CORYELL COUNTR 4-H'ERS WIN IN DISTRICT EIGHT CONTESTS, STEPHENVILLE

The Extension Agents of District 8 were in Stephenville Aug. 16 and 17 to judge District Record Books. A total of 197 record books were entered as compared with 249 in 1966. There were 90 senior records, 102 junior, 3 county, and 2 Alumni records. Senior records to be judged for state honors were delivered to College Station Monday, Aug. 21. Records not submitted to State judging will be returned to Extension Agents on Sept. 18 and 19 at College Station.

In the Senior Division, Ronnie Sullins of Oglesby won first in Boy's Achievement and his record book will be in State Competition. Placing in second were Garry Freeman of Copperas Cove in Horse Division, Rickey Mariott of Pearl in Boy's Agriculture, and Terry King of Gatesville in Swine. Placing in third place were Margaret and Harmon Rogers of Oglesby in Girl's and Boy's Leadership.

In the Junior Division, Ray Martin of Jonesboro was in the blue classification with a score of 90, or above in Boy's Agriculture. A score of 90-90 was the red classification and the following placed here: Darlene Zacharias of Oglesby in clothing; Audrey Barker of Copperas Cove in Home Improvement; David Freeman of Copperas Cove in Horse; and Lawrence Pruitt of Jonesboro in Swine. 52ND DISTRICT COURT MEETS: VARIOUS CASES DISPOSED OF

Monday, August 21 at 9:00 a. m. in 52nd District Court Judge Truman Roberts presided over five criminal cases ranging from rape to cattle theft.

A jury was selected from twenty Coryell County citizens summoned for possible jury duty. The jury included Monty Dewald, Horace Baker, Mrs. James B. Jons, Mrs. J. Nelson Lee, Billy F. Barton, Odell Collins, Tom P. Holeyfield, Ernest L. Hudson, Seaborn Ashby, Carl Drosche, S. L. Adams and R. D. Nichols.

The first case brought before Judge and jury was that of Billy Robinson. Robinson plead guilty to a rape charge and was sentenced to 10 years probation by Judge Roberts.

Three cases of burglary were presented to the jury. Johnnie Mack Reed was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary after pleading guilty to a burglary charge. Anne Spikes also accused of burglary, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to three years probation. James Doyle Loveless pleaded guilty to his burglary charge and received three years probation by 52nd District Court.

JUDGE TRUMAN ROBERTS APPOINTED TO PROBE WEBB COUNTY SPENDING

Judge Truman Roberts of Hiltonton, of the 52nd Dist. Court, been assigned to preside over Court of Inquiry into Webb County spending at Laredo beginning Monday, Aug. 28.

The Court of Inquiry is being created as the result of an order by 11th Dist. Judge E. D. Salter who also submitted a written request to the Administrative Judicial District Webb County is to appoint an outside judge to conduct the inquiry.

The order said "There is no cause to believe that an offense or a series of offenses has been committed against the laws of the State of Texas.

"Sums of money running into the thousands of dollars of Webb County funds have been used since January 1966 for trips to Washington, New Orleans, Austin, Dallas, Galveston, Sattilo (Mexico) San Luis Potosi (Mexico) and other places for such purposes as attending a breakfast, giving testimony at a legislative hearing, going on a goodwill tour, attending meetings, conventions and conferences and for other purposes."

Suspected irregularities involve entries showing payment of pauper's rents where no such payments were actually paid, paying for an automobile collision for a county employee who had no insurance and sending certain county officials to schools of various sorts, some of which last for several weeks.

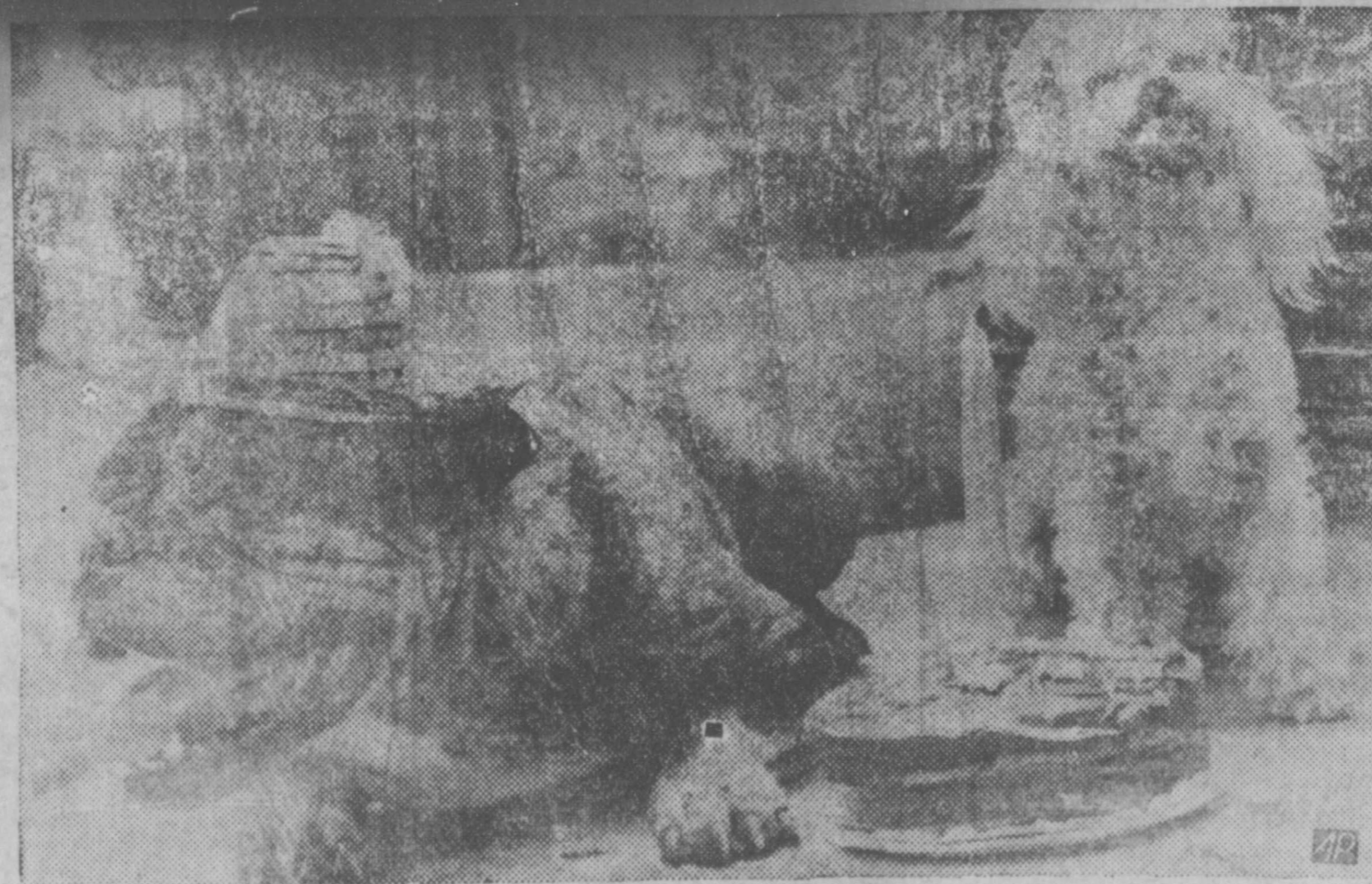

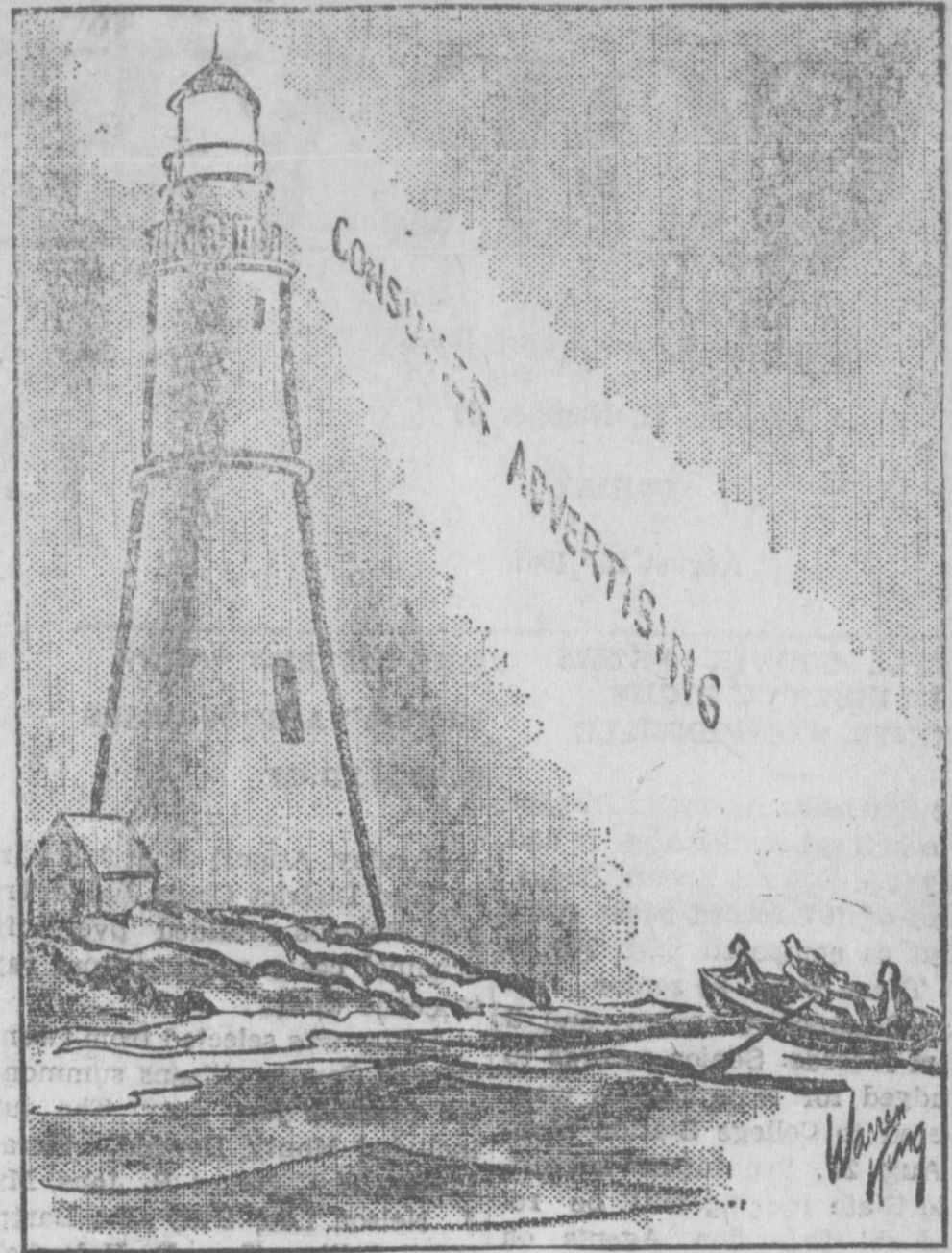

INFORMED CONSUMERS

Attacks on advertising are nothing new. Fortunately, it's easy to refute such charges. For years critics have been saying that advertising corrupts the public taste, that it is useless and unnecessary. Others contend that it weakens competition by developing consumer loyalty for particular products and companies.

This would seem to indicate that some firms are more successful in their advertising than others. But the argument that competition can be strengthened by penalizing those who are successful at it isn't convincing.

Commenting on a proposal of the Federal Trade Commission to restrict advertising, Justice John Marshall Harlan of the Supreme Court wrote, "Undeniably, advertising may sometimes be used to create irrational brand preferences and mislead consumers as to the

actual differences between products, but it is very difficult to discover at what point advertising ceases to be an aspect of healthy competition. It is not the Commission's function to decide which lawful elements of the product or for the consumer, should be considered the symptoms of industrial sickness. It is the consumer who must make the election through he exercise of his purchasing power."

This may be only the view of one Justice, but we think he is on the right track. Commercial advertising serves the essential purpose of informing consumers of the choices open to them. Any impairment of the channels conveying such information would damage the interest of the consuming public.

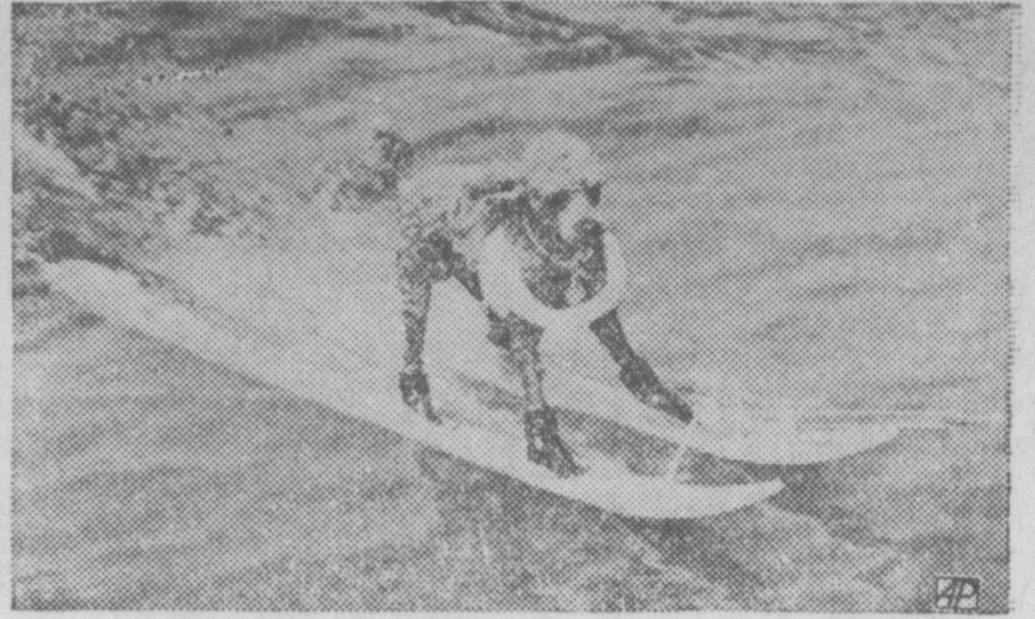

Agricultural Briefs

BROOMCORN PRODUCTION IN TEXAS—The state's broomcorn production for 1967 is estimated by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service at 1,500 tons, only 39 percent of the 1966 production and 32 percent of the average for 1961-65 period. Only 14,000 acres were harvested. Production and acreage were the lowest since 1933. Dry weather throughout the growing season was the contributing factor.

SOIL TEST FOR FALL PLANTING — Farmers should not neglect preparations for fall seeded crops, including soil tests, despite the continuing dry weather. Dr. C. D. Welch, Extension soil chemist, says the laboratories can handle samples in the minimum of time at this season. By testing now, samples will be dry, information will be available for fertilizing planned small grain plantings and carry-over in the soil of unused fertilizer due to the dry 1967 weather will be reflected in the test analysis, Welch said.

DAIRYMAN AUTOMAT — Dairy- men have turned to automation in an effort to overcome the shortage of labor. This, says Shaanon Carpenter, Extension area dairy specialist, has greatly increased the capital investment per farm but has made it possible for a single worker to care for more cows.

What To Do In a Tornado

- People in open country can view the approach of a tornado and move at right angles to its path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.
- In towns or cities, seek shelter inside, preferably in a substantial building. Stay away from windows.
- The southwest corner of the basement of a frame house is safer than in a brick or stone house. If there is no basement, lie down on the first floor under a table or bed (preferably in the southwest corner).
- Urban schools: Stay inside, away from windows; remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums.
- Rural schools of frame construction: Teachers should remove children to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.
