

INFORMED CONSUMERS

Attacks on advertsing are nothing new. Fortuately, it's easy to refute such charges. For years critics have been saying that advertisng corrupts the public taste, that it is useless and unnecessary Others contend that it weakens competition by developing consumer loyalty for articular products and companies.

This would seem to indicate that some firms are more successful in their advertising than others. But the argument that competition can be strengthened by penalizing those who are successful at it isn't convincing.

Commenting on a proposal of the strict advertising, Justice John Marshall Harlan of the Supreme Court wrote, "Undeniably, advertising may sometimes be used to create irrational brand preferences and mislead consumers as to the


