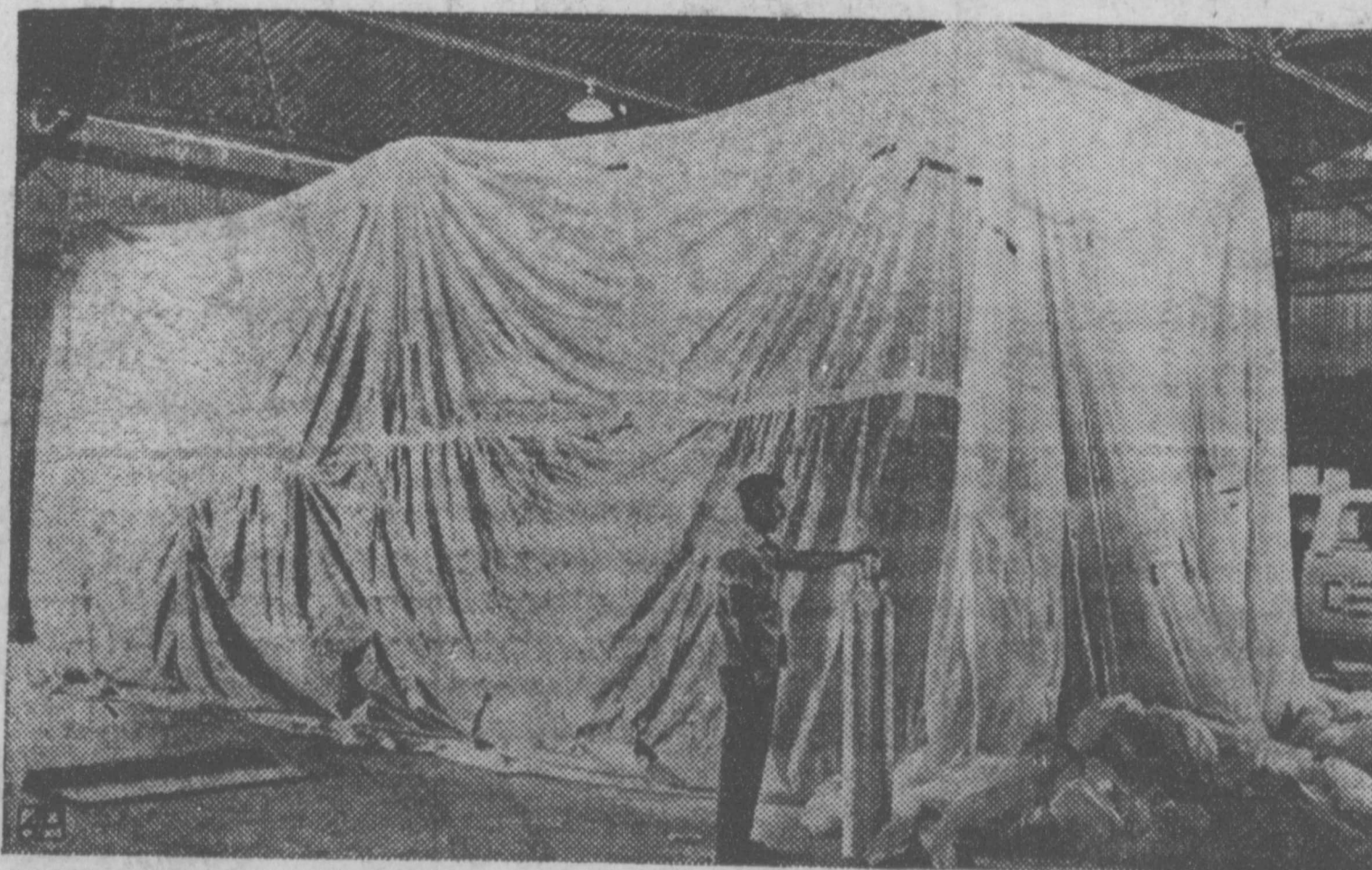

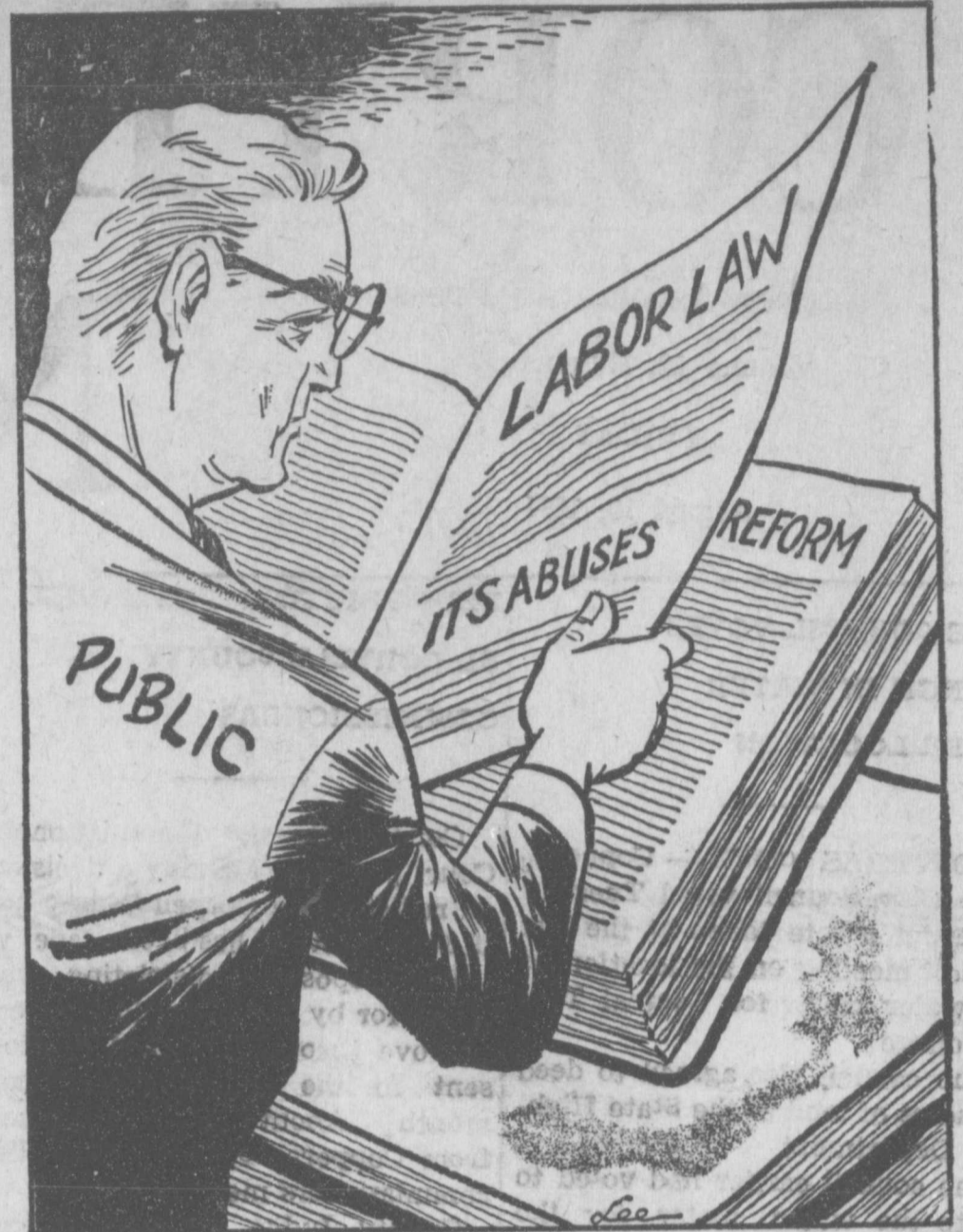

### IN THE PUBLIC INTEREST

Some interesting facts regarding the public interest in national labor law reform came to light when Local 1264, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers recently went on strike at WALA-TV Mobile, Alabama.

The union leaders urged the station's advertisers, both local and national, to withdraw their advertising. H. Ray McGuire, manager of the station, estimates that between \$150,000 and \$250,000 worth of advertising was lost by this pressure during the strike which lasted more than a year.

Local retailers who handled some of the products or which national advertising went off the air, continued to advertise through out the strike, and apparently benefited. Even local institutions particularly sensitive to local public opinion, such as banks, and savings and loan associations continued their advertising over the station.

These local industries and institutions defied the boycott, and even the smallest and most vulnerable local business survived its

## SPECIAL SCHOOL NOTICE

Under regulations the Gatesville Public Schools cannot allow in-eligible students to attend without paying tuition. To be eligible to attend the Gatesville Public School a student must comply as follows:

1. Be on the census roll of the district.
2. Live with parents within the bounds of the Gatesville school district.
3. Regular transfers from a district that joins the Gatesville District and within the first eight grades.

Students that move into the district to live with relatives are not eligible to attend high school without paying tuition. Tuition for these type students is \$20.00 per month in advance of each month.

Students are not eligible if parents move into an apartment, or house, and their regular residence is elsewhere. High school students transferring into the district through regular channels must pay tuition or the tuition paid by the districts that join the Gatesville District. The yearly rate for these type students is \$100.00 per year.

There can be no exception to the above regulations.

A student may be eligible under the following:

If a student is on the census roll, lives with parents, attends part of the school year, and the parents move from the district that student may complete the year. This type student has established eligibility for the year in which the parents move, provided the student has attended part of the school year.

One portion is used to make a gelatin custard base; another portion is whipped and added just before the mold is set. Flaked coconut adds subtle flavor and a "bite" of pleasure, while frozen raspberries "blush" the topping.

Blushing Top Bavarian

- 1 envelope unflavored gelatin
- 1/4 cup cold water
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1-2/3 cup Pet Evaporated Milk (1 tall can)
- 1/2 teasp. salt
- 3-1/3 -oz. can flaked coconut (about 1-1/3 cups)

Soften gelatin in water in a 2-quart saucepan. Add sugar, 1 cup evaporated milk and salt. Cook and stir over medium heat until gelatin is dissolved. Chill. Chill 2/3 cup evaporated milk in ice tray until almost frozen at edges. Put ice-cold milk into cold small bowl of electric mixer (or 1-1/2-quart bowl). Using cold beaters, whip with electric mixer at high speed or with rotary beater until stiff. Beat in coconut and gelatin mixture at low speed, scraping sides of bowl often. Put into six 1/2-cup molds. Chill until firm. Unmold. Top with Blushing Sauce.

Blushing Sauce

- two 10-oz. pkgs. frozen raspberries, thawed
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 3 Tablesp. corn starch
- 2 teasp. lemon juice

Drain raspberries, saving syrup. Mix sugar and corn starch in a 2-quart saucepan. Stir in gradually reserved syrup and lemon juice. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture bubbles. Boil and stir until thick and clear, about 1 minute. Take off heat. Stir in raspberries. Cool. Makes about 2 cups.

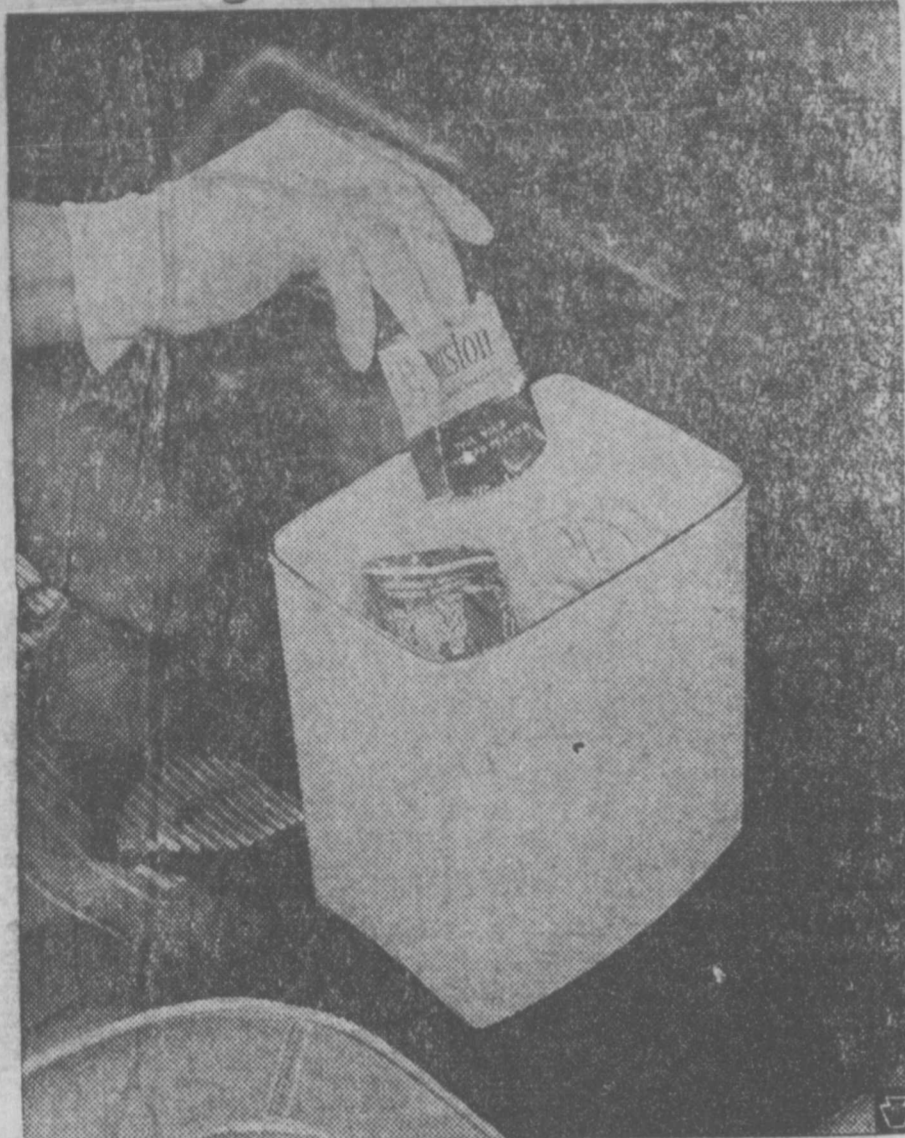

ADVISES ON HEAT TROUBLES  
DURING TRAINING PERIODS**

AUSTIN — Nonfatal heat injuries, such as heat exhaustion and heat cramps, which continue to occur in athletes "by the hun-

reds" each year are completely preventable, according to a Texas physician.

Dr. Cone Johnson, of the Department of Physiology at Scott and White Memorial Hospital, Temple, outlines several measures that can prevent heat injuries to athletes in an article entitled "Playing It Cool" in the August issue of TEXAS MEDICINE, the

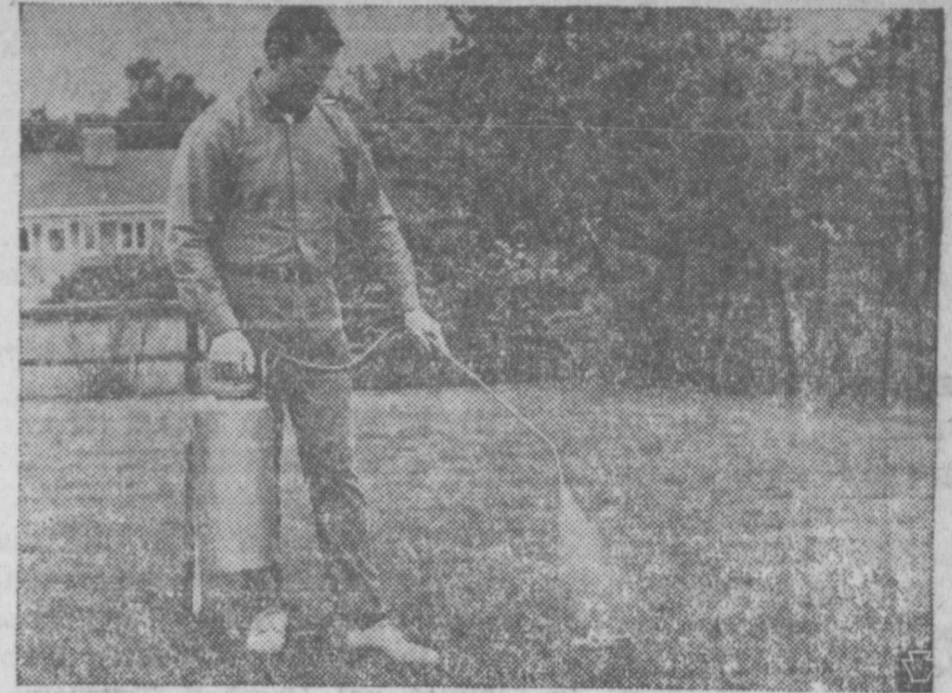
journal of the Texas Medical Association.

As athletes begin training for sports events, they are likely to be working during the hottest days of the year. Some athletes have spent the summer working in air-conditioned surroundings and others have perhaps been sedentary and lax in keeping fit. Both types are actually unfit to begin football practice in August without certain precautions being taken, Dr. Johnson says.

Some of the general principles he lists for proper protection of athletes include the following:

1. A thorough physical examination.
2. Although daily exertion in the heat will acclimatize most athletes in 12 to 15 days, exposure should begin at least three weeks before the first full practice session, and athletes should wear only T-shirts and shorts during at least the first 5 to 7 days.
3. Heavy gear should be introduced gradually before work-outs become strenuous.
4. Players should wear short-sleeved, light-weight uniforms and short stockings and keep taping to minimum required until cold weather. White material (to reflect heat) that is loosely fitting and permeable to moisture is preferable.
5. Provide 15 to 30 minutes rest periods every hour when feasible. During these breaks or at half times, jerseys should be lifted and helmets removed, and cool breezes in the shade should be sought at all times.
6. A chart should be kept with records of individual weight losses. A sweat loss equaling 3 percent of the body weight may significantly impair work performance and body cooling.
7. There should be no hesitation in providing water, salt, and potassium on the practice field and during games to replace the water and minerals, hour by hour lost by sweating. Adding 1 teaspoon of salt and two small sars off frozen orange juice to a gallon of water used for drinking is the simplest approach.

For more extensive lawns, a small power sprayer may be the answer. These units are available with either a gasoline engine or an electric motor. The tank capacity of a power sprayer is greater — ten gallons or more — which means less refilling.

Lawn weed control chemicals are most effective when applied at low pressure and with a uniform wetting. Care should be taken to avoid spray drift onto sensitive plants and shrubs. The NSDA recommends that spraying be done on a day when the air is calm and the temperature is in the 70 degree range. To prevent possible injury to other plants, caused by residue which may be left in the sprayer, the sprayer used for lawn weed control should be reserved for lawn use only.

Whichever unit best fits your needs, the thing to remember is that weed control will give your lawn a good start in the spring and eliminate the competition from weeds during the entire growing season. Spray early and join the "in" group of homeowners.

8. Weight loss should always be minimized, and foods high in potassium such as bananas, cocoa, and orange juice should be encouraged.

9. Humidity and temperature should be watched carefully and exposure broken up or rescheduled when either or both are high.

Dr. Johnson concludes his article by stating that these simple measures are only general ones. He adds that knowledge of pre-season conditioning, the appearance of the athlete, the state of his hydration and/or weight loss, the amount of work required, and the cooling powers of the environment must be constantly reasses-

sed in order to protect athletes from serious heat injury.

Family picnics and cookouts are another fall favorite. The crisp air and bright sunshine somehow make sandwiches and hamburgers taste a lot better.

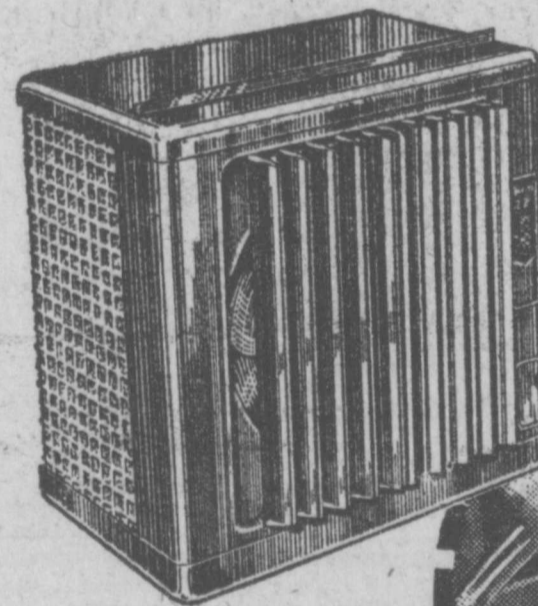
